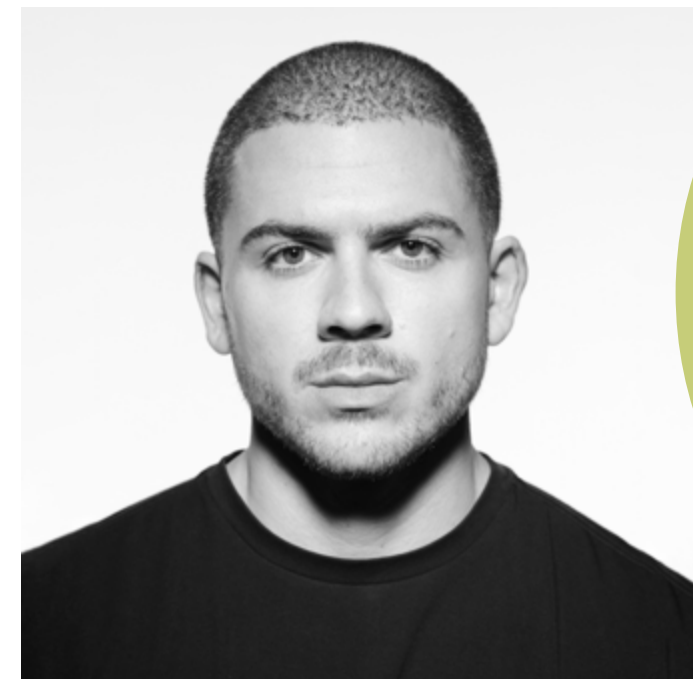

This innovation reduces water and energy consumption in our denim finishing processes, building on the next 40 years of modern heritage while staying true to denim culture. But for us, this is just the start of a much bigger journey.

We understand that the future of our industry—and of GUESS—depends on how responsibly we use the resources at our disposal. People will always want and need clothing, but it is our responsibility to create it in a way that protects and preserves the planet. 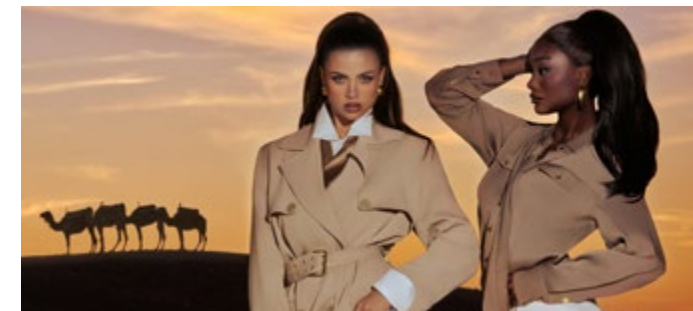

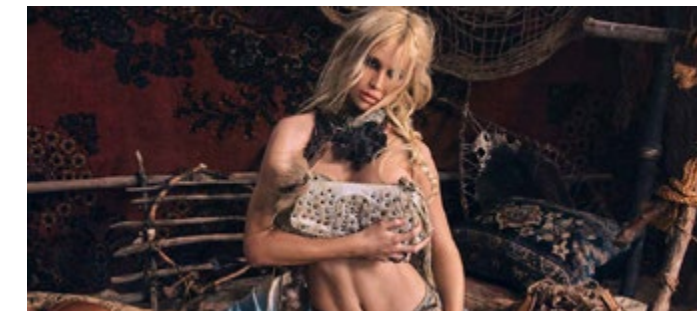
GUESS Accessories

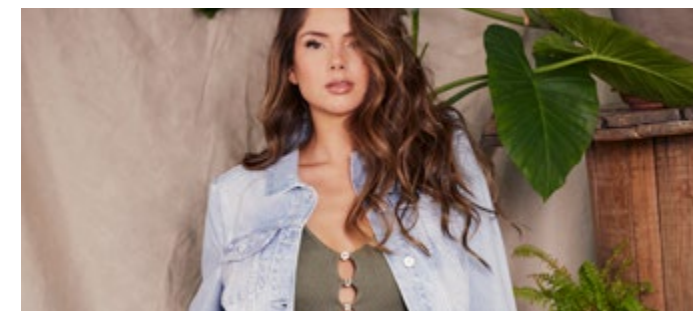

Our Global Footprint

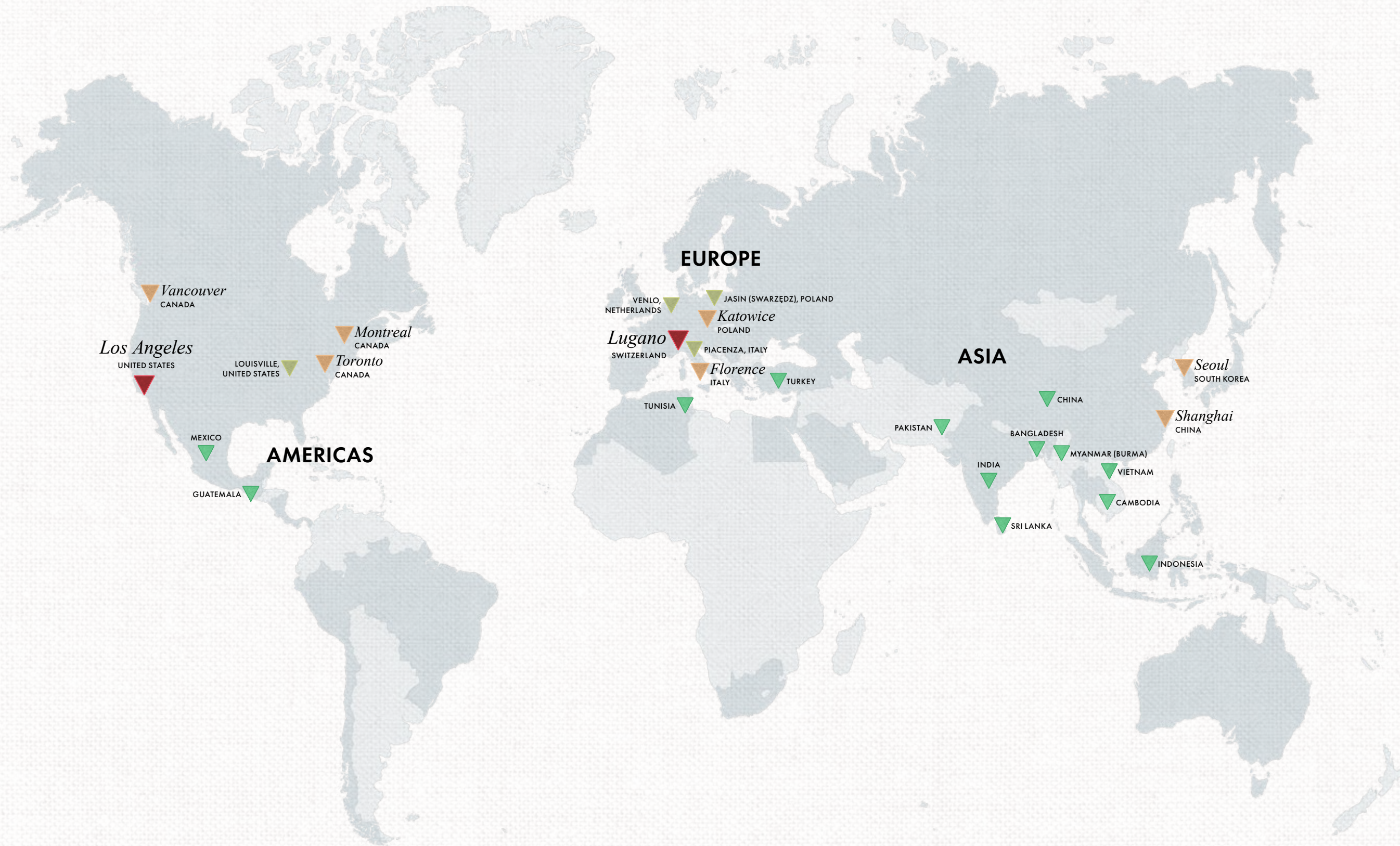
GUESS is a global lifestyle brand with corporate headquarters located in Los Angeles, United States and Lugano, Switzerland. These are complemented by administrative offices strategically situated in Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Florence, Katowice, Seoul, and Shanghai.

Leveraging a robust global network of trusted suppliers, GUESS sustains a strong international presence, operating over 1,500 retail stores across all continents. In fiscal years 2024 and 2025, the company collaborated with a total of 368 and 373 suppliers, respectively, to manufacture its products, primarily in China, Bangladesh, and India, which together account for more than 80% of the brand's annual production volume. Additionally, GUESS sources products from a diverse range of other countries, further strengthening the resilience and flexibility of its global supply chain.

The company's inbound and outbound logistics operations are managed through key distribution centers located in Piacenza, Venlo, Louisville, and Jasin.

Navigating Our Future Through Double Materiality

In FY2025, we revisited the material impacts identified in our previous report, reinforcing our commitment to transparency and responsibility through our Double Materiality Policy. This policy ensures that we evaluate both the financial effects of environmental, social, and governance (ESG) factors on our business, as well as our wider impact on society and the environment. Our review confirmed stability with no major changes in our organizational structure, operations, or external conditions—meaning the insights from our FY2023 assessment remain fresh, relevant, and ready to guide us forward.

The assessment identified 14 material topics—including climate action, sustainable materials, labor rights, and the circular economy—providing a clear roadmap to recognize, update, and prioritize key sustainability issues. This process sharpens our ESG strategy while aligning with leading reporting frameworks and evolving sustainability principles. Additionally, we conducted a quantitative impact study using sales and other data to identify environmental and social hotspots within our product portfolio. This approach ensures a data-driven understanding of our value chain impacts, complemented by national and industry-level risk data for our key regions.

Responsible Decision-Making Starts with ESG Governance

At GUESS, we have established a strong ESG governance model, guided by our public GUESS ESG Governance Policy, that reflects our deep commitment to responsible business practices. This includes upholding good governance and sustainability oversight at every level, embedding ethics into every facet of our operations, and maintaining full transparency in how we report our progress. At the heart of it all, we believe that honesty, integrity, and strong values are the foundation of who we are—guiding not just what we do, but how we do it.

Our Board of Directors plays a fundamental role in overseeing the company’s strategy, risk, and integrity and has final approval over the goals set out in our ESG strategy. To ensure effective implementation of the ESG strategy, it is supported by the Nominating and Governance Committee, the Sustainability Steering Committee, and our global GUESS Sustainability & ESG team. To enable ESG messaging, concepts, and goals to better permeate across all levels within GUESS, various individuals across departments, corporate levels, and retail locations have been assigned as “Green Ambassadors”. They are tasked with promoting and increasing awareness of ESG initiatives within their teams and to customers.

We continuously develop clear, purpose-driven policies to set expectations and guide every department in fulfilling our ESG responsibilities. At GUESS, we believe that clear policies and standards are essential to effective corporate governance. Our commitment to ethical business practices and transparency is reflected in the policies and standards we uphold, both within our organization and across our direct supply chain partnerships. By making all our policies and standards publicly available at sustainability.guess.com, we transparently communicate not only the direction we aim to take as a company, but also how we plan to achieve our goals.

This commitment towards transparency reinforces our dedication to strong ESG governance, as outlined in the GUESS ESG Governance Policy. We expect all stakeholders to comply with and respect all GUESS policies that are relevant to them. Upholding strong ESG principles and ethical business practices is not optional, it is a core requirement for doing business with GUESS.

Embedding ESG into Our Global Governance

At GUESS, sustainability is not a standalone initiative—it is woven into the fabric of our global operations. Our dedicated Sustainability & ESG team, composed of Directors and Senior Managers across the US, Europe, and Asia, ensures environmental, social, and governance considerations are integral to our decision-making processes. This team reports to our VP of Internal Audit and ESG, who, in turn, reports directly to our Chief Executive Officer and maintains a direct line to the Board of Directors’ Audit Committee. This governance structure ensures that sustainability and internal auditing efforts are aligned and have direct oversight at the highest levels of our organization.



Ensuring Transparency Through Third-Party Assurance

Since the release of our first Sustainability Report covering calendar year 2014, KPMG has served as our independent third-party assurance provider. We obtained limited assurance until FY2019 and reasonable assurance starting from FY2020 over our key ESG metrics and disclosures included in the Data and Disclosures section of our report. Reasonable assurance provides a higher level of assurance than limited assurance about whether the information is fairly stated, in all material respects.



Strengthening Our ESG Framework

We have established the GUESS Sustainability Assurance Framework to provide a comprehensive account of our sustainability performance. This framework identifies key performance indicators and aligns our reporting with globally recognized standards, such as the GRI Universal Standards, the SASB Apparel, Accessories & Footwear Sustainability Accounting Standard, and the Multiline and Specialty Retailers & Distributors Sustainability Accounting Standard. In FY2024, we enhanced this framework to better align our ESG metrics with evolving reporting requirements and to improve the robustness of our disclosures. Additionally, we developed ESG Playbooks—comprehensive narratives on key ESG topics—that serve as practical guides to ensure compliance with emerging standards and foster strong governance practices.



CASE STUDY

Driving Change at the Store Level: Green Ambassadors Program

The Green Ambassadors Program plays a vital role in connecting our internal sustainability efforts with our customers. Ambassadors help spark conversations, share information with colleagues and consumers, and contribute innovative ideas. Representing every district across the U.S. and Canada, each Ambassador works in one of our retail stores and brings valuable, frontline insight. As consumer-facing team members, they are uniquely positioned to communicate our environmental, social, and governance (ESG) initiatives directly to shoppers—building awareness, fostering engagement, and reinforcing our commitment to sustainability.

Their mission is to champion our sustainability work and use their firsthand experience with GUESS products and consumers to help shape new grassroots initiatives. This program is facilitated in partnership by the Corporate Sustainability and Training & Development teams, ensuring Ambassadors are well-equipped with the knowledge and resources needed to make a meaningful impact.

Leading the program are the Captains of the Green Ambassadors (CGA), who participate in quarterly calls and take on monthly challenges and tasks. They are also responsible for recruiting, training, and supporting new Ambassadors. We strongly encourage collaboration among Green Ambassadors to foster a culture of sustainability—both within our stores and in the broader communities we serve.

GUESS ECO and Consciously Constructed represent the foundation of our commitment to sustainability through product—two innovative collections that are continually growing and redefining how we create fashion. From the careful selection of materials to every design and sourcing decision, we prioritize responsible practices. These collections feature materials such as organic cotton, recycled polyester, and responsibly sourced cellulosic. Each piece is thoughtfully crafted to reflect our values and uphold our responsibility as a global fashion leader.

As part of our ACTION GUESS strategy, we have raised our ambitious goals to further increase the use of environmentally preferred materials—and we continue to share our progress each year in our sustainability reports. To support this commitment, we have strengthened our Eco Materials and Product Guidelines to reflect global best practices and the

latest recommendations from organizations such as Textile Exchange and the UNFCCC, for raw material sourcing and responsible production practices.

These standards empower our product teams to clearly communicate expectations to our suppliers. From fabric selection to vendor collaboration, and even direct engagement with mills, we ensure alignment across the entire supply chain, actively influencing upstream decisions to help us achieve these heightened sustainability goals.

By increasing the use of lower-impact materials, we’re taking meaningful steps to reduce our footprint throughout the entire value chain.

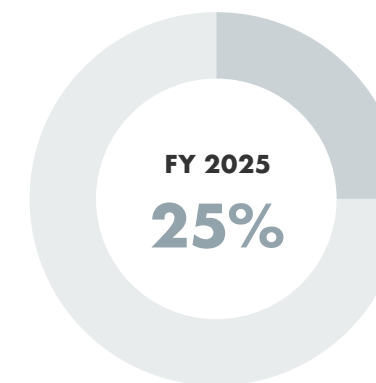

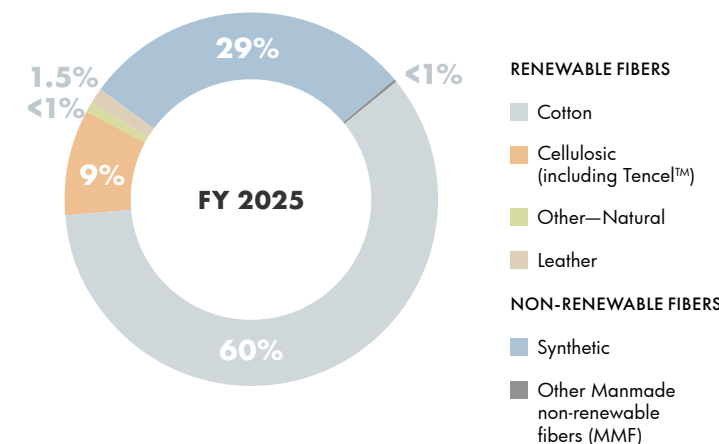

Over 2/3 of the materials we use are renewable fibers.



In FY2024, we significantly expanded the presence of preferred materials in our handbags and footwear. By replacing traditional materials like nylon, leather, and virgin polyurethane with recycled polyester and recycled polyurethane, we're advancing our commitment to circularity and material innovation across new product categories.

In our jewelry collections, we continue to utilize ion plating techniques that significantly reduce wastewater generation compared to conventional water plating methods.

From fiber to finishing, we are making meaningful strides to minimize environmental impact, improve traceability, and meet the evolving expectations of conscious consumers. These initiatives go beyond isolated improvements—they embody our deeper commitment to embedding sustainability into the very DNA of all GUESS products.

The effects of all our products, from clothes to shoes and handbags, extend beyond immediate production; we actively consider factors such as product transportation, packaging choices, and the end-of-life processes for our products.



CASE STUDY

Advancing Sustainability and Innovation: GUESS JEANS

In FY2025, GUESS launched the GUESS JEANS collection, marking a pivotal step forward in the brand's commitment to sustainable fashion and responsible manufacturing. This new line represents a harmonious blend of innovation, environmental stewardship, and the brand's iconic heritage.

Through the GUESS JEANS collection, the brand is not only honoring its heritage but also setting new standards in more sustainable denim manufacturing.

Drawing inspiration from GUESS's signature styles of the 1980s and 1990s, the collection reinterprets classic denim designs for a modern audience. It includes a variety of denim products such as jeans, shirts, and jackets, available in multiple fits for both men and women. Each garment is produced using organic or recycled materials, underscoring the brand's dedication to reducing environmental impact while preserving its design legacy.

A cornerstone of this initiative is the introduction of GUESS AIRWASH™ technology, developed in collaboration with Jeanologia. This cutting-edge process replaces conventional stone-washing methods with an air-and-bubble technique, significantly reducing water and energy consumption and eliminating the use of pumice stones. This innovation exemplifies GUESS's ongoing commitment to reduce environmental impact through improved production methods and more efficient use of resources.

Acting with Purpose: Our Climate Goals in Motion

Climate change is one of the most pressing challenges facing society, and we recognize our responsibility to help reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. At GUESS, we are committed to minimizing our environmental impact by collaborating with our suppliers and partners to identify climate-related risks and lower emissions throughout our operations and supply chain. Through these collective efforts, we reaffirm our dedication to sustainability and the well-being of our planet.

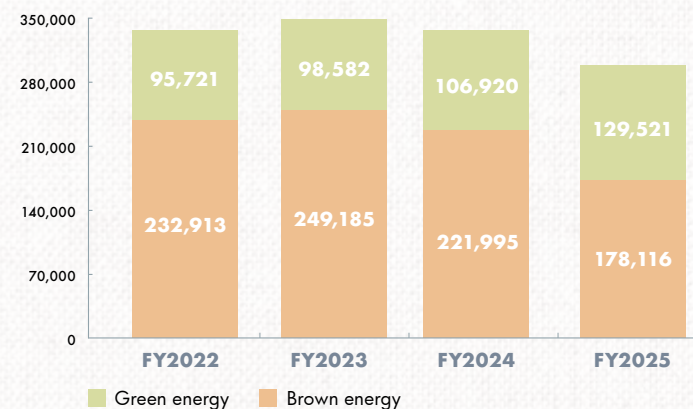
We set science-based targets to reduce Scope 1 and 2 emissions by 50% and reduce Scope 3 absolute emissions by 30% by 2030 against the FY2019 baseline.

Scope 1 and 2

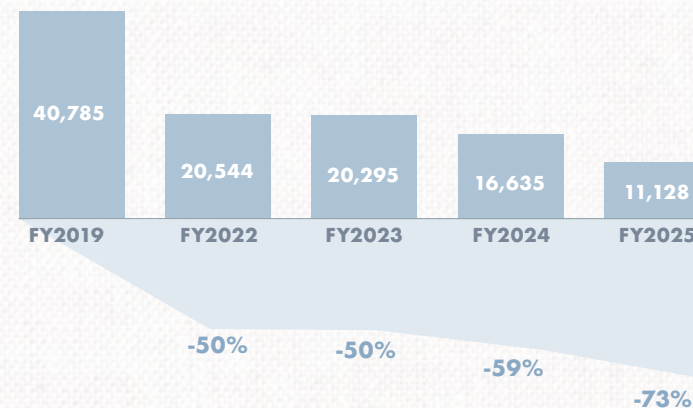
Since our FY2019 base year, GUESS has successfully reduced Scope 1 and 2 greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by over 70%, surpassing the initial target of a 50% reduction by 2030. This significant achievement reflects our ongoing efforts to improve energy efficiency across our retail footprint and increase our reliance on renewable energy sources via the purchase of Energy Attribute Certificates (EACs). Beginning in FY2022, GUESS purchased EACs across multiple markets to reduce our Scope 2 emissions. Since then, the volume of EACs purchased has continuously increased, and now covers more than 40% of our total energy consumption.

Looking ahead, we are building on this momentum with a new emissions reduction roadmap that further strengthens our commitment to sustainability. A key focus of this strategy is the continued development and expansion of our renewable energy purchasing approach, ensuring we not only meet but exceed our climate goals.

SCOPE 1 AND 2 (MARKET-BASED) GHG EMISSIONS (MTCO₂e)



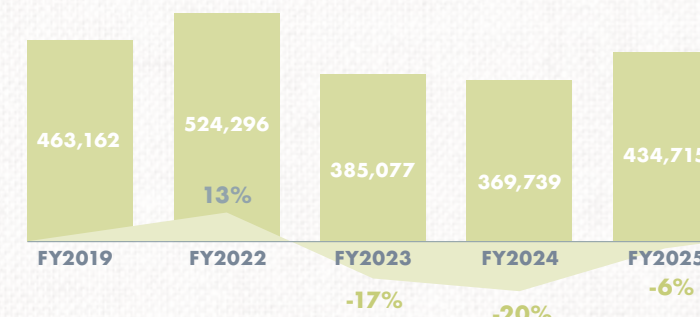
We purchase renewable energy credits, invest in energy-efficient operations, and work with suppliers to lower emissions across the supply chain.

Scope 3

As a company that outsources the manufacturing of our products, Scope 3 emissions—those generated across our supply chain—account for the majority of our total carbon footprint. Addressing these emissions is one of the most pressing and complex challenges within our climate strategy, and it remains a central focus of our efforts to drive meaningful environmental impact.

The increase in our Scope 3 (Category 1 – Purchased Goods and Services) emissions in FY2025 is primarily due to higher production volumes relative to FY2024. As Scope 3 emissions are reported on an absolute basis, the greater number of units ordered and produced directly contributed to the overall rise. Additionally, the proportion of environmentally preferred materials remained unchanged at 25% year-over-year, limiting the potential for emissions intensity improvements. Furthermore, due to limited supply chain visibility, we are unable to incorporate all supplier-specific decarbonization efforts into our calculations. As a result, emissions estimates rely on industry average values, which may overstate actual emissions in cases where suppliers have made progress in reducing their carbon footprint.

To address the challenge of reducing the impact of our supply chain, we focus on three key levers across our operations and supply chain:

1 SMARTER MATERIALS
 We place a strong emphasis on the raw materials we use. By prioritizing preferred materials such as organic cotton, recycled fibers, and responsibly sourced cellulosic, we aim to lower the carbon intensity of our products. These choices reduce embedded emissions while maintaining the high standards of style and quality our customers expect.

2 RESPONSIBLE MANUFACTURING PARTNERSHIPS
 We work closely with manufacturing partners who demonstrate a commitment to environmental progress. We prioritize suppliers who are investing in renewable energy, enhancing energy efficiency, and adopting sustainable production practices. The environmental performance of our partners directly influences the footprint of our collections; for this reason, we aim to increase the percentage of preferred materials used and to prioritize responsible sourcing.

3 SUPPLIER COLLABORATION & CAPACITY BUILDING
 We believe real progress comes from working together. That’s why we provide our suppliers with ongoing training, technical guidance, and tools to help them improve their own environmental performance. From optimizing production processes to reducing energy use, we aim to foster collaborative, practical, and long-term improvements across our value chain.



By activating these levers, we’re working to reduce Scope 3 emissions, while striving to build a more resilient, transparent, and climate-responsible supply chain.

Building Better Practices in Water and Chemical Use

At GUESS, we understand that water is a critical resource—not just in the fashion industry, but for the health of people and the planet. That’s why responsible water and chemical management is a key part of our sustainability efforts. While we do not directly operate our production facilities, we recognize that certain stages of manufacturing—such as dyeing, washing, and fabric finishing—can be water-intensive and produce wastewater that may harm the environment if not properly treated. These risks are significant, and we take them seriously as part of our broader responsibility to promote sustainable practices throughout our supply chain.

We’re working closely with our suppliers to change that. We encourage them to go beyond just meeting environmental rules by adopting advanced wastewater treatment systems and using cleaner, more efficient production methods. That includes innovative technologies like ozone finishing and e-flow, which use far less water and create fewer pollutants.

By making these changes, we’re not only helping to reduce our environmental footprint, but we’re also helping to protect the communities and natural resources that support our industry.

Our Water and Chemical Management Policy outlines clear expectations and requirements for all denim suppliers and their facilities. It reflects our belief that progress depends on transparency, accountability, and shared responsibility across the supply chain. Through this policy, GUESS aims to ensure that its denim products are made in a way that respects the natural environment, protects local waterways, and supports the well-being of the factory workers who make our products and the communities where they live.

By working closely with our partners and providing continuous support, we’re promoting a responsible approach to production.

We focus on three key areas:

Our Sustainable Vendor Rating (SVR) tool plays a key role in promoting responsible practices among our tier 1 suppliers. It assesses critical water management areas such as conservation, water recycling, wastewater testing, and pollution prevention, helping ensure suppliers uphold the environmental standards outlined in the GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct.

By holding our suppliers accountable for their water management practices, we aim to strengthen their long-term resilience—helping them meet increasing regulatory requirements and operate more sustainably over time.

- Become a signatory of ZDHC and adopt ZDHC MRSI (2026)

Reducing Water and Chemical Usage

GUESS is committed to aligning with internationally recognized standards to promote safer chemical management practices throughout its supply chain. We recognize the complexities involved, particularly in tracing water use and wastewater quality beyond tier 1 suppliers. Upstream processes like fabric dyeing and finishing are often carried out by subcontractors, making transparency a significant obstacle. Addressing this lack of visibility is a top priority for GUESS, which is why we're investing in improved traceability systems, deeper supplier engagement, and enhanced data collection capabilities. As part of these efforts, GUESS aims to become a signatory of the Zero Discharge of Hazardous Chemicals (ZDHC) program and adopt the ZDHC Manufacturing Restricted Substances List (MRSL) by 2026, with the goal of achieving ZDHC-approved compliance across its supply chain by 2030. Through these commitments, GUESS aims to foster stronger partnerships with suppliers and industry stakeholders to accelerate the transition toward safer, more sustainable chemical practices throughout the value chain.

For GUESS, water stewardship reflects the future we aim to build. Water is a shared responsibility, and we're committed to protecting it through smart decisions, strong partnerships, and bold action.

Safeguarding the environment and human health is a cornerstone of our sustainability strategy. We recognize that chemicals play a vital role in the production of apparel, accessories, footwear, and jewelry, but their use must be carefully managed to prevent harm to people and ecosystems.

Inadequate chemical management can lead to serious environmental degradation—impacting water quality, biodiversity, and the health of communities, especially in ecologically sensitive regions. GUESS views responsible chemical stewardship as both an environmental imperative and a social responsibility to protect the ecosystems and communities linked to our supply chain.

GUESS maintains a comprehensive compliance framework to ensure adherence to global restricted substances regulations across all product lines. The foundation of this framework is the GUESS List of Restricted Substances and Materials (LRSM), which identifies the chemicals that are limited or prohibited in our products and in the production process due to their potential impact on consumers, workers, and the environment. The list is reviewed and updated annually or as deemed necessary to reflect international laws, industry standards, and emerging trends. The latest revision of the LRSM is publicly available at sustainability.guess.com. All tier 1 suppliers are contractually bound to meet LRSM requirements. Compliance is enforced through documentation, training, and random testing procedures, with non-compliance triggering structured corrective actions and follow-ups.

Additionally, we engage with our suppliers through ongoing training, guidelines, and technical support, fostering transparency and accountability across the supply chain. By equipping partners with the knowledge and tools they need, we aim to reduce chemical risks and promote safer, more sustainable manufacturing practices.

Through these combined efforts, GUESS is advancing toward a future where high-quality, stylish products are created with the utmost respect for people and the planet—reflecting our broader commitment to sustainability and corporate responsibility. All vendors must comply with our product-specific List of Restricted Substances and Materials (LRSM), ensuring strict control over hazardous chemicals and maintaining high standards for safety and quality.



CASE STUDY

Doing More with Less: GUESS AIRWASH™

Championed by the Marciano brothers with the launch of GUESS in 1981, the stonewashed look revolutionized denim aesthetics and left a lasting mark on fashion. Today, GUESS AIRWASH™—a cutting-edge technology developed exclusively for GUESS by Jeanologia—is reinventing this iconic style with a sustainable, modern twist. By using air instead of conventional methods, AIRWASH™ eliminates the need for pumice stones and dramatically reduces water and energy usage. No toxic chemicals, zero stones, and energy savings.

GUESS AIRWASH™ relies on three different technologies that were created to mimic traditional denim washing techniques, without the harmful side effects.

- 1 LASER DISTRESSING**
Which replicates the worn jeans look. Laser technology uses infrared light to etch off a layer of cotton and color from the denim, creating the distressed look.
- 2 E-FLOW**
Turning fog into nano-bubbles, which are then used to control shrinkage and achieve a soft feel with zero environmental discharge.
- 3 OZONE**
We use air from the atmosphere to treat garments by reacting with fiber dyes, giving them a worn look while also cleaning any residual indigo re-deposition and controlling the cast of the fabric.

Closing the Loop: The Future of Circular Strategies & Packaging

We recognize that the materials we choose are a key part of our environmental footprint. From sourcing raw fibers to the final stages of a product's life, every step in the lifecycle matters. As regulations worldwide increasingly call for a transition to a circular economy, we're stepping up to meet these expectations by rethinking how we create and manage our products to minimize waste and reduce our impact on the planet.

We're focused on extending the life of our garments through purposeful design, enhanced durability, and expanded programs for reuse and recycling. Our goal is to keep materials in use longer, reduce our reliance on virgin resources, and keep more textiles out of landfills. This is a vital step in building a more circular future for fashion—one that aligns with our commitment to environmental responsibility and meets the evolving expectations of the GUESS community around the world.

RESOURCED, our takeback program, lets customers recycle unwanted apparel from any brand at our North American and select European retail locations to reduce textile waste.

In 2024, we expanded our recycling efforts by launching the GUESS Again program, powered by SuperCircle—an innovative, tech-driven reverse logistics platform.

This initiative empowers our customers to recycle pre-owned clothing from any brand, supporting a broader circular economy across the retail industry. Available online in the U.S., customers can easily request a shipping label through the GUESS website to send in unwanted garments and earn GUESS credits for future purchases. SuperCircle, in partnership with Homeboy Threads, manages the entire process of collecting, sorting, and processing these items to ensure they are responsibly recycled. We also plan to expand the program internationally, furthering our commitment to reducing textile waste and promoting sustainable fashion worldwide.

Our RESOURCED takeback program in all North American and selected European retail locations allows customers to recycle unwanted apparel and footwear of any brand, as part of our drive to increase responsible consumption.

Since 2016, GUESS has collaborated with partners such as Homeboy Threads, Debrand, and Saado Trading Company to manage defective and non-sellable items. These items are sorted and processed for repair and resale, upcycling, or recycling, effectively diverting waste from landfills.

We recognize that packaging materials—such as tissue paper, polybags, hangers, and accessory inserts—are a significant source of waste in our operations. To address this, we are implementing comprehensive strategies aimed at reducing our impact.

The GUESS Responsible Packaging Policy supports this strategy by setting clear guidelines across all divisions to increase the use of recycled and recyclable materials. It prioritizes sustainable sourcing and reinforces our commitment to responsible packaging practices.

In our Apparel Division, we are working toward using 100% recycled and recyclable materials for all primary and secondary packaging item by 2030. Our Accessories Division is focused on transitioning to recyclable materials for product boxes and protective wraps, while also aiming to eliminate single-use plastics.

We require all suppliers to adhere to the GUESS Responsible Packaging Policy and to provide documentation for any certified materials used. This commitment will help us steadily increase the recycled and recyclable content in both primary and secondary packaging.

- 100% product packaging and hangtags to be recycled and recyclable for all GUESS products (including primary and secondary packaging and hangtags) (2030)

Ultimately, our goal is for all primary and secondary packaging to be recyclable, made with certified recycled content, or designed for reuse.

In our retail spaces, we have implemented QR codes as a digital alternative to traditional marketing materials. This not only reduces paper usage but also provides customers with instant access to product information, promotions, and support, enhancing their shopping experience while supporting sustainability.

For consumer packaging, shipping boxes and bags are thoughtfully designed for reuse and are clearly labeled to comply with relevant recycling regulations. These innovative packaging solutions help minimize waste and encourage customers to participate in our circular economy efforts. The North American market is adopting these packaging elements to align with our global sustainability standards, promoting consistency across all regions.

Sustainability is also central to our logistics strategy. We partner exclusively with selected logistics providers who integrate robust ESG goals into their operations. To improve efficiency and reduce environmental impact, we have introduced innovative shipping options such as lockers and flexible pick-up/drop-off points, helping to optimize "last-mile" delivery.

Our own transport policies prioritize sustainability: we aim to ship predominantly by sea, limiting air freight to exceptional cases that require the highest-level approval. Shipping by sea is far more sustainable than air freight because it produces significantly lower greenhouse gas emissions per ton-mile. By choosing sea transport, we dramatically reduce our carbon emissions, helping to lessen our environmental impact and support global efforts to combat climate change.



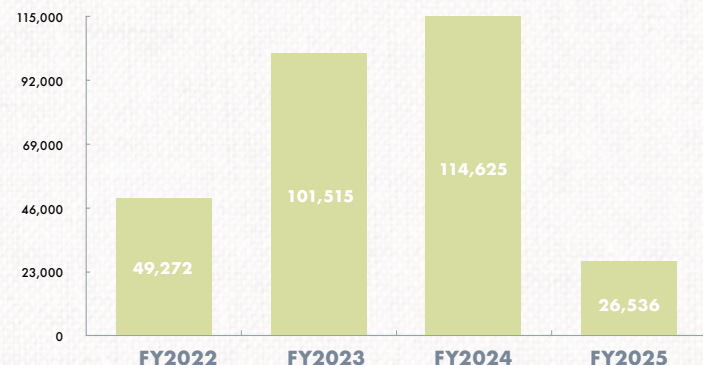
These efforts reflect GUESS's strong commitment to the circular economy and waste reduction—core pillars of our sustainable and responsible business practices.



In FY2025, through our textile recycling, reuse partnerships, and customer takeback schemes, we diverted 26,536 kg of apparel, accessories, footwear, and jewelry from landfills. While the volume of waste diverted from landfills is often seen as a success indicator, it is important to interpret this metric in context. A decreasing volume of diverted waste, as observed in FY2025, can in fact reflect positive operational progress. It may indicate improved inventory planning, reduced product defects, fewer returns, and overall better material efficiency: key achievements aligned with our broader Company strategy.

In this sense, waste diversion is not just about how much we process at end-of-life, but also how well we prevent excess from being generated in the first place. Our aim is not to increase diversion volumes year over year, but to reduce waste generation at the source, while continuing to uphold our commitment to reduce waste to landfill.

CASE STUDY

*On the Cutting Floor:
Reducing Waste*

Our Color & Product Compliance team collaborated with external testing laboratories to run a pilot to ensure fabric and sample scraps after testing have been directed to our recycling partners, thereby preventing their disposal in landfill sites. Although these materials constituted a relatively small proportion of our total waste, this initiative exemplified our commitment to advancing sustainability throughout our operations. In support of these objectives, we established a partnership with DingYuan, a certified textile recycling provider, to manage waste generated within our laboratories. We continue to assess opportunities to optimize the diversion of fabric scraps toward more sustainable pathways, prioritizing fiber-opening processes where feasible and utilizing alternative fuel recovery methods when recycling is not viable.

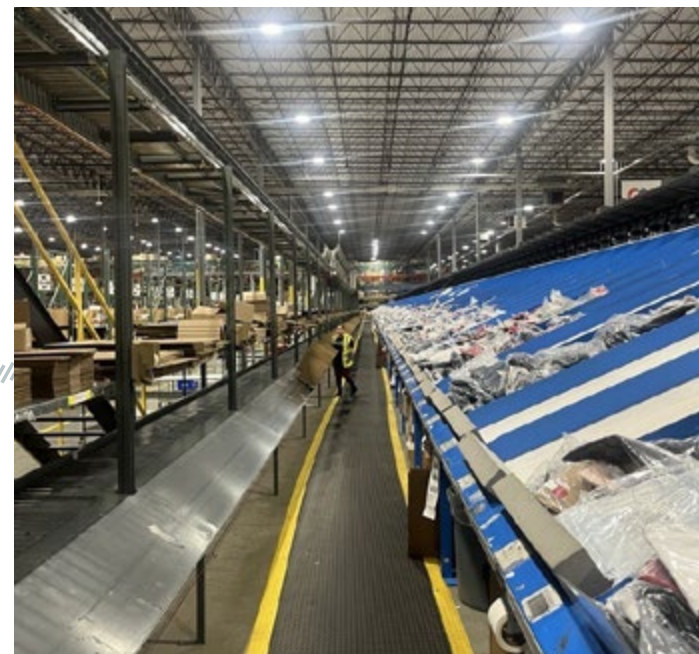
CASE STUDY

Packing with Purpose: My Stock

My Stock is a strategic initiative designed to provide full visibility into the entire product life cycle—from production to customer delivery. This system enables GUESS to track each sales order with precision, ensuring accurate delivery dates can be communicated to customers. By mapping the end-to-end process, My Stock also facilitates the integration of intelligent processes and algorithms aimed at improving operational efficiency.

One key component of this initiative is the “Pick and Pack” module, which focuses on optimizing packaging and fulfillment processes. This module simulates various packing scenarios, taking into account customer requirements, warehouse capacity, and other operational constraints. Its goal is to identify the most efficient scenario—one that minimizes the number of boxes shipped by maximizing box fill rates.

By simply increasing the average number of items per box, we are able to significantly reduce packaging material usage and the total number of shipments. Given the scale of our operations, these incremental improvements generate meaningful environmental benefits over time. This initiative is a clear example of how targeted operational enhancements can drive progress toward our broader sustainability goals.

CASE STUDY

Enhancing Biodiversity through Materials: Regenerative Agriculture

Cotton plays a vital role at GUESS, making up more than half of our total material use. Given its significance, we’re deeply invested in supporting innovative practices and standards that make cotton farming more sustainable. One of the most meaningful ways we measure progress is by seeing the impact firsthand.

In FY2025, our Sustainability & ESG team traveled to Pakistan to visit regenerative cotton fields that supply one of our key manufacturing partners. This supplier is spearheading a large-scale effort to build a regenerative cotton supply chain in Punjab. So far, thousands of farmers across thousands of acres have joined the program, adopting farming practices that help restore the land and improve long-term agricultural outcomes.

Regenerative agriculture is about more than just better farming—it’s about rebuilding soil health, encouraging biodiversity, and creating more resilient ecosystems. As part of the program, farmers receive annual training and hands-on support from agronomists to ensure sustainable practices are applied and maintained.

Importantly, this initiative also puts a strong focus on social responsibility. Measures are in place to improve working conditions, particularly for women. For example, the program prohibits cotton picking during or after pesticide use and ensures pregnant women are not involved in harvesting, protecting their health and well-being.

Witnessing this work up close reaffirmed our belief in the power of sustainability to drive real, lasting change. It’s proof that meaningful progress in cotton production isn’t just possible—it’s already underway.

At GUESS, we recognize that our sustainability goals can only be achieved through strong partnerships and active engagement with our suppliers. We work closely with our entire supply chain to promote responsible practices, reduce environmental impact, and uphold high social and ethical standards.

We actively track environmental performance and risks across our supplier network, setting clear expectations around energy use, greenhouse gas emissions, chemical management, and water stewardship. These criteria are integrated into our supplier onboarding, regular on-site social compliance audits, and ongoing performance reviews to ensure alignment with GUESS's sustainability commitments.

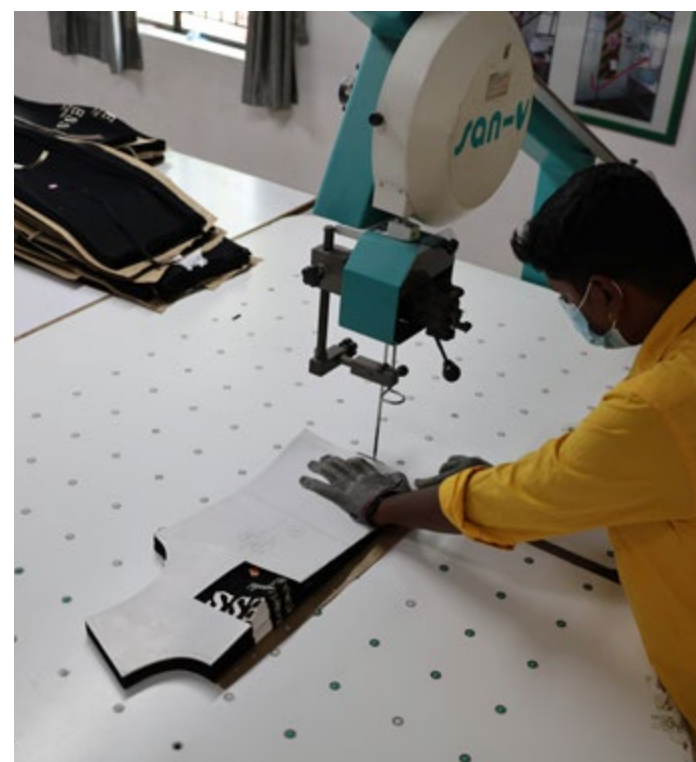


We see our supply chain as a direct extension of who we are. That's why we invest in long-term relationships with our suppliers, working side by side to embed best-in-class environmental and operational standards across their facilities.

Transparency and traceability are central to our approach. We request suppliers share detailed reporting with us on complex issues like wastewater management and chemical use to better understand risks and identify opportunities for improvement. By fostering open communication and sharing best practices, we aim to build capacity and support suppliers in adopting more sustainable processes.

Our influence as a global brand allows us to leverage scale and expertise to drive collective progress. We provide continuous training and technical assistance that empowers suppliers to innovate and improve their environmental and social performance. This partnership approach creates a culture of accountability and shared responsibility throughout our supply chain.

Ultimately, we believe that sustainability is not only about managing risks but also about creating long-term value for communities, the environment, and our business. By engaging our suppliers as active partners, GUESS is building a resilient and responsible supply chain ready to meet the challenges of today and tomorrow.



CASE STUDY

Industry Engagement: Venice Sustainable Fashion Forum

GUESS actively participated in the 2024 edition of the Venice Sustainable Fashion Forum, an event dedicated to discussing sustainability in the fashion supply chain. The forum offers a distinctive platform for brands, institutions, and experts to explore the implications and complexities of achieving a just and sustainable transition—particularly its impact on competitiveness, production, and revenue. By fostering collaboration, it helps organizations identify key challenges, create strategic roadmaps, and initiate effective transformations grounded in scientific, measurable evidence.

We are proud to have been active members of the 2024 Venice Sustainable Fashion Forum Advisory Board, represented by our Senior Director Internal Audit, Global Sustainability & ESG, alongside other sustainability leaders from major fashion brands and institutions. Ahead of the forum, The European House – Ambrosetti released the third edition of “Just Fashion Transition 2024”, with contributions from the Advisory Board. The 3rd edition examines the fashion sector's evolutionary trends through 2030 and assesses the effectiveness of corporate sustainability commitments. The study highlights the key challenges and issues the industry still faces, shedding light on the gap between commitments, actual results, and the work that lies ahead.



Recognizing that these challenges impact various facets of our company, the forum was attended by the GUESS Senior Director of Jewelry, along with senior leadership from the Sustainability & ESG team.

GUESS's ongoing engagement with the Venice Sustainable Fashion Forum reflects our strong commitment to transparency and meaningful industry collaboration. We believe that addressing the fashion industry's short- and long-term challenges requires feasible and equitable solutions—solutions that can only be realized through collective action. A truly just transition is only possible if we work together.

Training Our Suppliers

Recognizing that education is fundamental to driving sustainable improvements, GUESS has expanded its supplier training programs to provide targeted education on priority compliance issues and emerging challenges. These sessions equip suppliers with practical tools and actionable insights, enabling them to strengthen their internal systems while aligning more closely with GUESS's rigorous expectations.

Our supplier education efforts are guided by our FTME program—Focused, Tailor-Made, and Effective—which ensures that each training initiative responds to specific operational needs and is adapted to the maturity level and risk profile of our partners.

Focused on critical compliance and sustainability priorities—such as working hours, health and safety, chemical management, and responsible sourcing—the FTME program identifies and addresses the most material challenges in each production country or facility type. Trainings are Tailor-Made, meaning they are customized based on our audit findings and suppliers' specific operational contexts. This ensures that each session is relevant and actionable, rather than generic or redundant. Finally, our approach is Effective by design: sessions are delivered leveraging virtual platforms and delivering multilingual content, to ensure broad participation from suppliers across diverse geographies and cultures. Training sessions often involve interactive components, such as real-case exercises and role plays, to ensure stronger engagement and retention.

This framework allows us to move beyond one-size-fits-all approaches, enabling more meaningful capacity building. The FTME approach also promotes continuous improvement by incorporating feedback loops, post-training assessments, and integration with our broader supplier evaluation process.

In fiscal years 2024 and 2025, we delivered a comprehensive series of training sessions under the FTME program addressing critical topics such as our Social Compliance Program, Supply Chain Evaluation Framework, GUESS ECO product requirements and certifications, greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reduction strategies, wages and benefits compliance, and our Human Rights Policy. Through six different sessions, we reached nearly 800 suppliers.

By investing in capacity building, GUESS empowers its supply chain partners to not only meet compliance standards but also embrace continuous improvement and innovation. This collaborative effort strengthens the foundation of a more transparent, responsible, and resilient supply chain.



Preserving Biodiversity Through Responsible Action

While GUESS does not directly procure raw materials, we acknowledge that our reliance on tier 1 suppliers can influence biodiversity outcomes across our supply chain. Indirect environmental impacts—such as deforestation, land degradation, and water pollution—often originate from upstream activities associated with the cultivation and production of raw materials, including cotton, polyester, and manmade cellulosic fibers. Recognizing these connections is a critical step in advancing more sustainable sourcing practices and reducing our overall environmental footprint.

Our material choices are the primary driver of biodiversity impacts across our value chain. As we scale up the use of environmentally preferred materials—such as recycled and organic fibers—we are taking meaningful steps to reduce pressures on ecosystems and natural resources.

In 2024, we conducted a biodiversity and water risk assessment to assess and prioritize areas of highest impact, identifying key hotspots where risks to biodiversity are most significant. These findings form the foundation for future work aligned with the Science Based Targets for Nature (SBTN) framework. Guided by SBTN’s approach, we aim to define measurable outcomes, set science-based targets, and implement actions that address our most material impacts on nature.

Beyond our focus on sourcing more sustainable materials, GUESS is deeply committed to direct engagement in biodiversity conservation and ecosystem restoration. We recognize that protecting and restoring natural habitats is essential not only for preserving biodiversity but also for supporting climate resilience and the well-being of communities dependent on these ecosystems.

To this end, we have established strategic partnerships with reputable organizations, including One Tree Planted and North East Trees, to implement impactful reforestation and urban greening initiatives. Through these collaborations, we contribute to the restoration of degraded landscapes, the protection of endangered habitats, and the enhancement of biodiversity hotspots. Our efforts help sequester carbon, improve soil health, and maintain vital ecosystem services such as water regulation and pollination.

These conservation and restoration programs are designed to complement our broader sustainability strategy by addressing environmental challenges beyond the supply chain. By investing in nature-based solutions, we aim to foster sustainable land-use practices that balance economic development with ecological preservation. We also actively engage with local communities to ensure that these projects support social and economic benefits, promoting long-term stewardship of natural resources.

Through these initiatives, GUESS demonstrates a holistic commitment to biodiversity that extends beyond materials and supply chains—reflecting our belief that protecting the planet’s natural heritage is a shared responsibility requiring collaboration, innovation, and action.

These conservation and restoration programs are designed to complement our broader sustainability strategy by addressing environmental challenges beyond the supply chain.

CASE STUDY

One Tree Planted

The GUESS Foundation has partnered with One Tree Planted, a global nonprofit organization dedicated to global reforestation. One Tree Planted works with local communities, conservation groups, and businesses to restore forests, protect biodiversity, and combat climate change by planting trees in areas that need it most. Their projects focus on restoring natural habitats, improving water quality, and supporting livelihoods through sustainable forest management.

Through this partnership, we have contributed to planting 26,000 trees across North America, Europe, and Asia during FY2024 and FY2025. These efforts help restore vital ecosystems, enhance biodiversity, and strengthen climate resilience in regions impacted by deforestation and land degradation.

CASE STUDY

Across the World: Supporting Reforestation

Through PrintReleaf, an offset global reforestation program, we have contributed to reforestation efforts in diverse ecological regions around the world.

In Romania’s Carpathian Basin, our support has helped restore wind-damaged forests by reintroducing native species like spruce and beech, promoting biodiversity and stabilizing the soil.

In Tanzania’s Pangani River Basin, planted trees are improving watershed health and supporting local agriculture. In Malaysia, our efforts along the Kinabatangan

River have helped reclaim degraded lands, restore wildlife habitats, and provide jobs to local communities.

In North America, we have supported post-wildfire recovery projects in Northern California and British Columbia, where native tree species are being reestablished to rebuild forest ecosystems and reduce future fire risks.

In France’s Normandy-Maine region, our contributions are helping forests recover from insect damage, enhancing the diversity and resilience of these ecosystems.



These actions reflect our broader commitment to biodiversity protection, climate resilience, and restoring balance to the environments our operations—and our industry—inevitably touch.

CASE STUDY

In Our Backyard: North East Trees

GUESS Foundation has helped fund and expand North East Trees’ Native Plant Nursery at Ascot Hills Park, a vital green space where local youth and community members take an active role in growing and nurturing native plants. Further deepening our commitment to environmental and community impact, GUESS Cares and GUESS Sustainability teams joined forces to plant over 50 trees and plants as part of a wildfire resilience effort at Ascot Hills Park in Los Angeles. This initiative not only supports biodiversity, wildfire resilience, and reforestation but also offers hands-on environmental education and fosters a stronger connection between people and nature.

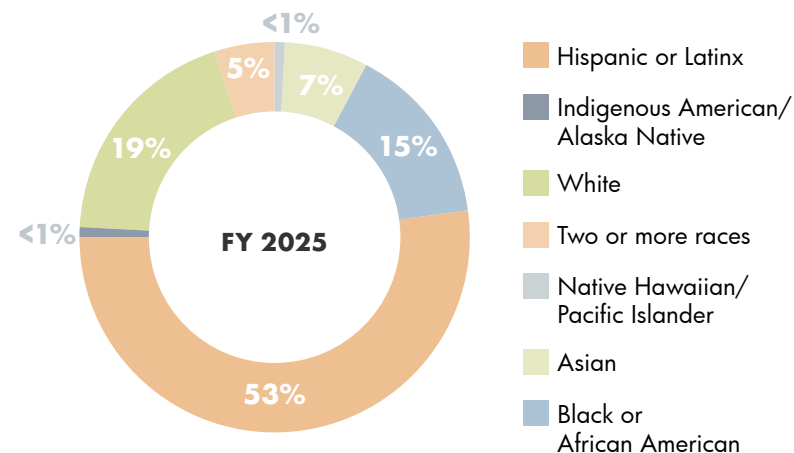

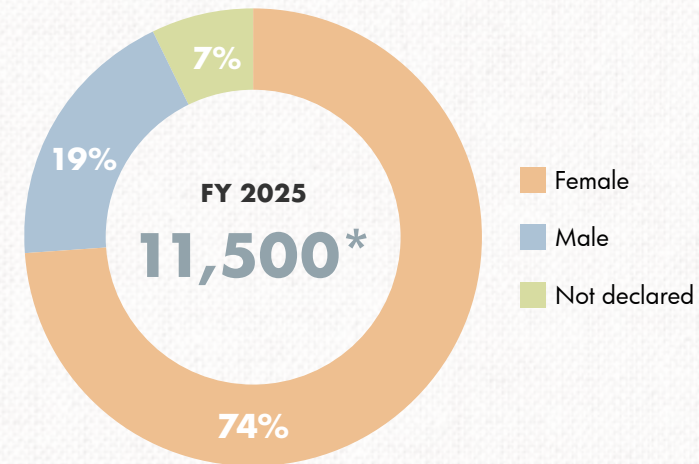

At GUESS, we believe that diversity is not just something to be celebrated—it’s essential to building a stronger, more inclusive company.



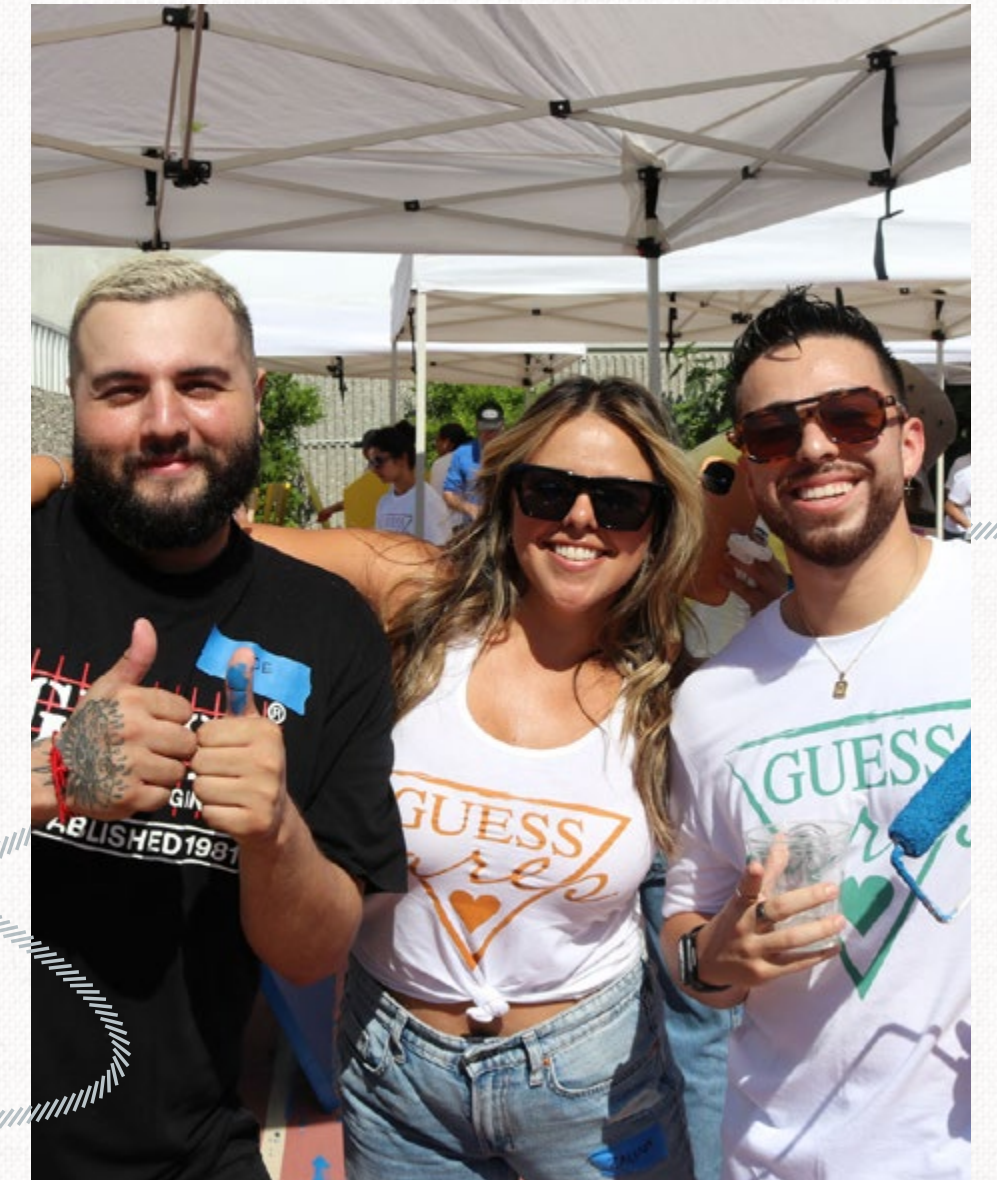
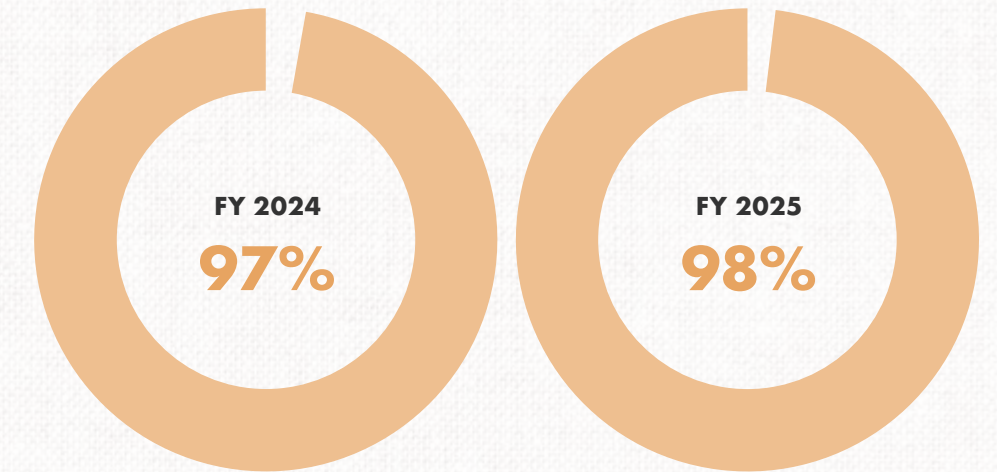
Gender Pay Parity

GUESS firmly believes that all individuals deserve equitable compensation for their contributions, regardless of gender or any other factor. Pay equity is essential not only as a matter of fairness and human rights but also because it fosters a more engaged, motivated, and productive workforce. Ensuring fair pay helps to close systemic gaps, promote diversity, and build trust across our organization.

We have undertaken a thorough review of pay ratios between male and female employees at both corporate and retail levels. These ratios are continuously monitored across all countries where we operate directly, with the exception of Korea and Japan. Additionally, we are actively enhancing our human resource tools to further support our diversity and inclusion initiatives.

We are proud to have maintained global gender pay parity since FY2022—an important milestone that reflects our dedication to fairness, transparency, and equal opportunity for all roles and teams worldwide.

Gyrl Wonder is a dynamic 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to equipping these young women with the tools and opportunities needed to thrive in competitive industries. Their mission encompasses social impact, career exploration, and personal development, ensuring that each participant is prepared to turn her passion into a profession.

Through flagship programs like the Gyrl Wonder Leadership Academy (GWLA), Mentoring Matters, and the Wholistically Me mental health initiative, Gyrl Wonder fosters a comprehensive support system. Mentoring Matters pairs mentees with industry professionals to provide personalized guidance, while Wholistically Me addresses mental health by connecting participants with therapists of color at discounted rates.

Our latest collaboration, the GUESS x Gyrl Wonder capsule collection, features three exclusive pieces custom-designed by the GUESS Originals Team. In a powerful show of commitment, 100% of the proceeds from this collection were donated to Gyrl Wonder, including a dedicated \$15,000 contribution to the IRL Gyrl Wonder Scholarship Fund—further fueling the education and empowerment of these extraordinary young women.

Founded at the intersection of skate culture and social impact, Pushing for Pink empowers young people to get involved in meaningful causes through creative fundraising events, wellness initiatives, and direct service programs.

Building on our commitment to sustainability, we also prioritize the safety and development of our employees by offering a comprehensive, ongoing compliance training program. This program ensures our team remains well-informed and prepared with the latest health, safety, and environmental standards.

Each year, employees engage in detailed training sessions covering key areas such as Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) regulations

and our Injury Illness Prevention Plan, reinforcing a workplace culture centered on safety and well-being.

We also provide learning opportunities focused on soft skills such as communication and language development, along with dedicated managerial training programs to ensure that all managers are equipped with the tools they need to excel in their role and lead with confidence.

Moreover, these trainings extend beyond regulatory compliance, equipping employees with the knowledge and skills to foster safety and sustainable practices both on the job and in their everyday lives—supporting healthier communities and contributing to our broader environmental goals.

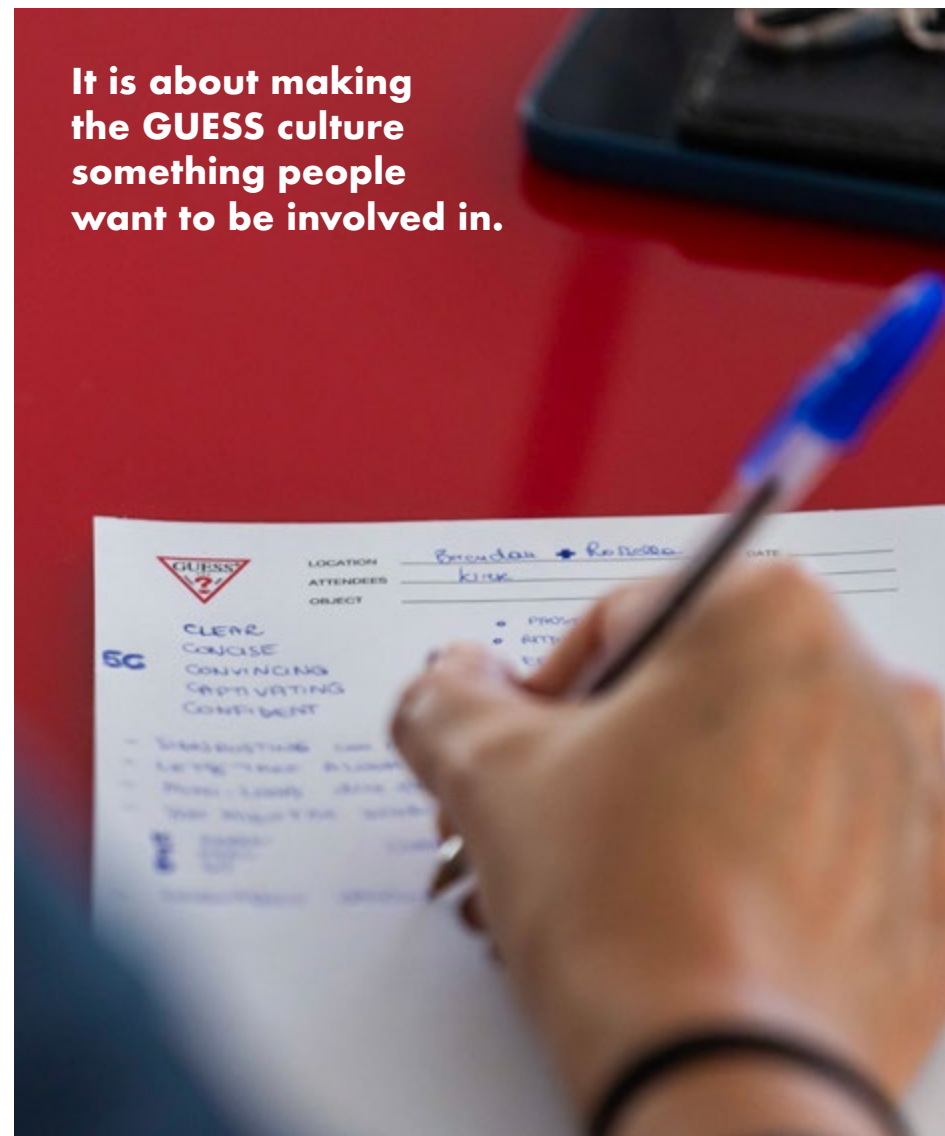
Through this investment in our people, we continue to build a culture of responsibility and continuous improvement that strengthens our sustainability efforts from within.

Recognizing that employee benefits play a crucial role in attracting and retaining talent, we ensure our team members receive appropriate rest and vacation time to maintain a healthy work-life balance.

Furthermore, we offer tailored benefits based on location, including healthcare coverage, parental leave, employee discounts, and retirement provisions. These personalized offerings reflect our commitment to supporting the diverse needs of our workforce while fostering a positive and inclusive workplace.

The initiative provides an innovative and fully confidential support service, offered completely free of charge. It represents a concrete opportunity to promote personal balance and mental, emotional, and physical health within the organization.

Each employee is granted access to a cycle of ten individual online sessions with certified professionals, allowing for a tailored approach to well-being. Available specialists include:

- Psychologist
- Nutritionist
- Sports Coach
- Parenting Counselor
- Expert in Harassment and Gender-Based Violence

Promoting a Culture of Movement and Well-being

As part of the company's ongoing commitment to employee well-being, a new initiative was introduced in July 2024 at Guess Europe's HQ to encourage a healthy and active lifestyle within the workplace.

In collaboration with a local gym, the company organized a series of in-office workout sessions, offering employees the opportunity to engage in physical activity directly within their work environment. The program included a mix of Pilates and Core & Tone classes, held during both lunch breaks and after-work hours, to accommodate different schedules and preferences.

KYDC Transition Assistance

In May 2024, after conducting regular operational reviews and reallocating resources to areas of need, the decision was made to transfer ownership of the Kentucky Distribution Center by Guess?, Inc. The building and property were acquired by GXO, our long-time third-party distribution partner in Europe to further streamline our global supply chain. GXO Logistics, Inc. is an American global contract logistics company that manages outsourced supply chains and warehousing, and reverse logistics for blue-chip customers in over thirty countries.

We implemented a range of support programs over a six-month period to support employees affected by the transition. Those impacted received assistance throughout the process, including one-on-one resumé workshops, outplacement services, severance packages, which included salary continuation and healthcare benefits, and mental health support, among other resources.

Our goal is to equip models with the tools they need not only to succeed professionally but also to thrive personally. We provide access to meaningful resources that promote personal and professional growth, life skills development, and a strong foundation in self-care and overall well-being.

Support is delivered through a blend of virtual workshops, online learning opportunities, and personalized one-on-one counseling—ensuring that every individual has access to guidance tailored to their unique journey.

This year, the Safe Spaces program is expanding to include our corporate offices, ensuring that support is available to any GUESS employee in need. Whether someone is facing the trauma of domestic abuse, coping with personal loss, or navigating a difficult life transition, the Safe Spaces team is here to provide compassionate, confidential assistance. At GUESS, we believe that every team member is part of a broader community grounded in empathy, respect, and shared values. By extending this vital program, we are reinforcing our commitment to fostering a workplace where everyone feels safe, supported, and empowered to seek help when they need it most.

Protecting Rights Throughout Our Supply Chain

A Structured and Responsible Approach

We view strong supplier relationships as the cornerstone of responsible sourcing. Our approach to social responsibility is built on a proactive, structured, and collaborative model that ensures alignment with international labor standards, ethical business conduct, and our own expectations for fair and safe working conditions. This commitment is embedded in both our Supplier Code of Conduct and Human Rights Policy, publicly available at sustainability.guess.com, which all vendors are required to adhere to as a condition of doing business with GUESS.

- Publish and update an interactive multi-tier supply chain map (2025)
- Increase factory employee access to trainings and development opportunities and grievance mechanism (Ongoing)
- Develop training and development opportunities to promote positive change for women (2025)

Rigorous Approvals and Monitoring

The GUESS Social Compliance Program is built on three strategic pillars: rigorous factory approvals, ongoing training and education, and continuous monitoring and remediation. These pillars guide our efforts to ensure safe, fair, and ethical working conditions throughout our supply chain.

Before partnering with any new factory or facility, we conduct an initial assessment call followed by a formal social compliance audit. This process evaluates compliance with critical areas such as labor rights, health and safety, fair wages and benefits, and freedom of association. For facilities located in higher-risk regions, we implement enhanced due diligence measures to verify adherence to specific social and security standards.

Our approach blends trusted third-party social audit frameworks—such as Sedex, BSCI, WRAP, and SA8000—with our own internal GUESS standards. We also review up to two years of audit history to gain a clear, comprehensive understanding of each facility's past performance.

On average, GUESS performs an assessment of each supplier every 12 months. Ongoing monitoring, conducted by independent auditors, not only identifies current risks but also highlights opportunities for meaningful improvement across both social and environmental dimensions—reinforcing our commitment to long-term, sustainable change. 100% of new suppliers were assessed using social criteria in both FY2024 and FY2025.

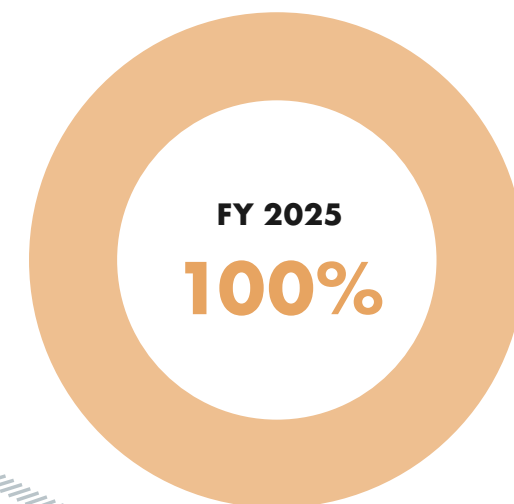
Remediation and Showstoppers

We take a collaborative approach to improving conditions within our supply chain. When instances of non-compliance are identified, we don't immediately sever ties. Instead, we focus on remediation. We work directly with our suppliers to understand the root cause of the issue, set clear improvement goals, and develop a customized Corrective Action Plan (CAP). Each CAP is tailored to the specific challenges of the facility and includes training, ongoing support, and regular follow-ups to monitor progress. We believe this capacity-building approach fosters long-term, sustainable improvement. 100% of suppliers identified as having significant actual and potential negative significant social impacts have agreed improvement plans in place, with 100% corrective action rate for suppliers' labor code, other than showstoppers which are separately addressed.

Indeed, we maintain a strict zero-tolerance policy for the most serious violations—what we refer to as “showstoppers.” These include forced or child labor, human trafficking, harassment or abuse, unsafe working conditions, wage withholding, and discriminatory practices. In such cases, where remediation is not possible or trust has been irreparably compromised, we terminate the business relationship or onboarding process immediately. In both FY2024 and FY2025, we did not have to eliminate any supplier factories from our supply chain due to the presence of any show-stoppers.

Training and Capacity Building

Our commitment to continuous improvement goes beyond compliance. We aim to proactively strengthen our suppliers' capabilities through practical training and support. In FY2024 and FY2025, GUESS continued to provide quarterly targeted training Sessions with a cumulative total of nearly 800 tier 1 suppliers attending these sessions.



GUESS Sustainable Vendor Rating and Vendor Scorecard

Recognizing the impact that our suppliers' environmental performance has not only on the planet but also on the lives of workers, GUESS evaluates environmental performance using the Sustainable Vendor Rating (SVR).

The SVR is a comprehensive evaluation and scoring tool that helps identify potential environmental risks and assesses key indicators such as water management, pollution mitigation, chemical management, process and product certifications, and compliance with legal requirements. It offers a structured methodology for collecting, validating, and analyzing environmental data, allowing GUESS to categorize suppliers based on consistent criteria aligned with our broader ESG strategy.

In FY2025, 96% of new suppliers were screened using the SVR to ensure alignment with our environmental standards from the outset.

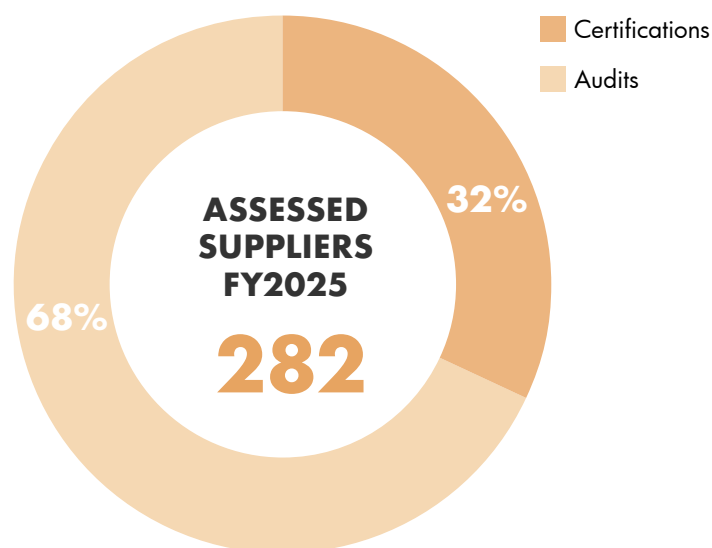
SVR results feed into the GUESS Vendor Scorecard (VSC), which evaluates the overall performance of GUESS core vendors across six key pillars, including quality, operational performance, and ESG metrics. The VSC incorporates both qualitative and quantitative indicators, providing a holistic view of supplier performance. Through this integrated approach, GUESS supports informed sourcing decisions, drives continuous improvement, and promotes accountability throughout the supply chain.

A Culture of Trust and Shared Responsibility

Ultimately, our goal is to build a supply chain where compliance is not just a mandate, but a shared value embraced by all partners. We are committed to fostering an environment rooted in transparency, mutual respect, and open dialogue—because we believe meaningful, lasting impact is only possible through close partnership. Through this work, we aim not only to improve working conditions but also to empower workers by supporting their rights, voices, and well-being.

Workplace Improvements: Beyond Audits

In partnership with Beyond Audits, we launched three innovative capacity building programs aimed at improving employee health, well-being and workplace conditions along our supply chain in India, Myanmar, and Pakistan. Each program is tailored to the cultural, social, and economic realities of the region, veering away from a one-size fits all approach and adapting to the real-world needs of each facilities workforce.

In India, the Connect Program aims to strengthen communication and trust between factory management and the wider work force, particularly between local and migrant employees. The Better Health initiative, launched in Myanmar, focuses on improving workers' understanding

of health, hygiene, and well-being, with a strong emphasis on gender-specific health needs. Lastly, the Better Finance program launched in Pakistan focuses on building financial literacy to enable workers to strengthen their economic resilience and take control of their financial future.

To date all three programs have reached over 7,000 individuals across the three locations, either through direct training provided by Beyond Audit trainers or indirectly through town halls and Training of Trainers (TOT) sessions. Over time, we aim for these programs to become self-sustaining within the facilities, allowing their benefits to continue reaching all workers and staff well into the future.

Fostering Social Inclusion: Progetto Quid

As part of its broader ESG strategy, GUESS continues to invest in partnerships that promote both environmental and social progress. In FY2024, we expanded our collaboration with Progetto QUID, a type B social enterprise based in Verona, Italy, dedicated to empowering individuals—especially women—who have faced significant personal and social challenges, including survivors of violence, discrimination, and exploitation.

Progetto QUID offers these individuals pathways to employment and professional development through the design and production of fashion items made from surplus fabrics. The result is a powerful dual-impact model: reducing textile waste while fostering economic inclusion and dignity.

The partnership led to the launch of a limited-edition capsule collection, entirely made in Italy and developed in close collaboration with QUID's team. The collection embodies both craftsmanship and social value, reflecting GUESS's commitment to inclusive growth and community engagement. Each garment features a signature black-and-white daisy motif—an homage to GUESS's iconic campaigns with Claudia Schiffer and Eva Herzigova—blending the brand's heritage with a purpose-driven vision.

Creating Positive Impact in Communities

We are dedicated to supporting our communities through the GUESS Foundation, our GUESS Cares initiative, and partnerships with organizations that promote social progress, development, and well-being. The GUESS Foundation was established in 1994 in Los Angeles with the mission of fostering social, health and educational opportunities that give people everywhere a chance to live their best lives. While striving to achieve that dream, the Foundation has been able to leverage our strong brand image to support a wide range of causes whose messages promote social change that enhances the well-being and development of people everywhere.

The Fondazione GUESS Onlus was established in 2014 by the Italian subsidiary of GUESS, followed by the Spanish iteration in 2016. Together, they represent the natural evolution of the philanthropic spirit that has always characterized GUESS, with a view to best directing resources and organizing activities that align with our vision. A particular focus has been to support women’s anti-violence campaigns.

The GUESS Foundation has partnered with several important philanthropic initiatives like Peace Over Violence for Denim Day, the Make-A-Wish Foundation, St. John’s Health Center and the World Heart Federation, just to mention a few. Through the Foundation, we have also been able to support local initiatives such as the support for victims of the LA fires in 2025.

The commitment to “continue to give back to the community, support humanity, and protect the environment” is embedded in our mission statement. We are always looking for ways to increase engagement in the communities in which we work and live. This approach is exemplified by our GUESS Cares program, an employee-led philanthropic initiative. GUESS Cares is about employees giving back, including volunteering, fundraising, and donations.

Embracing Influence: GUESS ECO Events

Throughout FY2024-2025, GUESS continued to expand its positive impact through curated local influencer events, designed to spark conversations around sustainability and foster community engagement. In the US, highlights included the GUESS ECO Staycation in West Hollywood, and the GUESS ECO Getaway in Miami, immersive experiences that celebrated our GUESS ECO collection and low impact living. Additional events like the GUESS ECO Denim Event and a hands-on pottery workshop deepened connections with creators in Los Angeles.

In Europe and Asia, GUESS hosted events in key markets including Berlin and the Philippines, where the GUESS ECO x Gourmet Farms experience showcased the intersection of sustainable agriculture and fashion. These activations not only increased brand visibility across diverse audiences but also amplified the brand’s sustainability messaging through authentic, localized storytelling. By partnering with regional creators who share a passion for the planet, GUESS is building momentum and driving collective action toward a more sustainable future.

CASE STUDY

Supporting Victims of the LA fires

The GUESS Foundation contributed to the California Community Foundation’s (CCF) Wildfire Recovery Fund, a vital initiative that has raised over \$30 million to aid communities affected by devastating wildfires. The fund supports nearly 200 nonprofit organizations that provide critical services, including emergency shelter, disaster relief, mental health support, and long-term recovery programs for displaced families and individuals across California.

Additionally, through our ongoing partnership with Baby2Baby—a national nonprofit that provides children living in poverty with basic necessities—we gave our customers the opportunity to make a difference by donating at checkout. Baby2Baby distributes essential items such as diapers, clothing, blankets, hygiene products, and school supplies to families impacted by poverty, natural disasters, and emergency situations. Together, we helped deliver immediate relief and restored dignity to thousands of families in need. Through product and in-kind donations, GUESS provided brand-new clothing for children and adults to resource centers, schools, and nonprofit organizations across Los Angeles.

Employees at our Los Angeles headquarters came together to support wildfire relief efforts by donating blankets, jackets, and pet supplies. Many also volunteered their time at local resource centers, contributing directly to CORE’s community relief initiatives. CORE (Community Organized Relief Effort) is a nonprofit organization that specializes in crisis response, providing essential services such as emergency aid, COVID-19 testing and vaccination, and disaster relief to underserved and vulnerable communities. During the wildfires, CORE mobilized to deliver supplies, coordinate logistics, and support affected families with vital resources on the ground.

To further support those impacted, we provided onsite store vouchers to individuals affected by the fires, including GUESS employees with family or friends in need. As part of a broader outreach effort, we also included store vouchers in 200 teen gift bags distributed at the Oscars Gifting Lounge, extending additional support and comfort to young wildfire victims during a difficult time.

We have supported the Violence Intervention Program (VIP) since 2012, standing by their mission to provide essential care for individuals and families affected by violence. VIP offers a comprehensive range of services, including medical treatment and mental health support to case management, all designed to help survivors heal, rebuild, and thrive as they move toward a brighter, stronger future.

Each year, the GUESS Cares program unites our LAHQ associates for an annual Thanksgiving Meal Pack event, where we come together to fill meal kits with all the traditional holiday essentials. These meal kits, along with grocery gift cards, are generously donated to families supported by VIP, helping to bring comfort to those overcoming abuse, neglect, and trauma.

In both FY2024 and FY2025, GUESS Cares proudly donated over 6,000 units of clothing to VIP's network, continuing our commitment to supporting communities in need.

Mentoring with Circularity in Mind: Otis College

GUESS YC Design Director, Amy Enuke, led a mentorship project with 15 students from the Junior Fashion Design class at the Otis College of Art & Design in Los Angeles. The project brought sustainability to the forefront by incorporating circular design principles, where students worked with recycled clothing from Homeboy Threads and surplus fabrics sourced directly from the GUESS supply chain. From initial concept to final design, students were challenged to create original swimwear looks, with a unique twist: the cover-ups had to be crafted entirely from repurposed materials. After eight months of hard work and creative development, the students proudly showcased their innovative designs in a runway show, highlighting the skills and knowledge they gained throughout the process.

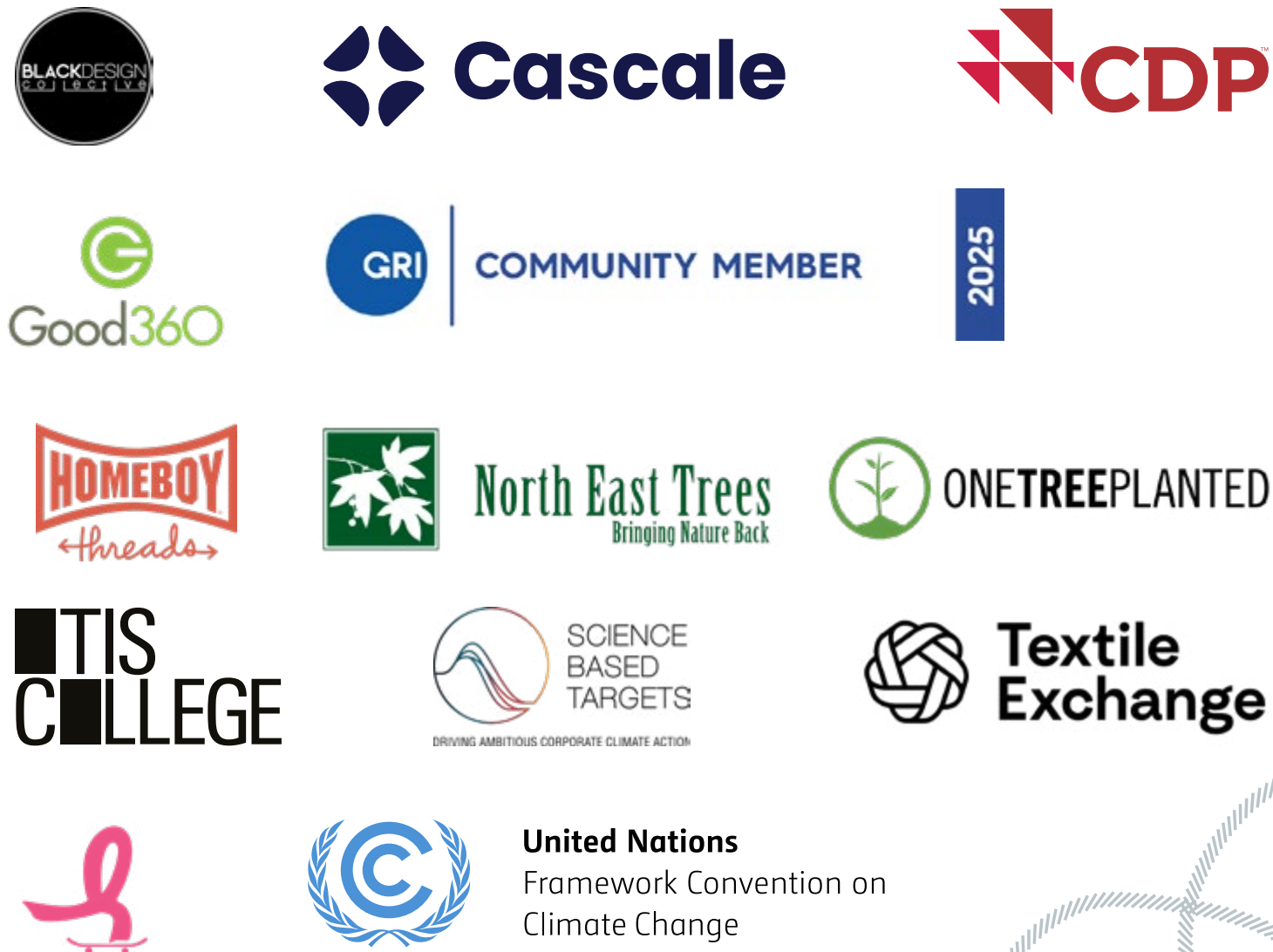
Bold Industry Change Starts with Strong Partnerships

Driving sustainability in the fashion industry requires a shared commitment to transparency, collaboration, and accountability. That’s why we actively align with globally recognized platforms and multi-stakeholder initiatives that promote responsible business practices, climate leadership, and ethical supply chains. These partnerships not only advance our goals—they also create a shared forum for exchanging best practices, fostering innovation, and accelerating collective impact across the industry.

We are proud to be participating in the Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi), having set and received approval

for ambitious targets to reduce our corporate and supply chain GHG emissions by 2030. Since 2020, we have also been active members of Textile Exchange, a global nonprofit working to accelerate the adoption of environmentally preferred materials and drive positive climate outcomes in the textile sector.

As part of our ongoing commitment to climate action, GUESS was a founding signatory to the UNFCCC Fashion Industry Charter for Climate Action, joining collaborative working groups to help implement its principles across our operations and value chain.



We are also long-standing members of Cascale (formerly the Sustainable Apparel Coalition), supporting the use of the Higg Index to measure and manage environmental and social impacts across our supply chain. A significant portion of our suppliers consistently complete the Higg Facility Environmental Module (FEM) annually, demonstrating their commitment to sustainable practices. At the same time, GUESS completes the Higg Brand & Retail Module (BRM) to thoroughly evaluate and continuously improve our performance in key areas such as packaging, logistics, and chemical management—ensuring we uphold the highest standards of environmental responsibility.

We submitted our first CDP Climate Change Report in 2018 and achieved Leadership status the following year. We continue to report annually, and, in 2024, we were very proud to be recognized by CDP as being among the top performing companies for supplier engagement on climate change.

Additionally, we are part of the Global Reporting Initiative Community, supporting the GRI mission of empowering decision-makers through transparent, multi-stakeholder sustainability reporting frameworks.

Aligning Our Strategic Goals: UNFCCC

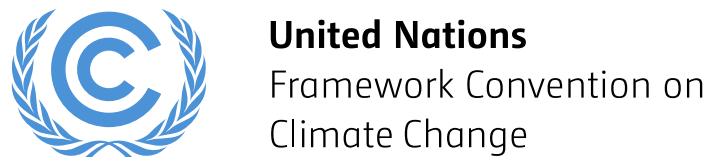
Guess?, Inc. was a founding signatory of the UNFCCC Fashion Industry Charter for Climate Action, an initiative launched at COP24 in 2018 to align the fashion industry with the goals of the Paris Climate Agreement. As part of its commitment, GUESS pledged to reduce its absolute Scope 1 and 2 greenhouse gas emissions by 50% by fiscal year 2030, using fiscal year 2019 as the baseline, and to cut its Scope 3 emissions from purchased goods and services by 30% within the same timeframe.

The Fashion Industry Charter for Climate Action brings together a diverse network of stakeholders across the apparel value chain to accelerate collective progress toward the goals of the Paris Agreement. As a founding signatory, GUESS plays an active role in this multi-stakeholder platform, working alongside brands, suppliers, material producers, logistics providers, and policy advocates to develop scalable, science-based climate solutions.



Through its participation in the Charter, GUESS helps co-develop industry tools, share best practices, and advocate for stronger climate action frameworks. These workstreams have enabled the company to deepen supplier engagement, improve material sourcing, and strengthen internal alignment around low-carbon innovation.

By contributing to shared resources within the Charter and engaging in policy dialogues hosted through the initiative, GUESS reinforces its commitment to collaboration and transparency. This partnership also informs the company's internal roadmap, supporting its transition to renewable energy, promoting lower-impact fiber sourcing, and guiding its efforts to align with the Science-Based Targets initiative.

Creating Jobs in our Community: Homeboy Threads

In 2022, GUESS launched a customer trade-in program for used apparel at all U.S. GUESS, Marciano by Guess, and Factory Outlet stores to keep these items out of landfills. To responsibly sort and recycle the collected textiles, GUESS partnered in 2023 with Homeboy Threads, a certified social enterprise committed to creating jobs and second chances through professional reuse and recycling services. This collaboration exemplifies GUESS's commitment to partnering with local businesses that align with our sustainability goals and strengthen communities.

As part of Homeboy Industries, the world's leading gang rehabilitation and re-entry organization, Homeboy Threads proudly trains and employs individuals transforming their lives after incarceration. Their expertise lies in the essential, yet often overlooked, work of sorting, grading, and pre-processing textiles—critical steps that bring circularity and sustainability goals to life.

Whether serving as a comprehensive one-stop solution or a collaborative partner within a larger sustainability initiative, Homeboy Threads emphasizes exceptional transparency, tailored solutions, and profound social impact. They are committed to ensuring that every textile finds its most sustainable and purposeful destination.

By partnering with Homeboy Threads, we work hand-in-hand to develop customized strategies aligned with our unique sustainability objectives. Their deep expertise and unwavering commitment to social responsibility give us confidence that the fabrics we process will be repurposed thoughtfully, responsibly, and with lasting impact.

Bijenkorf in the Netherlands, part of the Selfridges Group, has set a clear target: it ultimately aims to only sell brands that demonstrably incorporate sustainability practices. This includes criteria around materials, circularity, and fair labor practices. The Selfridges Group also introduced its Project Earth framework, pushing for more rigorous sustainability benchmarks across all group retailers.

Galeries Lafayette's Go for Good initiative highlights products that meet strict environmental and societal criteria. Galeries Lafayette requires us to keep all the proofs of the Go For Good criteria for each product to be able to justify it at any moment.

These examples clearly demonstrate the importance of ensuring a two-way flow of ideas and information. As sustainability standards evolve, there's much we can learn from one another. It's essential that we put the right processes in place—collaborative tools, transparent communication, and shared best practices—to continuously improve and move forward together.

Fostering Trust with Ethical Business, Marketing, and Privacy Practices

We have a clear responsibility in how we communicate with our customers and consumers. The way we market our products must be both careful and thoughtful, with a strong focus on transparency and credibility. This is especially critical when it comes to sustainability claims, where trust is easily lost if messaging does not align with actual impact.

It's essential that we support our products with verified and relevant sustainability documentation across all our brands. This is particularly important for collections such as GUESS ECO, Consciously Constructed, and GUESS JEANS, where the sustainability story is central to the product's value proposition. Every supporting document must be authentic, and every message should reflect our genuine commitment to responsible practices.

To ensure consistency and compliance, we adhere to global regulations that set the criteria for the information included on apparel product labels as our minimum standard. This approach reinforces our commitment to transparency and supports our goal of encouraging more sustainable shopping behaviors.



Ultimately, clear and credible communication not only reinforces consumer trust—it also strengthens our brand integrity and supports our broader sustainability goals.

We need to provide transparent details about the materials we use and how they are sourced, the manufacturing processes involved, and the transportation methods for our products. It is important to let consumers know exactly what is inside every product. By labeling our products accurately and clearly, we empower customers to make responsible and informed purchasing decisions.

We have clear internal guidelines, "Eco Fibers & Product Public Facing Claims," which provide specific guidance on the claims we can make about the GUESS ECO, Consciously Constructed brand, and across our conventional GUESS branded goods that contain environmentally preferred fibers and materials.

- Review company marketing and advertising materials and develop plans to ensure diverse representation (Ongoing)
- Continuously improve the current data protection policies to promote sustainable business practices by avoiding costly data breaches that can harm GUESS and our clients (Ongoing)
- Maintain a global "Bug Bounty Program" to incentivize the identification and reporting of potential security vulnerabilities (Ongoing)
- Achieve ISO/IEC 27001 certification, focusing on the protection of customer and employee personal data across GUESS operations (2026)
- Maintain a company-wide cybersecurity training program to ensure all GUESS employees receive the necessary education to safeguard personal and company data and reduce cyber risks (Ongoing)

Educating Customers

We are also constantly reviewing and enhancing how sustainability information is presented to consumers, both online and in-store. Digital product descriptions provide an ideal space to share detailed information about materials and manufacturing processes. Additionally, we are exploring lower-impact online alternatives to traditional printed hang tags by linking direct product information, reducing waste while maintaining transparency.

In our physical retail environments, we support responsible purchasing decisions through targeted in-store messaging, including fitting-room signage, visual merchandising, and high-visibility displays such as LED screens that communicate our overarching ESG story in flagship locations. We also collaborate closely with our wholesale partners to ensure consistent and credible communication of product sustainability attributes at every customer touchpoint.



Our Code of Ethics

At the heart of our business lies an unwavering commitment to the highest ethical standards, embodied in our Code of Ethics—a foundational guide that shapes every decision and interaction across our organization. This commitment extends beyond internal practices, influencing how we collaborate with suppliers and partners worldwide, respecting regional nuances while maintaining a unified standard.

Fostering trust is essential to building strong, lasting relationships, and our Code of Ethics is the cornerstone of that trust. Every new associate is required not only to read but actively engage with the Code to fully understand its principles. This ensures that every team member is empowered to act with integrity and accountability in their daily work.

Our Code clearly defines our expectations on crucial matters such as personal responsibility, managing conflicts of interest, safeguarding confidentiality, and upholding respectful treatment of all employees. By living these principles, we create a culture where trust is earned and sustained—the very foundation of our success and reputation.



CASE STUDY

*Listening to the Next Generation:
A Strategic Dialogue with Gen Z – GenZ Lab*

As part of the company’s broader innovation and customer-centricity strategy, a unique initiative was launched to engage directly with Gen Z customers, aiming to better understand their preferences, values, and behaviors.

In May 2024, in our Lugano HQ we hosted two workshop days that brought together students aged between 18 and 25, enrolled in diverse European universities and coming from varied academic backgrounds. Through a design thinking workshop, managers and participants collaborate in a dynamic setting, co-creating ideas and receiving real-time feedback from the younger generation.

The initiative is structured to encourage creativity, innovation, and open dialogue, offering a space where students and professionals connect and create digital content side by side. A highlight of the workshop was a hands-on photo studio activity, in which students developed at least three video contents, working directly with Guess managers and selected influencers/content creators.



By combining strategic business insights with the authentic voices of Gen Z, the program not only fosters the development of practical digital skills but also acts as a bridge between generations—enabling the company to stay relevant and forward-thinking in an ever-evolving market landscape.

Securing Data

Data protection has always been at the core of GUESS’s information security strategy because safeguarding personal and business data is essential to building and maintaining trust with our customers and partners. For consumers who choose our products, knowing their personal information is secure brings peace of mind and confidence in their relationship with our brand. Protecting this trust means continuously strengthening our defenses—not only to shield our customers from harm but also to prevent costly data breaches that can damage our reputation and relationships.

To uphold this commitment, we have launched a global initiative to implement cutting-edge technologies designed to elevate our security standards and enhance control over sensitive data. Alongside this, we have introduced a comprehensive cybersecurity awareness and training program, empowering every employee and collaborator worldwide to act as vigilant guardians of our data.

In today's rapidly evolving digital landscape, cyber threats constantly change and grow more sophisticated. That's why it's critical for us to continuously enhance our systems, processes, and training—ensuring we stay one step ahead to protect our customers and the integrity of our brand. By proactively investing in data protection and fostering a culture of security awareness, we reinforce the trust our customers place in us—because trust is not given; it is earned through consistent and responsible action.

Our dedicated Security Operating Center (SOC) service has strengthened and widened our capacity to identify potential cyber threats and respond rapidly. Our security staff works with the IT Operations department to optimize the organization's IT resources, which includes streamlining all software, data flows, and systems to improve infrastructure security.

Cybercrime never sleeps, and we fully recognize our responsibility to ensure people can trust us to look after their information. We have, therefore, implemented a range of measures, including continuous monitoring and data minimization practices. Our Global Cybersecurity Awareness and Training Program reaches employees, contractors, and key stakeholders in every region in which we operate. In addition, our information security program is based on internationally recognized standards such as the ISO/IEC 27001:2022 and the NIST Cybersecurity Framework, which are well-suited to our current and future needs as they emphasize the integration of security controls with privacy considerations and support a process of continuous improvement.

We have comprehensively transformed our global Privacy Governance model, further embedding legal and ethical accountability into our core operations, based on the guiding principle of protecting the individual behind the information. Our Privacy Governance Framework is fully aligned with applicable European legislation, most notably the GDPR, which remains the global benchmark for data protection. It also incorporates internationally recognized standards, including key ISO certification elements. And the model has been localized to meet country-specific regulatory requirements, particularly labor laws and user protection norms.

We have appointed an external, independent, international law firm as Group Data Protection Officer (DPO) to provide high level of impartial oversight and specialized guidance, building on our extensive in-house experience.

CASE STUDY

The Bug Bounty Program

At GUESS, we take a proactive and transparent approach to strengthen cybersecurity in our organization. Through our ethical hacking and bug bounty programs, we intentionally allow hackers to test our systems and identify potential vulnerabilities. While it may seem counterintuitive, this strategy enables us to uncover and address weaknesses before they can be exploited. By rewarding those who responsibly report issues, we gain critical insights that help us reinforce our defenses. This commitment to continuous improvement not only improves our cybersecurity readiness but also reflects our broader values of openness, accountability, and commitment towards continued improvement.

How to Use This Data and Disclosures Section

At GUESS, we strive to meet our ESG commitments by listening to our stakeholders and acting in ways that support people, communities, and protecting the environment. Transparent and clear reporting on environmental, social, and governance (ESG) issues is a key part of this commitment.

We publish a detailed ESG Report every two years to provide comprehensive and comparable information on our ESG performance and progress to a wide range of stakeholders. This ESG Report covers fiscal years 2024 and 2025. It includes key performance indicators (KPIs) across our ESG strategy, supported by recognized international reporting frameworks to ensure clarity, transparency, and comparability.

To ensure year-round transparency, we also maintain up-to-date ESG data and disclosures on our website at sustainability.guess.com, and we provide information regularly to ESG rating and benchmarking agencies.

In this section of the ESG Report, we outline our ESG reporting approach, including a description of the double materiality assessment we use to identify and prioritize the ESG topics, and support our ESG strategy.

We have used well-established ESG reporting frameworks to support a structured and consistent way of displaying the data in a way that allows comparable analysis, against previous years and against industry best practice.

We have provided detailed insights of our ESG performance in accordance with the standards of the Global Reporting Initiative in the GRI Report, and provided sector specific disclosures in accordance with the Sustainability Accounting Standards Board (SASB) reporting guidelines in the SASB Report. We have adhered to the Greenhouse Gas Protocol for all emissions data calculations and presented the associated methodologies used and reporting boundaries applied. We have also presented a selection of Supplemental KPIs and other internal KPIs that provide additional insight into our ESG performance.

Finally, we have obtained external assurance on Management’s Assertion.

The metrics and disclosures included in the GRI Report have been prepared in accordance with the Global Reporting Initiative (“GRI”) Standards (2021).

The metrics and disclosures included in the SASB Report have been prepared in accordance with the SASB Apparel, Accessories & Footwear Sustainability Accounting Standard (2023-06), and the Multiline and Specialty Retailers & Distributors Sustainability Accounting Standard (2023-06) – collectively referred to as the “SASB Standards”.

The Scope 1, 2 and 3 Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions, along with the related methodological statements, have been prepared in accordance with the Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Protocol, developed by the World Resources Institute (WRI) and the World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD). This includes both the GHG Protocol: A Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard (Revised Edition) and the GHG Protocol Scope 2 Guidance, which serves as an amendment to the Corporate Standard – collectively referred to as the “GHG Protocol”.

The metrics and disclosures included in the Supplemental key performance indicators (“KPIs”) section have been prepared in accordance with the criteria outlined therein.

The Scope 1, 2, and 3 GHG emissions, along with the related methodological statements, the metrics and disclosures included in the GRI and SASB Reports, and the Supplemental KPIs section presented in this ESG Report are collectively referred to as our “Key ESG Metrics and Disclosures”.

We take responsibility for the completeness, accuracy, and validity of our Key ESG Metrics and Disclosures. Management is accountable for the collection, quantification, and presentation of these metrics and disclosures and for the selection of the criteria, which we believe provide an objective basis for measuring and reporting on the Key ESG Metrics and Disclosures.

Estimation Uncertainty

Measurement of certain metrics and disclosures includes estimates and assumptions that are subject to inherent measurement uncertainty resulting, for example, from accuracy and precision of conversion and other factors. The selection by management of different, but acceptable measurement methods, input data, or assumptions may have resulted in materially different amounts or metrics being reported.

We are committed to transparently reporting our progress against our ESG Goals and recognized sustainability standards. By applying our Sustainability Assurance Framework and obtaining third-party assurance, we are holding ourselves to higher standards, which in turn provides stakeholders with increased confidence in our Key ESG Metrics and Disclosures. Internal Audit

Our Internal Audit team has reviewed our FY2024-2025 metrics and data for completeness and accuracy, including the methodology and calculations. The GUESS Internal Audit team operates under an Internal Audit Charter approved by the Board of Directors Audit Committee that defines the Internal Audit team's purpose, as well as its authority, responsibility, and independent position within the organization.

Third-party assurance

In addition, KPMG performed an examination engagement over Management's Assertion as of and for the fiscal years ended February 3, 2024 and February 1, 2025 described above under the "Management's Assertion" section and issued a reasonable assurance report. Please see Independent Accountants' Examination Report.

For the avoidance of doubt, forward-looking information, including our commitments, targets, and goals, as well as any aspirational statements, were not subject to KPMG LLP's assurance. Additionally, any information referred to via hyperlinks in the Data and Disclosures section of this report was not subject to assurance by KPMG.

Key ESG Metrics and Disclosures figures reported throughout this report that relate to periods prior to the current reporting scope are subject to KPMG's previous examination engagement. For further details, please refer to the Independent Accountants' Examination Report on page 80 of the GUESS ESG Report Fiscal Years 2022–2023.

Reporting Scope

The metrics and disclosures in the Data and Disclosures section of this ESG Report cover the periods from January 29, 2023 to February 3, 2024 (FY2024) and from February 4, 2024 to February 1, 2025 (FY2025). The frequency of ESG reporting is biennial.

Selected prior period information has been presented for comparative purposes only. Any statements or references to dates that don't include "FY" follow the calendar year.

For the purposes of this ESG Report, GUESS business operations are grouped into the following segments: Guess US, Guess Canada, Guess Europe, and Guess Asia. Any reference to "GUESS" refers collectively to Guess US, Guess Canada, Guess Europe, and Guess Asia, unless otherwise indicated.

The scope of this ESG Report covers corporate offices, distribution centres, warehouses, retail stores and other locations directly operated by GUESS. Data for licensee operations, third parties to which GUESS grants the right to manufacture, distribute, or sell GUESS branded items are not included in this report. We have selected this scope based on the availability of reliable data. We continue to increase the scope of our coverage over time.

Unless noted otherwise, data presented in this report includes the entities that are consolidated for financial reporting purposes, with the following exceptions:

- Data of Guess Korea and Guess Japan are generally excluded, with the exception of certain metrics about employees and all energy and emissions metrics.
- Joint ventures (JVs) not directly managed by GUESS are generally excluded, primarily due to our limited influence on their operations.

In April 2024, the Company completed its acquisition of rag & bone. GUESS' determination regarding the incorporation of this acquisition into our sustainability information will be made at a later date. The content of this report includes ESG topics determined to be material based on our double materiality assessment (see ESG Materiality). These are topics we manage and monitor, given their significance to GUESS stakeholders and the sustainable growth of the company, as well as the size, number of associates, and overall impact of our largest business units based on revenue.

Targets Aligned to UN SDGs

We set ourselves ambitious targets and are committed to measuring and reporting on our progress in a transparent and meaningful way. Our goals reflect the holistic way we measure and evaluate our responsibility and sustainability efforts, focusing on impact, not only within our own business, but also within the communities in which we operate.

Our targets are aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals of the UN 2030 Agenda.



We align with SDG 6 Clean Water and Sanitation, SDG 7 Affordable and Clean Energy, SDG 12 Responsible Production and Consumption, SDG 13 Climate Action, and SDG 15 Life on Land. We are committed to reducing our carbon footprint through a science-based approach and we incorporate climate-related risks into our business strategy. We are working towards using 100% renewable electricity in our company-operated facilities by 2035. We are committed to applying circular economy principles and we put great emphasis on sourcing responsible materials for our collections. We are committed to water-saving practices in our production and have increased our efforts to protect nature and preserve biodiversity. We also support reforestation efforts through the funding of tree planting projects.



We are committed to looking after our people and we align our approach and activities to SDG 3 Good Health and Well-Being, SDG 5 Gender Equality, SDG 8 Decent Work and Economic Growth and SDG 10 Reduced Inequalities. We provide decent work to our employees and those in our supply chain, and we support diversity and inclusion regardless of race, gender, religion, disability, or sexuality. We promote better health across our supply chain by supporting initiatives that improve workers' understanding of health, hygiene, and well-being, with particular attention to gender-specific health needs. Through our social compliance program, we also ensure the safe and responsible handling of chemicals in production processes. We are committed to reducing inequalities by supporting gender pay parity and enabling access to financial inclusion initiatives within our supply chain. In particular, we focus on ensuring women's full participation in leadership and economic life, providing full and decent work to all, eradicating forced labor, protecting labor rights, and providing safe and secure working environments.



We are committed to an effective governance framework to manage our impacts, and we have embedded accountability throughout our business operations and our reporting. We align our work to SDG 16 Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions and SDG 17 Partnerships for the Goals. In particular, we aim to develop effective, accountable, and transparent institutions at all levels, and to take part in multi-stakeholder partnerships that mobilize and share knowledge, expertise, technology, and financial resources, to support the achievement of the SDGs.

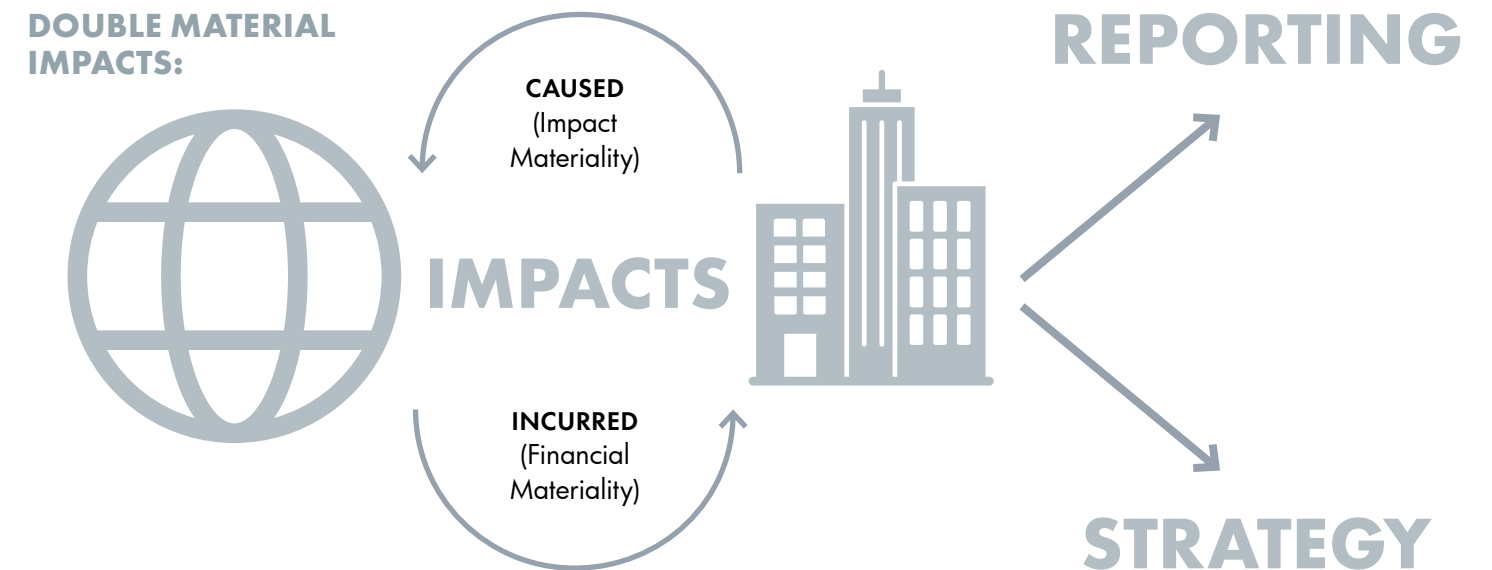

ESG Materiality

Content

In FY2025, GUESS reviewed and validated the material impacts identified during the FY2023 double materiality assessment, in line with our Double Materiality Policy. This review confirmed that no material changes in our organizational or operational structure related to the scope of the ESG Report have occurred during the current reporting period, nor have there been any material changes in external factors that could generate new or modify existing Impact, Risk, and Opportunity (IROs) or affect the relevance of specific disclosures. Consequently, the material topics identified in FY2023 remain current and valid.

In FY2023, we carried out a double materiality assessment to identify, update, and prioritize sustainability topics, and refresh our ESG Strategy. We carried out the assessment working with external sustainability specialists, in line with emerging best practice and regulation in sustainability reporting. The assessment allowed us to identify which topics are material for our company both from an impact perspective – the impacts we have as a company on society and the environment – and a financial perspective – the ESG risks and opportunities our business faces and their potential financial implications.



PEER REVIEW

10 peers were benchmarked to understand ESG priorities, ambition level, industry best practice and overall ESG maturity.

INTERVIEWS

10 interviews were conducted involving 37 stakeholders, both internal and external (incl. Textile Exchange and our main tier 1 supplier for apparel) to gather insights on internal priorities, management capacity, and broader industry trends.

SURVEYS

We ran two surveys involving:

- Over 3,800 customers
- Over 1,100 global employees

RISK ANALYSIS

We reviewed country-level and industry risks using the Risk Horizon platform, which aggregates the most comprehensive global ESG risk data sets.

PRODUCT IMPACT STUDY

We conducted an assessment of our product portfolio in order to identify the greatest impacts across our product categories. The study considered sales data, type of material and life cycle assessments, providing us with data-led insights that can help us better address our impacts.

Our approach considered both actual and potential, and negative and positive impacts on the economy, environment, and people (including impacts on their human rights), across our organization’s activities and business relationships.

We built a multi-tier process, complying with relevant reporting frameworks including the GRI (Global Reporting Initiative) and SASB (Sustainability Accounting Standards Board), and leveraging the double materiality principle in the ESRS (European Sustainability Reporting Standards) when building an updated list of material topics. These frameworks informed our choice of topics for assessment, as did the topics from our past assessment completed in FY2020–2021, and a review of the topics identified and prioritized by a group of ten industry peers and leaders.

To get a data-driven view of impacts in our value chain, we also carried out a quantitative impact study using sales and other data to understand hotspots for environmental and social impacts of our product portfolio. To achieve a deeper understanding of risks and potential financial impacts, we explored global, national and industry-level risk data sets for our key geographies.

The topics identified as potentially material were also used as the basis of interviews with a range of external and internal stakeholders to understand their interests and priorities, and in surveys of customers and colleagues.

With the evidence gathering complete, we carried out a set of workshops with senior stakeholders from across the business, to further explore and test the findings, with separate strands focused on impact and financial materiality. The workshops engaged the GUESS Sustainability & ESG team and senior staff from Audit, Legal, Risk and Finance functions. The assessment was then validated in a final sign-off meeting with our CEO, Carlos Alberini.

Based on the result of the double materiality assessment, we considered a topic to be material if it has at least a significant impact on the business or a significant impact on society and the environment. As shown in the matrix, fourteen of the fifteen topics tested emerged as clearly material to the future performance of GUESS, from both an impact and a financial perspective. One topic – community engagement – did not reach the same level by the process described above and thus was not included in the matrix as material. GUESS nevertheless continues to engage its communities, and will review this topic materiality in future assessments.

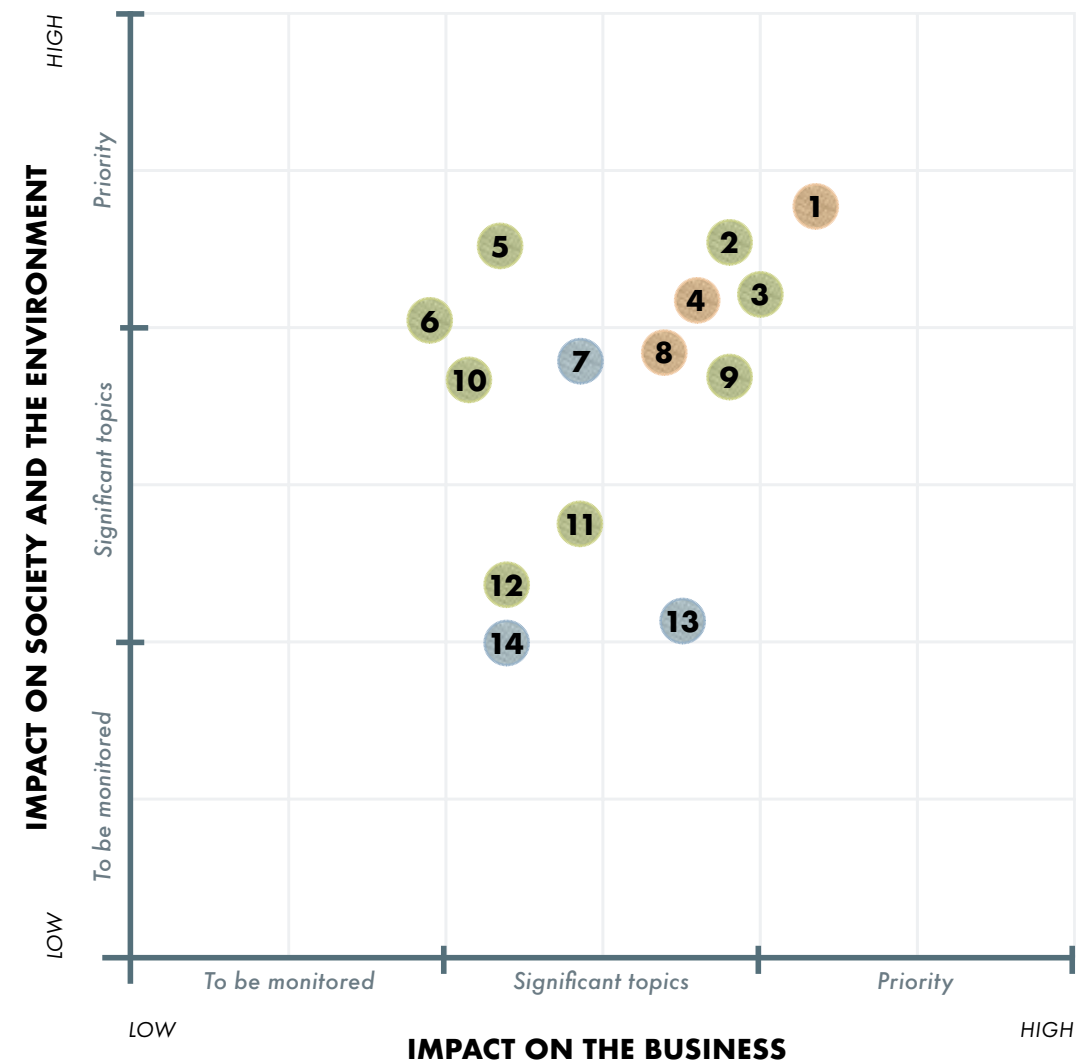
Alignment with Enterprise Risk Management

Risks identified through the double materiality assessment are being incorporated into the GUESS overall enterprise risk management approach and are subject to internal audit procedures, depending on the level of risk assessed. Our Internal Audit team conducts an annual global risk assessment encompassing all of the organization’s business functions. The global risk assessment considers likelihood and impact as a basis for risk management in addition to inherent risk and residual risk. Results of the risk assessment are communicated to the Board of Directors, Audit Committee, Senior Management, and external financial statement auditors, and are used to identify areas of the organization that will be in the scope of Internal Audit activities for the upcoming year.

GUESS is a truly global company, with operations spread around the world. A large assortment of our merchandise is designed at GUESS, then produced by our trusted suppliers with finished items distributed worldwide. We source our apparel, bags, accessories, footwear, and jewelry from our vetted supplier base. We work both directly with vendors and with the factories they own, or subcontract work out to.

By building strong relationships with our suppliers, we are better able to manage sustainability challenges, reduce risk, and support transparency and traceability throughout our supply chain. At GUESS we continue to be committed to helping suppliers implement best practices in safe and fair labor and achieve meaningful improvements in the lives of their workers. These commitments illustrate GUESS' longstanding approach to supply chain responsibility.

During the fiscal years 2024 and 2025, GUESS used respectively 368 and 373 suppliers to produce its products. Of these suppliers most were based in Asia and the remaining were split between EMEA and North and Central America. China, Bangladesh, and India are the three major production countries for GUESS directly sourced apparel, jewelry, and accessories. These three countries represent over 80% of GUESS' annual production volume. Other countries with larger production percentages are Pakistan, Myanmar, Guatemala, Vietnam, and Turkey.

In previous reporting periods they were included in the "Part-Time" category; "Full-Time" refers to associates that work a full week using country-specific definitions of full time. "Part-Time" refers to employees whose working hours are less than the number of working hours for "Full-Time" employees.

There are no significant fluctuations across employees' categories between fiscal years.

▼ In FY2025, GUESS reviewed and validated the material impacts identified during the FY2023 double materiality assessment, in line with our Double Materiality Policy. This review confirmed that no material changes in our organizational or operational structure related to the scope of the ESG Report have occurred during the current reporting period, nor have there been any material changes in external factors that could generate new or modify existing Impact, Risk, and Opportunity (IROs) or affect the relevance of specific disclosures. Consequently, the material topics identified in FY2023 remain current and valid.

The FY2023 double materiality assessment was conducted to identify, update, and prioritize sustainability topics critical to our ESG Strategy. Following our policy, this assessment evaluated both the impacts GUESS has on society and the environment and the financial implications of ESG risks and opportunities. Our approach considered actual and potential impacts—positive and negative—across the economy, environment, and people, including human rights and business relationships.

ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

Our double materiality assessment followed a structured, multi-tier process in accordance with leading reporting frameworks, including GRI (Global Reporting Initiative), SASB (Sustainability Accounting Standards Board), and leveraging the double materiality principle in the ESRS (European Sustainability Reporting Standards). Key steps included:

- Conducting a quantitative impact study using sales and other data to identify environmental and social hotspots in our value chain.
- Analyzing global, national, and industry-level risk datasets to gain insights into financial impacts and risks in key geographies.
- Engaging stakeholders through interviews and surveys to capture their perspectives, including input from internal stakeholders, customers, and employees.
- Facilitating workshops with senior leaders from Legal, Risk, Finance, Internal Audit, and the GUESS Sustainability & ESG team to validate and refine findings, with separate sessions on impact and financial materiality.

INTEGRATION WITH ENTERPRISE RISK MANAGEMENT

In alignment with our Double Materiality Policy, risks identified through the assessment are integrated into GUESS's Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) framework. This ensures that sustainability risks are evaluated alongside financial and operational risks. Results from the ERM process are communicated to the Board of Directors, Audit Committee, Senior Management, and external financial statement auditors to support strategic decision-making and internal audit planning.

STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

Our stakeholders play a central role in shaping GUESS as a company and brand. Engaging with them allows us to strengthen our ESG approach and ensures we remain responsive to evolving stakeholder expectations. External stakeholders include investors, suppliers, industry peers, communities, non-governmental organizations, media, and government agencies. Internal stakeholders, such as customers and associates, are equally valuable due to their close interactions with our brands and operations.

We engage stakeholders on ESG challenges through various channels, including surveys, focus groups, interviews, social media, and direct communications. For instance, we use product communications, ESG Reports, and our website to inform and engage broader audiences, while targeted platforms are used to connect with specific groups. Customers from different demographics, including Heritage, Millennials, and Generation Z, engage with us through tailored media channels. By continuously gathering feedback and sharing information, we ensure our stakeholders' changing perspectives are incorporated into our sustainability journey.

GUESS will conduct the next detailed refresh of its double materiality assessment in the next scheduled cycle or earlier if significant changes occur, reaffirming our commitment to continuous improvement and stakeholder accountability.

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

Labor rights remain a key component of GUESS's sustainability strategy, addressed within our broader focus on supply chain responsibility. As a global brand sourcing products from hundreds of factories across numerous countries, and without owning any manufacturing facilities, we rely on partnerships to ensure that workers throughout our supply chain are treated fairly, paid appropriately, and provided with safe working environments. Our approach integrates social compliance, transparency, training, and industry collaboration to support and uphold labor rights across all tiers of our supply chain.

The individuals impacted by this topic - workers hired and managed by supplier factories—are external to GUESS's operations. Therefore, our influence is indirect, particularly for lower-tier suppliers (tier 2 and tier 3), such as fabric mills and raw material processors, where we have limited visibility. Nonetheless, we engage directly with tier 1 suppliers through our social compliance program and collaborate with local organizations and global partners to extend our impact further down the supply chain.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Our global supply chain presents both opportunities and risks. On the positive side, it enables us to support decent work and economic growth for workers around the world. However, there is also potential for negative impacts, including unsafe working conditions, violations of human rights, excessive working hours, and lack of fair compensation. We work to identify, prevent, and mitigate these risks through rigorous policies, oversight, and continuous improvement efforts.

- GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct (CoC): Outlines our labor rights expectations in alignment with the International Labour Organization’s (ILO) Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work. It is reviewed and updated as needed by the Sustainability & ESG team and approved by the GUESS Nominating and Governance Committee.
- GUESS Human Rights Policy (HR Policy): The GUESS Human Rights Policy helps our stakeholders better understand the Company’s commitment to human rights and associated requirements, in addition to accountability measures.
- Increase factory employee access to trainings and development opportunities and grievance mechanism.
- Develop training and development opportunities to promote positive change for women by 2025.
- Publish and update an interactive multi-tier supply chain map by 2025.

IMPACT MANAGEMENT AND EFFECTIVENESS EVALUATION

We monitor the effectiveness of our efforts through regular third-party audits at tier 1 supplier facilities, reporting key findings on a biennial basis. Insights from audits inform our training content, engagement strategy, and supplier evaluation. Our Vendor Scorecard system includes key performance indicators related to social compliance, environmental management, innovation, and participation in GUESS-led training initiatives.

GUESS introduced the Beyond Audits project to go further than traditional compliance approaches, fostering stronger supplier relationships and supporting lasting improvements in working conditions. This initiative emphasizes ongoing dialogue, capacity building, and collaboration with tier 1 suppliers - particularly in high-risk regions - enabling GUESS to better understand systemic issues and co-develop solutions with partners. Beyond Audits is currently being piloted in India, Bangladesh, and Pakistan, with support from local consultants and labor rights experts.

We also work with community-based organizations - such as INNO in China - and monitor transparency metrics as part of our commitment to systemic improvement. Each year, we publish a list of key tier 1 suppliers and continue to expand training programs for both internal teams and suppliers. This approach encourages knowledge-sharing across factory teams to enhance training efforts.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

Tier 1 suppliers are required to sign and comply with the GUESS CoC and HR Policy. These documents are mandatory for new suppliers and serve as the foundation for our due diligence process on human and labor rights risks in the supply chain. Suppliers must provide evidence of compliance through third-party audit reports, peer certifications, and other documentation from credible organizations. The GUESS Sustainability & ESG team is responsible for monitoring compliance as part of the Company’s comprehensive Social Compliance Program.

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

Climate change is a critical global challenge, and GUESS is committed to playing its part in mitigating its impacts. Recognizing the direct link between energy consumption and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, we have set science-based targets to reduce our carbon footprint across our operations and supply chain. Our approach includes transitioning to renewable energy, improving energy efficiency, and engaging stakeholders to support a low-carbon economy.

Scope 1 (direct) and Scope 2 (indirect) emissions are within GUESS’s operational control, encompassing emissions from company-owned facilities and purchased electricity. Scope 3 emissions, particularly from purchased goods and services, occur outside our direct operations but are integral to our Science Based Targets (SBTs) and are addressed through supplier engagement and sustainable material sourcing.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Our business and supply chain contribute to global carbon emissions. By setting and pursuing ambitious reduction targets, we aim to lessen our environmental impact and enhance our resilience to climate-related risks. Understanding and mitigating these risks are essential for the long-term sustainability of our business and the communities we serve.

GUESS integrates climate change and energy use into its enterprise-wide risk management, with key findings reported directly to the Board of Directors. Each year, we disclose our climate-related actions and progress through the CDP, ensuring alignment with best practices in climate risk reporting. Our annual global carbon inventory tracks GHG emissions and energy efficiency improvements, helping to guide our strategy toward achieving our SBTs. Reaching these goals requires strong operational policies, innovative financing solutions, and collaborative programs across our supply chain.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

GUESS remains committed to transparency and is proactively enhancing its data collection and reporting processes to ensure compliance with applicable climate disclosure regulations, including those introduced at the state level such as in California, and international frameworks such as Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive (CSRD).

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

While GUESS specifies materials in our designs for tier 1 suppliers, raw material production occurs outside our direct operations. We influence our supply chain through fabric choices, ongoing vendor communication, and, in some cases, direct engagement with mills.

REPORTING LIMITATIONS

Currently, GUESS is unable to fully track and report on non-core fabric materials, such as linings or embellishments, in our apparel products. Additionally, comprehensive disclosure of materials used in accessories and footwear beyond the main components remains a challenge.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

The materials used in our products have significant environmental impacts, including water usage, pollution, biodiversity loss, carbon emissions. By choosing lower-impact materials, such as recycled, organic, or regenerative fibers, we aim to reduce our environmental footprint and support long-term sustainability.

POLICIES AND GOALS

- GUESS Responsible Manmade Cellulosic Fabrics Sourcing Policy: Aims to ensure responsible sourcing of rayon, viscose, and other cellulosic fibers, avoiding materials linked to deforestation or human rights violations.

By choosing recycled materials and designing products to reduce waste and enable end-of-life recycling, we actively support the transition to a circular economy. We have established clear goals to develop and operationalize a circular strategy and to roll out a Circular Design Playbook, which will be applied to at least one capsule collection per season by 2030. We are also committed to growing customer participation with the “GUESS Again” program, which rewards customers for recycling used items with online credit. Expanding the program’s reach, both geographically and in customer awareness, is key to diverting unwanted clothing and footwear from landfills.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

As of May 2025, Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) regulations for textiles are in effect or forthcoming in several jurisdictions where GUESS operates:

- France: Under the AGEC Law, producers are required to organize and finance the collection, sorting, and recycling of textiles, with obligations including eco-modulated fees and mandatory labeling.
- Netherlands: Since July 2023, textile producers must register with a Producer Responsibility Organization (PRO) and meet targets for reuse and recycling, with fees based on the weight of textiles placed on the market.
- Hungary: Introduced EPR for textiles in 2023, requiring quarterly reporting and fees based on product weight.
- Latvia: Implemented EPR for textiles, with producers paying fees per kilogram of textiles and reporting obligations.
- Sweden: Introduced EPR for textiles starting January 2024, with phased implementation and targets for reuse and recycling.
- California, USA: Passed the Responsible Textile Recovery Act in 2024, requiring producers to join an approved PRO by July 1, 2026, and implement programs for collection and recycling of textiles.

GUESS is actively monitoring these regulations and working to ensure compliance across all applicable markets, including registration with relevant PROs, reporting, and adapting our product and packaging strategies to meet local EPR requirements.

Pollution and Chemicals

Proper management of chemicals and dyes used in manufacturing is crucial to safeguarding the health of workers, our customers and the environment.

We have direct control over the protocols for product quality testing and performance, ensuring compliance with safety standards. While external chemical testing within our supply chain is not directly under our control, we are actively working to extend our influence and promote best practices among our suppliers.

REPORTING LIMITATIONS

Currently, our chemical testing program encompasses tier 1 vendors and inbound logistics quality testing.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Improper use of chemicals can lead to environmental pollution, particularly of waterways and soil, and pose significant health risks to humans.

POLICIES AND GOALS

- GUESS List of Restricted Substances and Materials (LRSM): The GUESS LRSM identifies the chemicals that are limited or prohibited in our products or production processes due to their potential impact on consumers, workers, and the environment. This list also includes substances that may be present in finished materials, along with the acceptable limits for these substances.

This list is updated annually or as deemed necessary to incorporate the latest regulations, including the European Union’s REACH requirements and other pertinent international standards. The LRSM is disseminated to suppliers as part of the business contract and is publicly available on our sustainability website.

Compliance is verified through a combination of supplier-provided evidence and independent testing by accredited third parties. Products or materials that fail to meet our standards may be subject to rework, retesting, or rejection, depending on legal requirements.

In alignment with our goal to become a ZDHC signatory, we are enhancing our wastewater management practices. By 2030, we aim to eliminate hazardous chemical discharges from all wet processing units, thereby mitigating environmental pollution and safeguarding water resources.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

- Tier 1 suppliers are required to adhere to our LRSM, with additional stipulations outlined in our GUESS ECO guidelines.
- The LRSM is crafted with input from external experts to ensure compliance with the most rigorous chemical regulations globally.
- Suppliers must provide documentation of testing conducted on final products or raw materials, demonstrating adherence to our standards.
- Non-compliant products or materials may be accepted only under specific contingencies, such as rework and retesting, or may be rejected outright, in accordance with legal mandates.

A diverse and inclusive culture provides equitable employment opportunities, encourages social justice, and brings a range of perspectives and ideas that enhance innovation and decision-making. In response to increased calls for social and racial justice, GUESS has expanded its Diversity & Inclusion (D&I) Council both the U.S. and Europe. Each council's focus is tailored to be most relevant and appropriate for its region.

We monitor pay parity and continuously seek to improve HR practices to promote diversity and inclusion in recruitment and internal policies. Through the GUESS Foundation, we engage in community outreach that reflects our commitment to supporting an inclusive culture and community.

We track D&I data through our ESG Report and submit relevant material to the Human Rights Campaign's Corporate Equality Index. Our expectations for all GUESS associates to support a diverse and welcoming workplace are detailed in the GUESS Code of Ethics, which is publicly available at sustainability.guess.com. We encourage associates to report concerns about possible discrimination through our open-door policy and global whistleblower hotline, ensuring honest and open communication without fear of repercussion.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

GUESS aligns with relevant regulations and stakeholder expectations regarding Diversity and Inclusion (D&I) disclosures across the markets where the Company operates. While certain mandatory sustainability reporting requirements are evolving and may not currently apply to GUESS based on its organizational structure, the Company remains committed to transparency and accountability on D&I matters.

All new employees and suppliers are required to sign the GUESS Code of Ethics, which outlines expectations regarding non-discrimination, respect, and inclusivity in the workplace. Corporate associates undergo annual training on unconscious bias and harassment prevention, as part of a broader commitment to fostering an inclusive work environment.

Additionally, GUESS provides training to employees on the Company's Human Rights Policy, which was officially published in the past year. This policy reinforces GUESS's commitment to respecting human rights and promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout its operations and supply chain.

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

The majority of GUESS's social and environmental impacts occur within our supply chain. As a result, it is critical that we have robust policies and processes in place to manage these risks effectively.

We have direct control over internal GUESS processes related to supplier onboarding, audits, and training, particularly for tier 1 suppliers. While our current systems focus on tier 1 factories, we recognize the importance of expanding our influence beyond first-tier suppliers. We are working to enhance transparency and accountability deeper into the supply chain, including raw material sourcing and subcontracted production.

REPORTING LIMITATIONS

Our programs and performance tracking currently primarily focuses on tier 1 suppliers. Accessing verified data and maintaining oversight beyond this level remains challenging due to complex sourcing structures and limitations in direct relationships. We continue to address these limitations through engagement with multi-stakeholder initiatives, third-party verifications, and technological solutions.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Our responsible sourcing program is designed to manage the social and environmental impacts that occur across our global supply chain. Key risks include labor rights violations, unsafe working conditions, and environmental degradation. Failure to address these issues can result in harm to workers and communities, reputational damage, and potential regulatory non-compliance. Conversely, effective management can improve workers' well-being, reduce environmental harm, and support long-term supplier partnerships.

POLICIES & GOALS

- GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct (CoC): Outlines labor rights expectations in alignment with the International Labour Organization's (ILO) Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work. It is reviewed and updated as needed by the Sustainability & ESG team and approved by the GUESS Nominating and Governance Committee.
- GUESS Human Rights Policy (HR Policy): The GUESS Human Rights Policy helps our stakeholders better understand the Company's commitment to human rights and associated requirements, in addition to accountability measures.
- Increase factory employee access to trainings and development opportunities and grievance mechanism.
- Develop training and development opportunities to promote positive change for women.
- Publish and update an interactive multi-tier supply chain map.

IMPACT MANAGEMENT & EFFECTIVENESS EVALUATION

We conduct regular audits of our tier 1 supplier factories and publicly report audit findings on a biennial basis (see relevant disclosure in our latest ESG Report). Audit results and trend analyses inform updates to our training content, delivery formats, and frequency, as well as supplier onboarding and improvement plans.

We assess supplier performance using our Vendor Scorecard Program, which includes key performance indicators on social responsibility, environmental compliance, and innovation. The scorecard integrates audit results, participation in GUESS training sessions, and implementation of corrective action plans. This tool informs business decisions and fosters continuous improvement and accountability.

We also use third-party environmental certifications to identify environmentally preferred materials and better manage supply chain impacts associated with material sourcing and processing.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

All new tier 1 suppliers must accept the GUESS CoC and HR Policy and provide evidence of their social compliance history through valid third-party audit reports or recognized certifications. GUESS evaluates supplier eligibility using input from industry-aligned audit schemes and multistakeholder programs such as, but not limited to, amfori BSCI, WRAP, and Sedex SMETA.

We are committed to aligning our practices with their intent and international frameworks such as the OECD Due Diligence Guidance for Responsible Supply Chains and the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights.

GUESS proactively monitors global legislative developments on responsible sourcing and continues to strengthen due diligence practices across its supply chain. In cases where local regulatory requirements are less stringent than the standards set forth in our Code of Conduct or Human Rights Policy, we apply the higher standard.

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

Biodiversity loss is a critical global challenge, and GUESS recognizes its responsibility to mitigate its impacts on nature. Our primary biodiversity impacts stem from the materials we source, particularly in the production of textiles. As we increase our use of environmentally preferred materials—such as recycled or organic fibers—we aim to reduce our biodiversity footprint.

GUESS's direct operations, primarily comprising retail stores and offices in urban settings, have minimal direct impacts on biodiversity. However, significant impacts occur indirectly through our supply chain, especially in the sourcing of raw materials like cotton and cellulosic fibers. These impacts are associated with land-use changes, deforestation, and agrochemical use.

REPORTING LIMITATIONS

Currently, our visibility into biodiversity impacts beyond tier 1 suppliers is limited. While we can report on the quantity of certified or recycled materials used, detailed information—such as specific species affected or the extent of habitat disruption—is not yet available. We acknowledge the need to enhance our data collection and reporting mechanisms to address these gaps.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Our supply chain activities have the potential to negatively impact biodiversity, primarily through:

- Deforestation for the production of cellulosic fibers.
- Use of pesticides and fertilizers in conventional cotton farming.

These practices can lead to habitat loss, soil degradation, and water pollution, adversely affecting various species and ecosystems. Conversely, sourcing certified and regenerative fibers can help mitigate or even reverse these impacts by promoting sustainable land management and reducing chemical use.

POLICIES & GOALS

- GUESS Responsible Manmade Cellulosic Fabrics Sourcing Policy: Aims to ensure responsible sourcing of rayon, viscose, and other cellulosic fibers, avoiding materials linked to deforestation or human rights violations.
- GUESS Responsible Cotton Sourcing Policy: Commits to increasing procurement of preferred cotton sources while improving traceability to prevent prohibited cotton sources from entering our supply chain.
- GUESS Animal Welfare Policy: This policy aims to protect the well-being of all animals in our supply chain.
- Develop a biodiversity strategy aligned with the Science Based Targets for Nature (SBTN) by 2025.
- 75% of GUESS global apparel materials portfolio will be environmentally preferred by 2030.

IMPACT MANAGEMENT & EFFECTIVENESS EVALUATION

Our approach to managing biodiversity impacts includes:

- Measuring and increasing the use of certified and recycled materials to reduce reliance on biodiversity-intensive raw materials.
- Collaborating with suppliers to implement sustainable farming practices that minimize habitat disruption and chemical use.
- Developing a biodiversity strategy in line with SBTN guidance, which will involve assessing our environmental impacts, setting science-based targets, and implementing actions to mitigate biodiversity loss.

We are also exploring tools and frameworks, such as the TNFD's LEAP approach, to enhance our understanding and disclosure of nature-related risks and opportunities.

By aligning with these frameworks, we aim to enhance our biodiversity management practices and contribute to global efforts to halt and reverse nature loss.

Water Stewardship

BOUNDARY AND INVOLVEMENT

GUESS is committed to comprehensive water stewardship by integrating policy, innovation, and supplier engagement. Through technologies such as AIRWASH™, the GUESS ECO denim platform, and its long-term goal to become water positive by 2035, the Company continues to reduce its water footprint and promote responsible use of freshwater resources across its global value chain.

Corporate water use within GUESS operations (i.e., stores, offices, and warehouses) is limited and under direct control, yet it represents a negligible share of the overall water footprint. The Company's most significant water impacts occur externally, primarily in upstream value chain stages such as raw material cultivation (especially cotton), fabric dyeing, and garment finishing. Downstream water use also occurs during consumer care (e.g., garment washing). These stages are managed indirectly but influenced through policies, supplier engagement, and product design.

REPORTING LIMITATIONS

As GUESS's primary water impacts lie within its supply chain, the Company does not report on direct water withdrawals and consumption from its owned operations. Instead, disclosures focus on supply chain engagement, innovations with tier 1 suppliers, and practices to reduce water use and improve wastewater quality in denim manufacturing.

ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL IMPACTS

Denim production is highly water-intensive—especially during cotton cultivation, dyeing, and washing stages. These activities can contribute to freshwater depletion and pollution, particularly in water-stressed manufacturing regions. GUESS recognizes these risks and is actively working to mitigate its water footprint and improve water quality across its value chain.

POLICIES & GOALS

- GUESS Water and Chemical Management Policy: This policy aims to address our product impact on water, with a focus on denim.
- Be water positive in supply chain: replenishing more water than used in our supply chain by 2035.

IMPACT MANAGEMENT & EFFECTIVENESS EVALUATION

GUESS continues to implement a targeted and strategic approach to reduce its water impacts, informed by a lifecycle assessment and water footprint conducted in FY2017. Based on the findings, the Company has prioritized high-impact lifecycle stages and introduced innovative production methods.

Among the most significant innovations is GUESS AIRWASH™, developed in partnership with Jeanologia. This technology uses air and humidity instead of water to achieve desired denim finishes—reducing water use and eliminating harmful chemicals. This method is increasingly adopted in our GUESS JEANS denim production.

In addition, the GUESS Water Action Plan, launched in FY2019, continues to guide progress on water reduction and water quality improvements across denim production. The Company also promotes water-conscious consumer care and education.

44% of denim produced for GUESS brand in the Americas and Europe meets GUESS ECO criteria, which includes reduced water impact.

GUESS recognizes water as a critical shared resource and is committed to managing its use responsibly across its operations and supply chain. While the water usage in GUESS's direct operations, such as retail stores and corporate offices, is minimal, the company's supply chain activities, particularly in the production of denim and other apparel, are water-intensive and generate significant effluent. These processes are associated with substantial water withdrawals, pollution risks, and potential impacts on water-stressed regions.

GUESS does not own or operate any production facilities, as all manufacturing is outsourced to third-party suppliers. This limits GUESS's direct control over water use and wastewater management practices. However, the Company has established policies and practices to mitigate these impacts indirectly through its partnerships and engagement with suppliers.

Aligned with its "ACTION GUESS" ESG Strategy, the Company has implemented initiatives to promote water stewardship in partnership with suppliers and industry stakeholders. Tier 1 suppliers are required to comply with local water regulations and the environmental standards outlined in the GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct. Through the Sustainable Vendor Rating tool, GUESS evaluates suppliers based on their water management performance, including water conservation, recycling, wastewater testing, and pollution reduction.

GUESS has developed a targeted, strategic approach to reducing the water impact of its products, with a particular focus on denim. This strategy addresses high-impact areas throughout the product lifecycle, identifying opportunities for influence and improvement. As part of this approach, the Company has introduced the GUESS Water and Chemical Management Policy, applicable to all denim suppliers and their facilities. The policy emphasizes water savings and water quality at each phase of the denim lifecycle. GUESS also promotes the use of innovative garment production methods, particularly for GUESS ECO denim products, to achieve significant water and chemical savings. Suppliers are encouraged to adopt advanced technologies, such as ozone treatments and e-flow, which reduce water consumption and the generation of pollutants in effluent. These technologies lessen the load on wastewater treatment systems and are particularly effective in water-stressed regions, where responsible water management is critical. In alignment with its ACTION GUESS strategy, GUESS has set the goal of becoming water positive within its supply chain by 2035.

GUESS actively promotes adherence to international standards, such as the Zero Discharge of Hazardous Chemicals (ZDHC) initiative. The Company aims to become a ZDHC signatory and adopt the ZDHC Manufacturing Restricted Substances List (MRSI) by 2026, with the goal of achieving ZDHC-approved compliance across its supply chain by 2030. These standards provide suppliers with clear guidance on chemical use, wastewater testing requirements, and effluent management practices, ensuring alignment with global best practices.

Despite these efforts, GUESS acknowledges significant challenges in tracing water use and wastewater management beyond tier 1 suppliers. Limited visibility into upstream processes, such as dyeing and fabric finishing, poses challenges in fully understanding and mitigating water-related risks. The Company also does not currently collect or report detailed metrics on water intensity or the percentage of water treated through primary, secondary, or tertiary methods. Addressing these gaps is a priority for GUESS as it continues to enhance traceability and data collection capabilities.

To strengthen its oversight and improve water-related outcomes, GUESS plans to leverage its Sustainable Vendor Rating system and engage suppliers to align with international standards. These efforts are supported by collaboration with stakeholders and participation in industry initiatives to address water challenges in high-risk regions.

GUESS remains dedicated to improving water stewardship across its supply chain by promoting sustainable practices, investing in supplier capacity building, and aligning with global standards. Through these measures, the Company aims to reduce its water footprint, support the preservation of shared water resources, and contribute to the resilience of ecosystems and communities dependent on these resources.

Significant Impacts of Activities, Products, and Services on Biodiversity

The biodiversity impacts of GUESS's own operations, which primarily consist of retail stores and offices located in urban settings worldwide, are minimal.

GUESS recognizes that while it does not directly source raw materials, its reliance on tier 1 suppliers for finished products indirectly impacts biodiversity. These indirect impacts originate from upstream activities in the supply chain, including the production of raw materials such as cotton, polyester, and manmade cellulosic fibers. These materials represent the majority of the volume used in GUESS products, and their production and processing can lead to deforestation, land degradation, and water pollution, particularly in biodiversity-sensitive regions.

A high-level biodiversity and water risk assessment conducted in collaboration with Quantis, an external sustainability expert, in 2024 identified general hotspots where biodiversity impacts are more pronounced, offering a foundation to prioritize actions and commitments that could be part of a future biodiversity strategy. Aligned with its "ACTION GUESS" ESG Strategy, the Company has established policies that help address biodiversity-related impacts. The Responsible Cotton Sourcing Policy focuses on increasing the use of preferred cotton sources while avoiding high-risk regions associated with unsustainable practices. Similarly, the Responsible Manmade Cellulosic Fabrics Sourcing Policy ensures that these materials are sourced from suppliers committed to the prevention of deforestation in ancient or endangered forests. By emphasizing certified and responsible sourced materials, GUESS aims to reduce its contribution to deforestation, land degradation, and other biodiversity impacts.

To further mitigate these impacts, GUESS evaluates tier 1 suppliers using tools such as the Sustainable Vendor Rating, which incentivizes and prioritizes suppliers that demonstrate effective water conservation and pollution mitigation practices. While full adherence of the supply chain to the Zero Discharge of Hazardous Chemicals (ZDHC) program is a long-term commitment targeted for 2030, the Company actively recognizes and values suppliers already implementing robust chemical and water management systems. Supplier assessments and collaborative efforts encourage alignment with GUESS's sustainability goals, fostering improvements in biodiversity-related practices within the supply chain.

GUESS acknowledges its current traceability limitations, which extend only to tier 1 suppliers. While the Company can report on the quantity of certified or recycled materials used, it currently lacks visibility into detailed supply chain biodiversity impacts, such as the species affected or the extent of the impacted areas. Enhancing traceability remains a key focus for future improvement. To address this, GUESS plans to explore advanced traceability tools and collaborate with industry stakeholders to implement standardized practices that improve supply chain transparency and deepen its understanding of upstream biodiversity impacts. These efforts will strengthen GUESS's ability to mitigate biodiversity-related risks and contribute meaningfully to global conservation goals.

**Habitats Protected or Restored**

At GUESS, we recognize the importance of biodiversity conservation and ecosystem restoration as key pillars of our sustainability strategy. Through strategic partnerships and targeted reforestation initiatives, we actively contribute to the protection and restoration of habitats worldwide. Our efforts focus on enhancing biodiversity, supporting climate resilience, and fostering long-term environmental stewardship. By restoring degraded ecosystems and promoting sustainable land use, we are committed to making a meaningful impact on global conservation efforts while integrating responsible practices into our business operations.

Our partnership with One Tree Planted has been instrumental in this regard. The GUESS Foundation partnered with One Tree Planted to help restore areas through North America, Europe, and Asia.

During FY2024 and FY2025, GUESS contributed to planting 26,000 trees, supporting the following projects:

- British Columbia, Canada: we planted 1,496 trees across 209 hectares, restoring ecosystems affected by wildfires, floods, and invasive species. This project supported wildlife habitats, particularly in Old Growth and Riparian Management Areas, and engaged multiple Indigenous groups, fostering community resilience and economic development.
- Minnesota, USA: in partnership with local organizations, we planted 9,404 trees across 1,157 hectares. This initiative focused on enhancing forest resilience, restoring habitats for over 20 species identified in the Minnesota State Wildlife Action Plan, and improving water quality in the Lake Superior watershed.
- Romania: in response to wind damage in Transylvania, we planted 11,516 trees across 91 hectares to rehabilitate affected forest areas. The reforestation impact of this project extends beyond ecological restoration to encompass climate resilience, increased biodiversity, and sustained ecosystem health in the Hymas and Tarcu Mountains.
- Vietnam: we planted 2,088 trees across an estimated 1,300 hectares to restore degraded forest habitats and support biodiversity conservation efforts. This project employed multiple reforestation approaches, including afforestation, enrichment planting, and agroforestry to provide sustainable livelihoods while enhancing forest conservation.
- Ontario, Canada: we supported the planting of 1,496 trees across 1,060 hectares through the Healthy Forests Restoration Program. This project focused on enhancing biodiversity, improving soil health, and creating wildlife habitats while engaging local communities and promoting long-term forest sustainability.

Since the beginning of our collaboration with One Tree Planted in 2022, we have planted 32,000 trees across British Columbia, California, Minnesota, Romania, Vietnam and Ontario.

To offset the unavoidable printed paper use at our offices and stores, we have implemented the PrintReleaf program across our European offices and stores. In FY2024 and FY2025, this initiative resulted in planting over 900 trees in key reforestation projects worldwide. Since the program's inception in 2016, we have planted over 2,300 trees. Through PrintReleaf, GUESS has supported reforestation projects globally:

- In the Carpathian Basin (Romania), we contributed to restoring wind-damaged forests by planting native species like spruce and beech to enhance biodiversity and prevent soil erosion.
- In Tanzania's Pangani River Basin, trees were planted to protect waterways, support agriculture, and strengthen community resilience against climate change.
- In Malaysia's Kinabatangan River area, reforestation efforts restored degraded lands, provided critical wildlife habitats, and created local employment opportunities.
- In Northern California and British Columbia, projects focused on wildfire restoration, reintroducing native species to rebuild forest ecosystems and protect against future fires.
- In France's Normandy-Maine region, diverse tree species were planted to revitalize forests affected by insect damage, improving the resilience and biodiversity of the ecosystem.

These initiatives are part of GUESS's broader commitment to biodiversity protection and habitat restoration. We ensure that all areas where reforestation or restoration activities have taken place are actively monitored and maintained to promote ecological recovery. In regions where our projects have been completed, we continue to engage with local stakeholders and environmental organizations to support long-term conservation efforts.

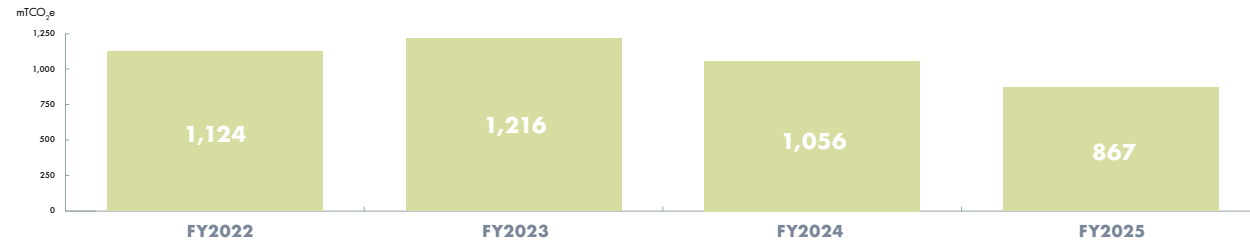

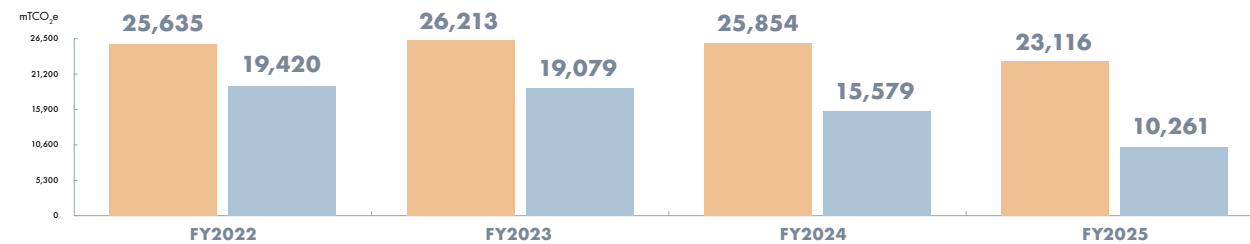

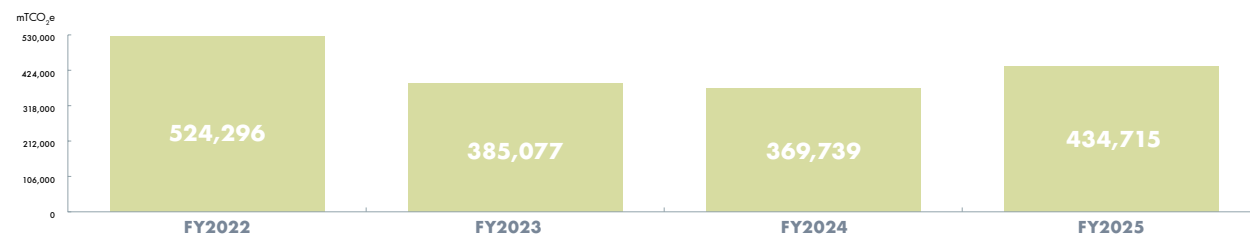


Legend: Scope 2 (Location-based) (Orange), Scope 2 (Market-based) (Blue)

GRI 404-2 Programs for Upgrading Employee Skills and Transition Assistance Programs

At GUESS, we are committed to ensuring a seamless onboarding experience for our employees by providing comprehensive support for accessing benefits and resources. We recognize that employee benefits play a crucial role in attracting and retaining exceptional talent. Across our corporate and retail teams, we prioritize the need for core benefits such as health care, leave of absence, retirement plans, and adequate paid time off. We tailor additional benefits based on geographical location and applicable local laws.

Below is an overview of the benefits offered by country:

- United States: We provide a wide range of benefits to both full-time and eligible part-time associates, including medical, dental, and vision coverage, flexible spending accounts, retirement savings plans, and associate stock purchase plans. Additional benefits include life and accident insurance, disability coverage, and employee assistance programs.
- Canada, Europe, and China: Benefits vary by country or province and typically include health care, life and disability insurance, critical illness coverage, and more.

To further support our employees' futures, GUESS offers vital transition assistance programs tailored to each country. These programs are designed to ensure continued employability and manage career transitions, whether due to retirement or employment termination. Services typically include pre-retirement planning, retraining opportunities, and counseling for a smooth transition to life beyond GUESS.

KYDC TRANSITION ASSISTANCE

In May 2024, after conducting regular operational reviews and reallocating resources to areas of need, the decision was made to transfer ownership of the Kentucky Distribution Center by Guess?, Inc. The building and property were acquired by GXO, our long-time third-party distribution partner in Europe to further streamline our global supply chain. GXO Logistics, Inc. is an American global contract logistics company that manages outsourced supply chains and warehousing, and reverse logistics for blue-chip customers in over thirty countries. To support employees affected by the transition, GUESS implemented a range of support programs over a six-month period. Those impacted received assistance throughout the process, including one-on-one resumé workshops, outplacement services, severance packages (which included salary continuation and healthcare benefits), and mental health support, among other resources.

LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT

At GUESS, we are committed to fostering the growth and development of our associates by offering a broad spectrum of training and development opportunities. We provide tailored training programs for associates in every region, supporting their operational needs and career advancement goals at every stage of their careers. Our training formats include in-person classroom sessions, e-learning, external seminars, and virtual workshops. Through our e-learning platforms, MyAcademy and Cornerstone, employees can access these resources from anywhere.

In FY2024, we proudly expanded our GES Conversations (Growth, Engagement, Satisfaction) to Regions 1 and 2 corporate employees, a development tool launched initially for field employees in the US, to enhance and support individual performance. Additionally, we offer an extensive array of training programs for corporate employees, including:

- Management Development Program – During FY2024–2025, 42 US Managers and 90 EU HQ Managers participated in this six-month development program, which supports essential leadership skills, including basic management, effective communication, delegation, conflict resolution, and coaching. In FY2025 Europe added a module on Diversity & Inclusion to the program.
- Style Your Development (EMEA) – a specific and customized individual development plan introduced in FY2025 to develop participants' key competencies leveraging on different tools (formal trainings, coaching and manager's support). The first step of the program consists in an assessment based on Company's Competency Model. The program lasts one year from the delivery of the Individual Development Plan.
- Stitch Your Path (EMEA) – Several monthly coaching sessions of 60 to 90 minutes, based on participants needs and assessments.
- Coaching programs (EMEA) – We provide coaching sessions with external partners on demand to enable associates to unlock their full potential, maximizing their performance level and personal growth.
- Performance management (EMEA) – We provide trainings for Managers to support their teams to reach their goals.
- Design Your Knowledge (EMEA) – We provide a catalog of nearly 100 online training courses focused on personal development.

We also offer a variety of training for retail employees including:

- Product Knowledge trainings – Provides knowledge of GUESS products to field teams to support them in becoming brand ambassadors and personal stylists. In EMEA, through the MyAcademy app Product Knowledge is provided to stores teams for all seasons, all categories and deliveries via PK courses, focused on providing key knowledge, selling points, characteristics and benefits of the products and how to style them. These trainings include information on trends, fabrics, style and sustainability.
- Level Up Training (US & CA) – A monthly training series on different topics including growth mindset, goal setting, loyalty, hiring, product knowledge, scheduling, new field training initiatives, and other topics of interest to our employees in the field. Masterclass level up training topics were reinforced through monthly Managers' meetings to turn concepts into actions in each store.
- Captains of Green Ambassadors (CGA) Program - The CGA is an exclusive program that is designed to highlight the knowledge and expertise in working on synergy with our customers, suppliers, investors, and associates to reduce our impact. Our stores are an essential part of our business, and this program is designed to show life at GUESS through the passion for the brand.
- District Visual Lead (DVL) Program – The DVL program is designed for co-managers that love to merchandise, analyze product reports to impact business, and problem solve. As a leader in their district, a DVL supports the DM through district communication and training.
- District Training Manager (DTM) Program – Store Managers are selected for the DTM program to create, develop, and facilitate training initiatives. By collaborating with leadership and the training department, DTMs have the chance to shape the future of our brand with their passion for training.
- District Manager in Training (DMIT) Program - The DMIT program is a development program for Store Managers with a proven track record and a desire to be in a multi-store management position in the future. From operations to people development, they take part in training calls with corporate partners, meetings, store visits, and individual development calls.
- Manager in Training (MIT) Program - As a MIT, you will gain valuable insight on how to successfully manage a GUESS store. This training is designed to be an introduction and overview of the tools and systems in place, but the learning doesn't stop there.
- Future Leader (FL) Program - This program is for sales associates with a focus on development and builds the skills necessary to be a leader here at GUESS. Gain insight into the different aspects of running a store and leading your team.

- Interactive Mobile E-learnings - Through the MyAcademy platform, the GUESS mobile learning management platform launched in 2021 for all EMEA countries, we are able to reach each individual salesperson in Europe with dedicated, customized and interactive e-learning opportunities. The app provides content, knowledge tests, tracks usage, allows sales associates to comment on each other's posts, increases engagement by assigning badges, and provides other interactivity opportunities such as battles and competitions through the leaderboard.
- Art of selling - Our customer service curriculum is designed to provide associates with engaging, interactive learning experiences that enhance their skills in communication, client engagement and management. This digital curriculum allows for consistent delivery and easy tracking of progress, ensuring that all sales associates receive high-quality training that aligns with our commitment to exceptional customer service. Through scenarios & quizzes, employees are equipped to deliver an elevated customer experience, supporting both their professional growth and the Company's sustainability goals.
- Customer service & Retail operations trainings are offered to all stores staff in EMEA using different formats. Online courses are provided through the mobile MyAcademy app, structured in micro-learning pills adaptable to the working schedule of young and passionate salespersons. Moreover, training courses with external retail coaches are locally organized in different countries with the aim of developing skills on customer service, employees management, operational effectiveness, etc. Finally, virtual training sessions are organized with the participation of trainers from other departments, for example when implementing new tools or systems.
- Sharing Knowledge About Our Sustainable Products:
 - Sustainability is always a key message in all training programs delivered to retail as well as corporate teams in all EMEA countries. Product knowledge training, in all its parts (including PK videos, courses on MyAcademy platform and virtual sessions) always include messages and information on sustainable properties in GUESS products. Information on new eco technologies, production processes and fabrics are always included and highlighted.
 - On MyAcademy app, all EMEA employees (both retail and corporate) have access to a training course dedicated to sustainability in GUESS. It provides knowledge on preferred raw materials used in our collections, more sustainable product information for all categories, from denim to accessories, animal welfare policy, gas, chemical and water reduction in production processes, recycling initiatives, social responsibility, and the commitment of the Company in the areas of supply chain and people related processes.
 - Moreover, training and informative webinars have been organized in collaboration between the Training and the Sustainability & ESG teams to offer all corporate employees the opportunity to deepen their knowledge on sustainability in GUESS, in particular covering all main aspects of the ESG reporting.

FOSTERING THE GROWTH OF EMERGING TALENT

At GUESS, we are committed to nurturing the next generation of talent, starting with our internship program. We offer a 10-week, full-time internship in the US & EU, alongside an additional apprenticeship program in Europe.

Our US internship program provides interns with valuable hands-on experience. In FY2024 and FY2025, interns took part in various activities, such as panel discussions with different Company departments, a visit to the Marciano Art Foundation, planning GUESS Kids @Work, learning about operations at our flagship store, and custom denim creation at our denim laser day event. They also participated in two philanthropic initiatives: building and painting playhouses for Habitat for Humanity and organizing a bake sale competition to raise funds for local Los Angeles charities, Daniel's Place and A Safe Place for Youth. Additionally, career development workshops were held, where recruiters offered guidance, advice, and feedback on resumes and LinkedIn profiles.

Over the past two years, we've hosted several interns across various departments, including Advertising, Buying/Planning/Allocation, Customer Care, Design, Finance, Marketing, Merchandising, E-commerce, Internal Audit, Sustainability, Licensing, Field Operations, MIS, Wholesale, and Supply Chain. In both years, some interns were offered extended internships or full-time positions. The success of our program was further validated when GUESS received Yello's 2023 Top 100 Internship Programs award and Vault's Top 150 Best Internships of 2024.

In Europe we have continued to develop our apprenticeship program aimed at Business School students in Ticino. The apprenticeship is three years, and it helps support the integration of potential future associates into the Company by facilitating structured rotations between departments including HR, Accounting, Logistics, Customer Service and Marketing. In FY2024 and FY2025 we also ran a 10-week full time internship experience for summer interns.

Discussion of Processes to Maintain Compliance with Restricted Substances Regulations

GUESS maintains a comprehensive compliance framework to ensure adherence to global restricted substances regulations across all product lines. The foundation of this framework is the GUESS List of Restricted Substances and Materials (LRSM), a document updated annually to reflect international laws, industry standards, and emerging trends. The LRSM outlines detailed specifications for allowable chemical thresholds, testing protocols, and certification requirements. The latest revision of the LRSM is publicly available at sustainability.guess.com under the Policies and Resources section. It is reviewed and updated in order to reflect the strictest regulation in all the countries or markets in which the brand operates and sells products.

The LRSM is distributed to all suppliers, who must confirm adherence and implement its guidelines throughout the production process. Collaboration with third-party laboratories strengthens GUESS’s ability to adapt its LRSM to evolving regulations and maintain leadership in industry standards. These partnerships provide access to advanced testing methodologies and insights that drive continuous improvement. This iterative review process allows GUESS to continuously align with the most recent scientific advancements and regulatory updates, driving both compliance and product integrity. Tier 1 suppliers are required to sign agreements affirming that the final products they deliver to GUESS are in compliance with the LRSM requirements.

GUESS implements a unified training framework tailored to the specific needs of both the Apparel and Accessories Divisions. For apparel, training focuses on compliance with textile treatments, dye processes, and fiber safety, ensuring that materials meet stringent benchmarks for quality and environmental impact. In the accessories category, particular emphasis is placed on leather, metals, and coatings, including adherence to international standards and heavy metal regulations such as cadmium and lead. These measures ensure robust safety and sustainability across all product categories.

GUESS employs a rigorous testing process to ensure chemical and mechanical safety compliance throughout its supply chain. In the early stages of product development, risk assessments identify potential safety issues. For apparel, this involves evaluating textiles and dyes during proto and Salesman Sample phases. Accessories undergo material-specific tests for metals and coatings to address risks related to direct skin contact and prolonged use. Testing continues into production, with batch-specific assessments conducted by third-party laboratories to verify adherence to GUESS’s stringent standards. Randomized post-production testing further ensures compliance, focusing on high-risk categories such as children’s apparel and accessories.

To uphold these standards, GUESS’s Compliance team conducts audits on products and verifies testing protocols at every production stage. Non-compliance is managed through a structured corrective action plan, which includes root-cause analysis, supplier collaboration, and production adjustments. This approach ensures that any deviations are swiftly addressed, safeguarding product integrity and consumer safety.

All compliance activities are documented and tracked using shared folders, ensuring transparency, traceability, and accountability. This system serves as a repository for insights that inform future strategies and supplier training programs.

GUESS has implemented a robust risk assessment process tailored to the unique needs of all product divisions to identify and mitigate hazards associated with chemicals in products. This approach integrates both hazard and risk dynamics to thoroughly assess the presence of substances and evaluate their potential to cause harm based on scientific evidence and regulatory standards. Concurrently, GUESS evaluates risk dynamics by focusing on exposure scenarios across the usage and product lifecycle, ensuring a comprehensive understanding of potential impacts.

To support this methodology, GUESS aligns its practices with its LRSM which provides guidelines for managing restricted substances and minimizing risks across the supply chain, reinforcing the Company’s commitment to excellence in chemical safety.

During apparel and accessories product development, materials undergo rigorous evaluations for chemical, physical, and mechanical safety from proto samples to Salesman Samples. Specifically, for apparel products, assessments focus on ensuring fiber safety and compliance with international standards and particular attention is given to metals, coatings, and adhesives to address risks related to direct skin contact and prolonged use. The Compliance team plays a pivotal role in selecting styles for bulk testing during production, considering factors such as risk classifications identified during risk assessments, garment construction variations (e.g., long sleeve versus short sleeve), and fabric quality. For apparel styles flagged for testing, vendors are required to send bulk pieces to authorized labs for “Garment Tests” or “Additional Color Tests” as outlined in the GUESS Apparel Testing Protocols. Vendors are also required to provide more detailed test reports for high-risk styles and materials to ensure alignment with GUESS’s LRSM. Corrective actions are implemented promptly for any non-compliance, followed by follow-up testing to verify resolution. Special emphasis is placed on mitigating risks related to children’s products across kids’ product lines.

While GUESS does not formally follow the 12 Principles of Green Chemistry, these are partially applied during the design and development of GUESS ECO collections. In particular, the selection of safer input materials, reduction of hazardous substances, and focus on resource-efficient processes all contribute to a more sustainable product design aligned with green chemistry intent.

Although third-party chemical certifications are not mandatory, GUESS values certifications such as OEKO-TEX® Standard 100 and Bluesign®, and gives preference to suppliers that hold them—particularly for products under the GUESS ECO label.

All GUESS suppliers are required to comply with the LRSM, which is publicly available and updated regularly to reflect global regulatory evolutions. Tier 1 suppliers are contractually bound to meet LRSM requirements. Compliance is enforced through documentation, training, and random testing procedures, with non-compliance triggering structured corrective actions and follow-ups.

GUESS actively engages with suppliers to ensure adherence through capacity-building activities, including training tailored to specific material categories and product types. Moreover, GUESS integrates chemical compliance into its Vendor Scorecard, rewarding suppliers who demonstrate strong performance in restricted substances management. This structured approach strengthens both transparency and accountability while promoting safer chemical use throughout the supply chain.

The Company also recognizes the importance of managing environmental impacts within its supply chain, particularly wastewater discharge from supplier facilities. These impacts arise predominantly in the production processes of dyeing, washing, and fabric finishing, which are water-intensive and generate significant effluent. GUESS is committed to promoting sustainable practices, reducing risks, and ensuring compliance with environmental standards across its supply chain.

MANAGEMENT OF WASTEWATER DISCHARGE IN THE SUPPLY CHAIN

To address these challenges, GUESS is dedicated to promoting sustainable practices, mitigating environmental risks, and ensuring compliance with industry and environmental standards across its supply chain.

SUPPLIER ENGAGEMENT AND COMPLIANCE

GUESS does not own or operate any production facilities. All manufacturing is fully outsourced, which limits the Company’s direct control over wastewater management and chemical testing. However, tier 1 suppliers are required to adhere to local wastewater discharge regulations and environmental standards outlined in the GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct. Through the Sustainable Vendor Rating, GUESS evaluates suppliers based on their performance in water management, pollution mitigation, and compliance with legal requirements. This process incentivizes suppliers to prioritize sustainable practices and address environmental risks proactively.

Tier 1 suppliers are required to acknowledge and adhere to the GUESS LRSM (List of Restricted Substances and Materials), with additional requirements needed as part of our GUESS ECO guidance. The GUESS LRSM specifies chemicals that are restricted or prohibited in GUESS products or during production due to their potential impact on consumers, workers, and the environment. The list also outlines substances that may be present in finished materials and the acceptable thresholds for those substances.

The LRSM is developed by the Quality Control department in collaboration with external experts, who conduct due diligence to identify the most stringent chemical regulations across all countries where GUESS operates. The policy is approved by the Head of the Technical Department and is updated annually in partnership with third-party experts to ensure compliance with the European Union’s REACH regulations and other relevant market- or client-specific requirements. The most recent version of the policy, published in December 2024, is publicly available at sustainability.guess.com.

The LRSM is distributed to tier 1 suppliers via email as an attachment to the business contract (e.g., Factory Vendor Agreement). The Quality Control department is responsible for monitoring supplier compliance with the LRSM. Suppliers are required to provide evidence of testing conducted on final products or raw materials.

Products or raw materials that fail to meet the specified requirements may be accepted with contingencies, such as being reserved or reworked, retested, or, in some cases, rejected outright based on adherence to legal and policy standards.

ALIGNMENT WITH INDUSTRY STANDARDS

To ensure consistent and high-quality wastewater management across diverse regions, GUESS promotes adherence to both local regulations and stringent international standards, such as the Zero Discharge of Hazardous Chemicals (ZDHC) initiative. By 2026, GUESS aims to become a ZDHC signatory and adopt the ZDHC Manufacturing Restricted Substances List (MRSL). By 2030, the Company’s goal is to ensure that all its direct suppliers of apparel and accessories with in-house wet processes will be ZDHC-approved. This demonstrates GUESS’s alignment with the highest industry standards. Furthermore, GUESS has set a goal of achieving clean wastewater by 2030, ensuring that no hazardous chemicals leave wet processing facilities. These standards provide clear guidance on testing requirements and best practices for wastewater management, supporting GUESS’s efforts to indirectly influence supplier performance.

SUPPLY CHAIN RISKS AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONSTRAINTS

GUESS’s supply chain faces significant risks associated with wastewater discharge. Environmental constraints include the ability of suppliers to maintain compliance with local and international regulations focused on effluent quality, the elimination of pollutants of concern, and control over stormwater discharges. Inadequate compliance poses risks to ecosystems and water resources, especially in biodiversity-sensitive regions. GUESS’s chemical testing program at present includes tier 1 vendors and inbound logistics quality testing. Chemicals used irresponsibly can lead to pollution of waterways and groundwater as well as harm to human health.

Operational and financial constraints also arise, such as liability from non-compliance, reputational risks tied to stakeholder concerns, and increased operational costs due to stringent regulatory requirements. Suppliers may also face challenges in obtaining discharge permits in certain regions, further complicating wastewater management.

Risks vary depending on discharge destinations. Effluents released to surface water or groundwater pose greater risks to local ecosystems compared to those managed through wastewater utilities. The type of destination often determines the level of treatment required and the potential environmental impact.

ADOPTION OF ADVANCED PRACTICES

GUESS promotes the adoption of advanced technologies and practices among its suppliers to address wastewater management and reduce the environmental impact of their operations. Specifically, suppliers are encouraged to implement biological and chemical wastewater treatment systems that improve the quality of discharged effluent by removing contaminants and reducing harmful pollutants. In addition to treatment methods, GUESS advocates for production technologies such as ozone treatments and e-flow technologies that reduce water consumption and minimize the generation of pollutants in effluent. These technologies lessen the load on wastewater treatment systems, making them more effective. Such innovations are particularly critical in water-stressed regions, where managing water resources responsibly supports both local ecosystems and community needs.

▼ **CURRENT CHALLENGES AND TRANSPARENCY**

GUESS acknowledges significant limitations in its ability to measure or track wastewater-related metrics, including the percentage of water treated at various stages (primary, secondary, or tertiary treatment). Data on water intensity and effluent quality remain under the control of its suppliers, and GUESS currently lacks traceability beyond tier 1 suppliers. This lack of visibility presents challenges in fully understanding and mitigating wastewater impacts, particularly upstream at dye houses and other processing facilities.

The Company recognizes the importance of improving traceability and data collection across its supply chain to enhance its oversight of wastewater practices. As a step toward this goal, GUESS is leveraging its vendor Code of Conduct and Sustainable Vendor Rating to progressively encourage suppliers to align with industry standards and disclose more comprehensive wastewater management data.

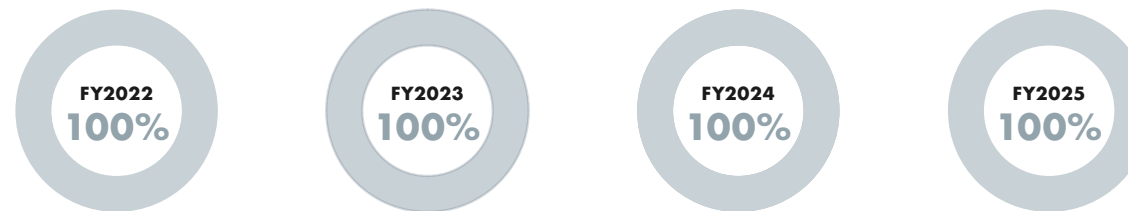

SUPPLIER FACTORY MONITORING

Monitoring is an integral part of strengthening our supplier management. We partner with experienced factory auditors to conduct regular supplier assessments. These assessments evaluate the factories' current standing and identify any areas needing improvement, including both social and environmental issues. Additionally, to track performance over time, GUESS collects evidence of social compliance from the previous two years.

SUPPLY CHAIN ASSESSMENT

Supply chain assessments are carried out according to third-party standards such as Sedex, BSCI, WRAP, and SA8000 Standards or following the GUESS standard. We are interested in ensuring that our suppliers have appropriate controls and improvement programs in place. Any suppliers identified as having significant actual and potential negative significant social impacts have agreed and implement improvement plans in their facility.

AUDITS AND REMEDIATION

Our desire is that all GUESS suppliers will elevate their performance while meeting our requirements. To facilitate this, we provide suppliers with an atmosphere of support and trust in which we help them uncover any problematic issues, identify root causes, and develop solutions. In this environment, compliance issues can be discussed openly and remedied collaboratively. Our remediation process includes root cause analysis, goal setting, corrective action planning, follow-up, and training. Our goal is to improve social and environmental performances in the supply chain, not necessarily to reduce the number of corrective action plans. Every Corrective Action Plan (CAP) issued to a supplier is tailor made for the unique issues found and reported at the facility. The timeline for the CAP is decided based on the severity of the issues found, as well as the feasibility of resolving the issues in the proposed timeline. We choose to leverage these opportunities to encourage open dialogue and transparency. We also focus on incident prevention by improving training frequency and effectiveness and supporting suppliers in creating better working environments and management systems.

PROTECTING WORKERS THROUGH RESPONSIBLE SOURCING

In addition to improving transparency, training, and oversight in our supply chain, our raw material sourcing and responsible production policies and initiatives help to protect workers and communities by encouraging the use of raw materials produced with higher environmental and social standards.

With operations spread around the world, GUESS is a truly global company. A large assortment of our merchandise is designed at GUESS, then produced by our trusted suppliers with finished items distributed worldwide.

We source our apparel, bags, accessories, footwear, and jewelry from our vetted supplier base. We work both directly with vendors and with the factories they own, or subcontract work out to. By building strong relationships with our suppliers, we are better able to manage sustainability challenges, reduce risk, and support transparency and traceability throughout our supply chain. Over the years, the fashion industry has been working collaboratively to improve working conditions, human rights, health and safety, and work hours. Together, we have come a long way, but we are still not finished.

Ongoing improvements, training, and monitoring are still necessary.

In addition, we require factories to provide evidence of their social compliance record. To effectively assess a factory's social performance, we require audit reports and certificates issued by peer companies, third-party audits and certification bodies, or multi-stakeholder organizations.

SUPPLIER TRAINING AND EDUCATION

On a larger scale, educating and training our suppliers is one of the best practices we can use to reduce risks in our supply chain.

By taking a proactive approach, we can help suppliers recognize their areas for improvement, identify root causes of any non-compliance issues, and build compliance capacity. To do this, we provide two main types of supplier training and education:

- One-on-one supplier onboarding training to introduce all new suppliers to our social compliance program and our requirements and expectations.
- Virtual training sessions (since FY2022) focused on the most common issues from our social compliance assessment program as well as supplier needs and feedback.

As part of our ongoing commitment to increase factory employee access to trainings and development opportunities, we launched a new development program at the end of FY2022. This program is Focused, Tailor-Made, and Effective (FTME). Each FTME training highlights specific social and environmental topics and was designed with the ambition of capacity building on a wide scale. The FTME has since become a pillar of our Social Compliance program and continues to deliver free training to all our supply chain; latest topic we discussed with our suppliers about Wages and Benefits, our Human Rights policy requirements and GHG Emissions reduction.

To promote increased attendance and accessibility, we have conducted multiple online versions of the same training, in multiple languages. This allows our suppliers to join in from different time zones. The sessions have been designed to be both informative and interactive, providing participants with data covering different topics as well as practical examples of how to address challenges typically found in the supply chain.

We will continue to strengthen our FTME training program for suppliers and plan to organize in-person conferences. To facilitate collaboration and best practice knowledge sharing, we will target supplier programs in our major sourcing countries as soon as possible.

SUPPLIER FACTORY MONITORING

Monitoring is an integral part of strengthening our supplier management. We partner with experienced factory auditors to conduct regular supplier assessments. These assessments evaluate the factories' current standing and identify any areas needing improvement, including both social and environmental issues.

To track performance over time, GUESS collects evidence of social compliance from the previous two years. On average, GUESS performs an assessment of each supplier every 12 months. In FY2024 and FY2025 all new suppliers were assessed using social criteria.

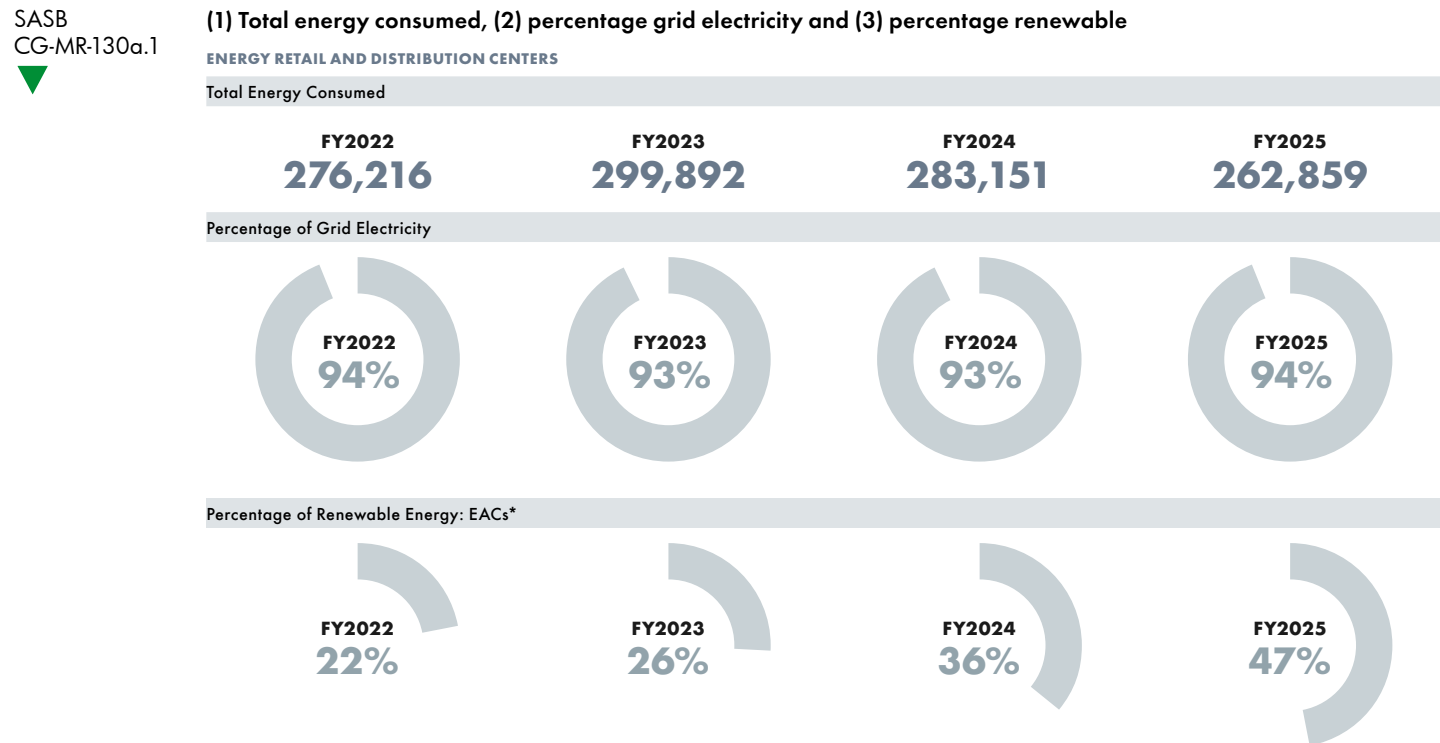

GLOBAL PRIVACY GOVERNANCE: REDEFINING COMPLIANCE AS A STRATEGIC PILLAR OF ESG LEADERSHIP

Over the past two fiscal years, GUESS has undertaken a comprehensive transformation of its global Privacy Governance model, further embedding legal and ethical accountability into its core operations. Spearheaded by the Legal Department, this initiative reflects our commitment to a principled, risk-based, and human-centric approach to data protection—an essential component of our broader ESG vision.

We have developed and implemented a Group-wide Privacy Governance Framework, fully aligned with applicable European legislation—most notably the GDPR, which remains the global benchmark for data protection—and enriched by internationally recognized standards, including key elements from the ISO family of certifications.

This framework represents the first unified and fully integrated privacy model in GUESS history. It consolidates over 60 tailored policies, procedures, and guidelines, covering critical areas such as:

- Role designation and data processing principles
- Regulation and monitoring of employee-assigned IT tools
- Third-party management and data transfers
- CCTV and workplace surveillance governance
- HR data processing and employee rights
- Marketing practices and digital tools oversight
- AI governance and privacy-by-design protocols
- Supply chain controls and cross-border compliance
- Data breach prevention, response, and notification strategies
- Data subject rights and regulatory engagement
- Technical and organizational measures for continuous protection

The framework was first adopted by our European holding company in the Netherlands at the end of 2023, followed closely by legal entities across the EU and Switzerland. Recognizing jurisdictional differences, the model has been localized to meet country-specific regulatory requirements, with particular attention to labor laws and user protection norms.

In 2025, the implementation roadmap will expand to include non-EU jurisdictions, building on the successful rollout in Switzerland, with the aim of achieving global adoption across all legal entities by 2026. This project is a key milestone in building a globally harmonized yet locally adaptable privacy culture.

Beyond this structure, GUESS maintains continuous privacy and legal oversight across all business areas where personal data is processed. In line with our legal-tech and digital-first vision, this framework is not only regulatory in nature but fully operationalized. Strategic decisions—particularly in areas such as marketing, advanced digital tools, and AI—are made in close coordination between Compliance and Business units, ensuring responsible innovation aligned with ESG values. Wherever data exists, we act with one guiding principle: protecting the individual behind the information.

To reinforce this commitment, and despite our extensive in-house expertise, GUESS has appointed an external, independent, international law firm as Group Data Protection Officer (DPO). This decision ensures a high level of impartial oversight and specialized guidance, reinforcing transparency, compliance integrity, and long-term trust with all stakeholders.

SECURING THE DIGITAL FUTURE

The cybersecurity landscape is evolving at an unprecedented pace, shaped by technological advancements, regulatory pressures, and increasingly sophisticated threats. As businesses worldwide embrace digital transformation, the volume of data generated and processed is growing exponentially—exposing organizations to new vulnerabilities. At the same time, artificial intelligence (AI) has become a double-edged sword: while it enhances threat detection and automation or defenders, cybercriminals are also leveraging AI to launch more targeted and scalable attacks.

The rise of data-hungry systems, particularly AI, has introduced unprecedented opportunities—and risks. While businesses harness AI for innovation, cybercriminals exploit it to launch sophisticated attacks, making robust data protection and privacy more critical than ever. At GUESS, we remain unwavering in our commitment to securing not only business-critical information but also the personal data entrusted to us by customers, employees, and partners. This is not merely a legal obligation—it is a fundamental responsibility to foster secure digital environments where individuals can trust that their information is protected.

To uphold this commitment, we have implemented a multi-layered approach. Continuous monitoring allows us to identify and reduce attack surfaces, while data minimization practices ensure we retain only what is necessary, limiting exposure. Equally vital is our ongoing employee awareness and training program, which equips teams with the knowledge to recognize and mitigate threats such as phishing and social engineering. Beyond internal measures, we have strengthened our third-party risk assessment process, rigorously evaluating critical suppliers to ensure they meet our security standards.

In a landscape where data is both an asset and a target, we recognize that privacy and protection require constant evolution—not only in technology but also in people. Recognizing this, we have expanded our Global Cybersecurity Awareness and Training Program, reaching employees, contractors, and key stakeholders in every region in which we operate.

The program includes both online and face-to-face training sessions, offering interactive modules, phishing simulations, executive workshops, and region-specific content to ensure cultural and regulatory relevance. Our objective is to foster a resilient workforce that can recognize, avoid, and report cyber threats effectively.

We have seen remarkable results from our in-person training sessions, which provide a dynamic forum for discussing cyber threats, exploring real-world risks, and developing practical defenses for all aspects of digital life—with the added benefit of receiving immediate, actionable feedback from participants.

In 2025, we aim to go even further by developing tailored learning paths for different roles and responsibilities, supported by new and engaging initiatives.

ADOPTING ISO 27001:2022 FOR HOLISTIC SECURITY AND PRIVACY MANAGEMENT

To support our long-term security goals, we have formally adopted the ISO/IEC 27001:2022 framework, one of the most respected international standards for information security management systems (ISMS). This updated framework emphasizes the integration of security controls with privacy considerations, making it particularly well-suited to our current and future needs.

Through the implementation of this framework to govern and manage information security, we aim to continuously improve our risk assessment methodologies, aligning them with emerging threats such as supply chain attacks, data sovereignty concerns, and privacy-by-design requirements.

Additionally, our internal policies and procedures have been updated to reflect this rigorous approach, ensuring alignment with the highest standards of compliance, governance, and auditability.

This adoption has not only strengthened our internal capabilities but has also enhanced our credibility with customers and partners by demonstrating our unwavering commitment to global best practices.

LOOKING AHEAD: BUILDING A RESILIENT AND RESPONSIBLE DIGITAL FUTURE

As we look toward the future, our cybersecurity strategy will continue to evolve to meet emerging challenges. Yet our direction remains clear: people-first, risk-informed, and standards-driven. We will continue to invest in advanced technologies, refine our policies, and engage our global workforce to build a security culture that aligns with our broader mission of sustainable and responsible business.

Cybersecurity is not a standalone function—it is a pillar of our ESG vision. It supports human rights by safeguarding personal data, strengthens governance through risk-based accountability, and aligns with environmental goals by promoting efficient and sustainable technology practices.

GENDER PAY PARITY

As part of our ongoing commitment to gender pay parity, GUESS has started monitoring the pay ratio between male and female employees globally at corporate and retail levels. We are continually monitoring pay ratios in all countries where we have direct operations, excluding Korea and Japan. For corporate and retail locations, we were very pleased to see that we have achieved gender pay parity on average at a global level in FY2024 and FY2025.

Given our particular organization and fashion industry turnover, especially in retail locations, we are aware that the spot rate at year end (here represented) may not be fully representative of salary fluctuations which occurred during the fiscal year. As a consequence, we consider pay parity a ratio of 100% +/-10%.

ETHNIC DIVERSITY

With the growing focus on ethnic diversity, we continue to expand the scope of ethnicity tracking in our US operations. This allows us to make informed decisions when developing initiatives that can best address the needs of our employees. Whether it's providing culturally specified training materials, events, or creating specific employee development programs for underrepresented groups, we are pleased that these initiatives are contributing to a more diverse workforce as a whole.

In FY2021, we've pledged to donate one million dollars to influential non-profit organizations that champion art, culture, education, empowerment, and wellness within the Black and African American communities. The GUESS is proud to have completed that commitment in FY2024 supporting the following organizations:

- World Stage is an education and performing arts center based in South Los Angeles that hosts weekly affordable workshops and concerts for musicians of all ages and skill levels. GUESS Foundation's donation will help fund their weekly concert series and their Young Lions Music Series for high school and college students, as well as allow for purchase of new equipment needed.
- Black Design Collective is an organization that is committed to developing and implementing programs that provide the Black design and creative community with the tools and skills necessary to compete and thrive in a competitive marketplace. GUESS Foundation's donation will help fund their education, training, and mentorship programs and provide scholarships for their fashion students.
- Black Girls Tennis Club focuses on the liberation and empowerment of Black girls and women through tennis. They recognized that Black communities are underrepresented in tennis, so they created opportunities for them to participate in free tennis clinics and programming. GUESS Foundation's donation will help fund their free tennis clinics and purchase the necessary equipment needed for girls to play the sport.
- Private School Village cultivates and harnesses the power of community to positively transform the private school experience for Black families, so that students fully thrive. They aim to enhance representation and provide aid for students from low-income households, so they have a chance at a private school education. GUESS Foundation's donation will help fund several of PSV's programs and provide scholarship aid.

In FY2025, the GUESS Foundation continued its support through donations to the World Stage and Black Design Collective.

In Honor of AAPI Heritage Month, GUESS Foundation supported the Asian Pacific Counseling and Treatment Centers in FY2024 and FY2025, which was the first mental health center in Los Angeles County that specifically developed to meet the unique needs of Asian Pacific immigrants and refugees.

In FY2024, our Courageous Conversations discussions continued to foster a supportive space for individuals with shared values to engage in meaningful dialogue. Topics ranged from 'DEI Coded' to '5Ds of Bystander Intervention' and 'How to Have Courageous Conversations.' These discussions featured both external experts and our talented associates, who posed thought-provoking questions addressing the stigma surrounding allyship in the workplace, the fundamentals of DEI, and the different methods used to intervene during conflict. By delving into these topics, our conversations aimed to champion inclusivity and amplify the voices of marginalized communities.

MANDATORY CORNERSTONE TRAINING

In FY2024, we implemented two new Cornerstone diversity & inclusion training sessions, which were mandatory for employees in the US. With separate trainings for both Managers and employees, these sessions provided each group with an introduction to D&I as well as microlearning modules assessed through our Learning Management System. At the end of FY2024, GUESS introduced the Global Harassment Prevention for Employees Training e-learning course for the entire corporate workforce. Since then, this course has become mandatory for all new corporate HQ hires to complete within 30 days of their start date.

In FY2025, we expanded our training efforts in the US by rolling out additional mandatory sessions focused on promoting diversity, understanding discrimination, and learning how to prevent it. We also plan to launch more mandatory diversity & inclusion curriculums globally through Cornerstone.

PARTNERSHIPS THROUGH DIVERSITY AND CREATIVITY

In honor of Women's History Month, in FY2025, professional pipeline Gyrl Wonder launched their capsule collection designed by the GUESS Originals team. The partnership came together to create pieces that celebrates the creativity and ingenuity of Gyrl Wonder and Guess?, Inc. The GUESS x Gyrl Wonder capsule collection consisted of three custom pieces available only on www.gyrlwonder.org. A portion of the proceeds went towards the GUESS x Gyrl Wonder scholarship fund for the 2024/2025 academic year.

"Our partnership with Guess?, Inc. was born out of really trying times. It opened the doors of opportunity for our mentees and us as an organization. To date we have partnered for 3 summer internship experiences, and our last Gyrl Wonder recommendation was hired full time!" says founder of Gyrl Wonder, Tola Lawal. "We're excited to be entering the 4th year of this partnership and kicking it off with a collaborative capsule collection!"

At the end of FY2025, Guess Europe teamed up with Progetto Quid to launch a collaborative capsule collection inspired by the brand's iconic daisy print, a nod to GUESS's rich heritage. Progetto Quid, based in Verona Italy, is dedicated to making the workforce accessible to individuals at risk of exclusion and discrimination, with a strong emphasis on empowering women. This collection carries a powerful message of positivity and inclusivity, highlighted by the "Love Culture" t-shirt, which promotes a culture of love and acceptance, free from prejudice—values that align perfectly with GUESS's ethos. The collection debuted online across Europe and in select stores in February 2025 as part of the spring lineup.

"The attention to social and environmental issues that the Company has always shown has motivated us to collaborate with the brand," says Anna Fiscale, President and Founder of Progetto Quid. "Sustainability, inclusion, and the enhancement of diversity are integral parts of both GUESS's and our identity. We are thrilled to have the opportunity to create a unique collection together."

Discussion of Processes to Assess and Manage Risks and/or Hazards Associated with Chemicals in Products
GUESS employs a comprehensive and structured strategy to ensure chemical safety throughout its supply chain, integrating hazard and risk dynamics to address products effectively. This approach includes identifying and prioritizing chemicals for reduction or elimination, focusing on the potential harm they may cause based on scientific evidence and regulatory standards. Additionally, GUESS evaluates exposure scenarios and usage patterns to assess risks across a product's lifecycle, ensuring a holistic understanding of potential impacts.

To support this methodology, GUESS aligns its practices with its LRSM, which provides guidelines for managing restricted substances and minimizing risks across the supply chain, reinforcing the Company's commitment to excellence in chemical safety. However, as GUESS's production is entirely outsourced, the Company focuses its chemical management efforts on the finished products rather than on the chemicals used during suppliers' production processes.

Disclosure of full chemical formulations is not applicable to GUESS, as the Company designs, develops, and markets fashion apparel and accessories, not complex chemical products. The foundation of our items lies in the textile materials and fibers they are made of, not in chemical formulations.

During the initial testing phase, suppliers are required to submit samples of finished goods for laboratory analysis to ensure compliance with the GUESS LRSM. For metal hardware, particular attention is given to coatings and metal alloys, which are assessed to mitigate risks related to heavy metals and prolonged skin contact. Material substitution assessments are conducted to identify safer alternatives where hazardous substances are identified, enabling GUESS to incorporate alternative chemicals into product design while maintaining the highest safety standards for the end consumer.

The Compliance team plays a critical role in managing testing protocols and selecting styles for bulk testing. Their approach factors in risk levels identified during assessments, garment construction variations (e.g., long sleeve versus short sleeve), and fabric quality. For example, if the same fabric is used across multiple styles, testing is performed on different colors for colorfastness and one representative style for physical testing. Garment tests are conducted on flagged styles to ensure overall safety.

Suppliers are required to send bulk pieces to authorized labs for "Garment Tests" or "Additional Color Tests" following the GUESS Testing Protocols. Vendors must also provide detailed test reports, and results are documented and tracked using shared systems accessible to key stakeholders across the company. Non-compliance is addressed promptly through corrective action plans, which include re-testing and adjustments to ensure alignment with GUESS's stringent requirements. For accessories, additional care is taken to manage compliance for jewelry and small leather goods.

Randomized secondary testing of goods at distribution centers ensures compliance before products are introduced to the market. This measure provides an added layer of quality assurance, helping to identify any non-compliance issues that may arise post-production.

Discussion of Strategies to Reduce the Environmental Impact of Packaging
GUESS is committed to reducing the environmental footprint of its packaging by implementing comprehensive practices rooted in its Packaging Policy. Our efforts are driven by a focus on minimizing material usage, enhancing recyclability, and aligning with globally recognized more sustainable products' standards.

GUESS prioritizes the use of less impacting materials across all divisions, as outlined in the Packaging Policy. For the Apparel Division, this involves adopting 100% recycled or biodegradable content for primary packaging materials, such as garment bags and hangtags. Meanwhile, the Accessories Division focuses on transitioning to recyclable materials for product boxes and protective wraps, with a particular emphasis on eliminating single-use plastics. By ensuring that packaging materials meet higher environmental performance standards, GUESS reinforces its commitment to sustainability.

Recognizing the challenges of scalability in sustainable packaging initiatives, GUESS continues to refine its practices and seek advancements. The Packaging Policy further reinforces these commitments by establishing clear guidelines for sourcing, innovation, and stakeholder engagement.

While we are actively increasing the proportion of recycled and recyclable materials in our primary and secondary packaging, we acknowledge that we are not yet able to measure this KPI comprehensively. We are committed to developing a dedicated metric to track progress and ensure transparency in our sustainability efforts.

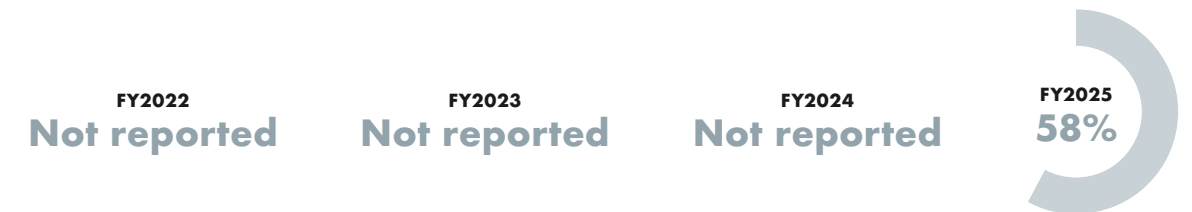

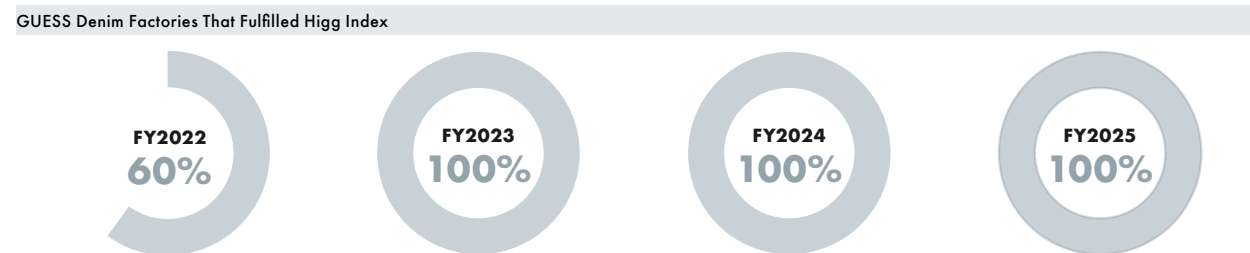

The Scope 2 indirect emissions for the base year were calculated using the market-based methodology.

Base year and subsequent years’ reported GHG emissions are adjusted according to guidance as set forth in the GHG Protocol when a significant cumulative change in base-year emissions is triggered. The following conditions would require such an adjustment if a significant change is identified:

- A structural change of the Company’s organizational boundaries (i.e., merger, acquisition, or divestiture).

- Environment Canada National Inventory Report (NIR)
- International Energy Agency (IEA) CO₂ Emissions from Fuel Combustion

While the Company discloses GHG emissions factors using both the location- and market-based methodology, in accordance with the GHG Protocol, Management applies the market-based methodology to measure emissions performance against the stated emission reduction targets as compared to the base year.

Market-Based Methodology

The market-based calculation method utilizes emissions factors that GUESS has identified or been provided through contractual instruments such as:

- Energy attribute certificates: such as renewable energy credits (RECs), international-RECs (i-RECs), and Guarantees of Origin (GoO)s, as in FY2024-2025, GUESS purchased renewable energy credits across various markets.
- Direct energy contracts: inclusive of renewable energy, brown power, and low-carbon purchases.
- Residual Mix: the emissions factors that represent the “untracked or unclaimed energy and emissions”; this residual mix is utilized if the company does not have the contractual instruments to meet the Scope 2 Quality Criteria.

Additional factors, according to guidance in the GHG Protocol Scope 2 market-based data hierarchy, were used to calculate Scope 2 market-based emissions.

Location-Based Methodology

The location-based calculation method utilizes grid-averaged emission intensities to calculate scope 2 emissions (i.e. US EPA eGrid factors, Environment Canada NIR factors, IEA country factors). Scope 3 Calculation

Gases included, other GHG emissions categories and activities, emissions factors, standards, methodologies, assumptions, and/or calculation tools used

Scope 3 accounts for indirect GHG emissions from the Purchased Goods & Services category, which only includes activities associated with land use changes, material extraction, textile processing, and final assembly for units purchased by GUESS. This Scope 3 Category has been defined as the one significant to set our SBTi goals. All other immaterial sources may be periodically reviewed for relevancy on an ongoing basis. Due to limited data and small contribution to GUESS’ overall portfolio, accessories and packaging are excluded from this calculation.

Data for Americas, Europe and Mainland China on purchased units and related materials are retrieved from the same database used for the other GRI and SASB metrics presented in this ESG Report. To date, GUESS is unable to access similar databases of product-level information for its Korea and Japan footprint. As such, material estimates are based on total revenue breakouts in that region to calculate missing unit information assumptions.

When information was unavailable, gap fills or estimations were performed to approximate the usage. Approximations can be based on reports or invoices from other months of the same building or from other buildings comparable in size and energy consumption.

Difference Between Replenished and Used Water at Supply Chain Level

GUESS has set a long-term ambition to become water positive in our supply chain by 2035, aiming to replenish more water than we use across production processes. While the concept is still evolving at a global level, we recognize the urgency of addressing water impacts in fashion supply chains.

The path forward is complex, and we are currently evaluating the most effective approach before defining specific actions or metrics. As our understanding grows, we will communicate clear next steps and continue building a credible foundation for this ambitious goal.

Difference Between Removed and Emitted GHG Into the Atmosphere

At GUESS, we are committed to not only reducing our emissions but also actively contributing to the removal of GHGs from the atmosphere. In recent years, GUESS has undertaken several initiatives to restore ecosystems and offset our carbon footprint.

Our partnership with One Tree Planted has been instrumental in this regard. The GUESS Foundation partnered with One Tree Planted to help restore areas through North America, Europe, and Asia. During FY2024 and FY2025, GUESS contributed to planting 1,496 trees in British Columbia, 9,404 trees in Minnesota, 11,516 trees in Romania, 2,088 trees in Vietnam and 1,496 trees in Ontario. Since the beginning of our collaboration with One Tree Planted in 2022, we have planted 32,000 trees across British Columbia, California, Minnesota, Romania, Vietnam and Ontario.

Additionally, our collaboration with Treedom has led to the creation of the GUESS ECO Forest, known as Be(leaf) in Change. Since its inception in 2022, this forest now boasts 5,000 trees across Colombia, Guatemala, Kenya, Nepal, and Tanzania, comprising 17 different species. These trees are expected to collectively absorb an impressive 1,200,500 kg of CO₂ in the first 10 years, highlighting the impact of our reforestation efforts on carbon sequestration.

In Europe, we have implemented the PrintReleaf program to counterbalance the unavoidable paper use at our offices and stores. Initiated at our Guess Europe locations in Switzerland, this program has now expanded to our European offices and stores. In FY2024 and FY2025, we planted over 900 trees through PrintReleaf, contributing to a “small forest” that helps offset our paper consumption. Since the program’s inception in 2016, we have planted over 2,300 trees.

Despite these substantial efforts in GHG removal, it is essential to recognize that our work is ongoing. Our future commitment at GUESS includes a dedication to more precise and comprehensive reporting on the balance between GHGs emitted and removed. As part of our ESG strategy, we will enhance our data collection methods and provide transparent and accurate accounts of our environmental impact. This commitment will enable us to set more effective targets and strategies to further reduce our carbon footprint and enhance our contributions to global carbon sequestration.

By continuously improving our practices and transparently reporting our progress, GUESS aims to lead by example in the fashion industry, demonstrating that sustainable practices and business growth can go hand in hand.

Climate Governance and Risk Management

At GUESS, climate governance is embedded across our corporate structure, reflecting our commitment to managing climate-related issues with accountability and strategic foresight. Oversight begins at the highest level, with our Board of Directors, and is operationalized across departments through dedicated governance bodies and processes.

BOARD OVERSIGHT AND EXECUTIVE ENGAGEMENT

Climate-related issues fall under the purview of the Nominating and Governance Committee of the Board of Directors, which meets regularly at least twice each year.

Our CEO, a member of the Board, plays a direct role in climate oversight, meeting as needed with our Vice President of Internal Audit and ESG to review progress on our ESG strategy, including climate-related initiatives. This executive engagement ensures cross-functional alignment and senior-level ownership of our sustainability objectives.

At the operational level, GUESS has established a cross-functional Sustainability Steering Committee in the United States and Europe. This group is responsible for integrating sustainability across our global functions and meets regularly. It is led by our Chief New Business Development Officer and includes our CFO and other members of the global executive leadership team. The Committee plays a central role in reviewing action plans and monitoring performance against GUESS’s ESG goals. Among the Committee’s several strategic decisions is the approval and purchase of renewable energy since FY2022, as part of our strategy aligned with our SBTi commitment to achieve and maintain a 50% reduction of absolute Scope 1 and 2 emissions by 2030, towards a 1.5-degree trajectory.

MANAGEMENT INCENTIVES LINKED TO ESG

At GUESS, we recognize that embedding ESG into our leadership framework is key to driving long-term impact. Our CEO is responsible for approving our ACTION GUESS strategy and ensuring its implementation.

As part of our ACTION GUESS Strategy, we are committed to integrating ESG performance into our annual performance evaluations. This approach ensures that sustainability is a core component of our business strategy and daily operations.

By linking ESG performance to annual evaluations, we foster a culture of accountability and encourage leadership at every level to contribute meaningfully to our sustainability efforts. Our incentive plans and goals planning allows managers to consider individual achievements including the achievement of our ESG goals.

CLIMATE RISK MANAGEMENT

Our climate risk management process spans the full value chain—from direct operations to upstream and downstream activities—and is structured to assess risks across short-, medium-, and long-term horizons.

- Short-term (1–3 years): Risks include seasonal variability, rising electricity costs, and extreme weather events increasingly driven by climate change.
- Medium-term (3–5 years): We assess impacts such as raw material cost volatility and the operational implications of carbon reduction strategies.
- Long-term (5–15 years): Risks under this horizon include global regulatory changes aligned with the Paris Agreement, shifts in competitor supply chain strategies, and emerging technologies or digital solutions that may be vulnerable to climate disruption.

This structured approach to climate risk is integrated into our broader enterprise risk management framework. By evaluating environmental dependencies and emerging climate-related threats alongside financial and operational risks, we ensure our organization remains resilient and responsive in an increasingly dynamic risk landscape.

Develop Training and Development Opportunities to Promote Positive Change for Women (Supply Chain Only)

In Myanmar, the Better Health program with a key accessories supplier focuses on improving worker health and well-being. The initiative leverages peer educators to deliver training on hygiene, reproductive health, and nutrition, ensuring that knowledge cascades through the workforce and into communities. Women, in particular, benefit from targeted sessions addressing maternal health and menstrual hygiene, empowering them to make informed decisions that enhance their quality of life.

The Better Finance program in Pakistan, implemented with a key denim supplier, equips workers with essential financial literacy skills, including budgeting, financial planning, and responsible borrowing. This initiative is designed to build economic resilience among employees, with a focus on empowering women to actively participate in financial decision-making, fostering independence and confidence in navigating economic challenges. On a larger scale, educating and training suppliers remains one of the most effective practices GUESS employs to reduce risks and foster responsible practices across its supply chain. Through a proactive approach, GUESS empowers suppliers to identify areas for improvement, address the root causes of non-compliance, and build stronger capabilities in managing social and environmental issues. In line with its ACTION GUESS strategy, GUESS continues to enhance its training programs to cover a broad range of critical topics that support the Company’s commitment to sustainable and ethical practices.

The Focused, Tailor-Made, and Effective (FTME) development program, introduced at the end of FY2022, remains a cornerstone of GUESS’s training efforts. This program emphasizes interactive and targeted learning, equipping suppliers with practical insights and solutions to enhance their performance. FTME training sessions are designed to be both adaptable and impactful, addressing social and environmental issues relevant to suppliers’ operations.

GUESS has expanded its supplier training initiatives to ensure a deeper understanding of key compliance requirements and to promote continuous improvement. These programs are tailored to address both common challenges in the supply chain and emerging issues, offering practical tools and actionable guidance to suppliers. By leveraging virtual training webinars and multilingual content, GUESS ensures accessibility and participation across diverse regions. In FY2024 and FY2025, GUESS conducted a series of training sessions covering key topics, including its Social Compliance Program and Supply Chain Evaluation, GUESS ECO Products requirements and product certifications, GHG emissions reduction strategies, wages and benefits, and GUESS’s Human Rights Policy requirements.

Looking ahead, GUESS is committed to further strengthening these programs by organizing in-person events and conferences in key sourcing countries. These initiatives aim to foster collaboration, encourage the exchange of best practices, and reinforce GUESS’s dedication to building a resilient, responsible, and sustainable supply chain.

Locally, we partnered with North East Trees, an urban greening nonprofit dedicated to increasing tree canopy and green spaces in underinvested communities throughout Los Angeles. We marked Earth Day's 54th anniversary with educational insights, expanded our Social Compliance approach to include Denim Laundries in May, and celebrated the renewal of our brand certification for more sustainable products on October 18th.

To close the year, we introduced a Carbon Footprint Analysis Tool on December 3rd, equipping our teams with advanced capabilities to measure and optimize environmental impact during product development.

Number of Events Regarding Wellness and Mental Health

In FY2024-FY2025, our Company made meaningful progress in fostering a culture of health and wellness. By offering a wide range of events and initiatives, we provided our employees with resources to enhance both their physical and mental well-being, aligning with our commitment to supporting their holistic health. These efforts are critical as we continue to prioritize our employees’ well-being and create a supportive work environment across all regions.

FY2024 Initiatives

During the year, we made significant strides in promoting employee wellness and mental health across our regions, holding a total of 37 events to support these initiatives.

AMERICAS

In the Americas, we organized 21 events focused on employees’ wellness. These events ranged from physical health initiatives to nutrition education and stress management.

- **Physical Activity & Team Building:** Early in the year, the “Pull, Push, Play Contest” encouraged 40 participants in Los Angeles (LA) and Kentucky (KY) to embrace physical activity. This was complemented by various team-building events that promoted healthy living, from alcohol alternatives to wholesome snacks.
- **Holistic Health Approaches:** We introduced unique wellness experiences like sound baths, ear seeds therapy, and acupuncture sessions, offering employees stress relief through both traditional and modern methods. Additionally, we focused on preventative care through initiatives such as mammogram screenings, food sensitivity testing, and flu immunization clinics.
- **Life-Saving Skills and Preparedness:** In June, 40 employees became Heart Saver certified through a CPR and First Aid course, and in October, a Disaster Preparedness Fair equipped employees with mental health resources and first aid knowledge for emergencies.

Throughout the year, our commitment to wellness was exemplified by various events like blood drives, dental services, and a Men’s Health Fair, which provided screenings for cancer and other health markers, ensuring our employees had access to essential healthcare services.

In addition to wellness, we prioritized mental health, holding 6 dedicated events. These included virtual and in-person wellness talks, meditations, and workshops. Mental health professionals led sessions on trauma, habit formation, and emotional well-being, ensuring that employees had access to tools and support for their mental health challenges.

EUROPE

In Europe, we conducted 10 events, with a strong focus on mental health and well-being. Two of these events centered on physical health, while the remaining eight focused on mental wellness. Out of the mental health events, a significant portion explored innovative approaches like the “three brains” concept and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) techniques. These methods are designed to help employees manage stress, trauma, and emotional challenges, aligning with our commitment to providing comprehensive mental health support.

FY2025 Initiatives

AMERICAS

In the Americas, our wellness journey continued with a strong focus on mental health awareness and holistic well-being. During May 2024, we launched the Wellness Wednesdays initiative, offering a series of four virtual workshops dedicated to the concepts outlined in The Four Agreements. These interactive sessions empowered employees with practical tools to overcome self-limiting beliefs, aligning with our commitment to mental resilience and personal growth.

Complementing these efforts, we introduced Sound Bath meditations across our campuses, providing moments of relaxation and mindfulness. These immersive experiences, held throughout the day, allowed participants to engage in deep meditative practices, enhancing mental clarity and reducing stress.

EUROPE

Our European region embraced well-being with innovative approaches. In May 2024, Guess Europe entered into a strategic partnership with Welfood, an innovative well-being support service designed for Swiss Office Employees. Through this partnership, employees were granted confidential access to individual consultations, free of charge, with a choice of well-being professionals, including:

- Psychologists
- Nutritionists
- Sports Coaches
- Parenting Counselors
- Harassment and Gender Violence Specialists

This program, accessible through the Welfood platform, also unlocked further resources such as the Academy and Live Events, enabling employees to explore well-being topics aligned with their personal interests.

Furthering our commitment to physical health, since July 2024, Guess Europe hosted a series of Pilates Sessions within our Swiss offices, encouraging physical activity and mindfulness in the workplace.

Our focus on preventive health continued into autumn, with an Online Webinar on Nutrition and Cancer Prevention held in October 2024. This event, open to all Swiss Office employees, provided valuable insights into the impact of nutrition on long-term health and disease prevention.

GUESS Apparel Full-Price lines

Refer to the full-price collections of GUESS brands, including GUESS, GUESS JEANS, GUESS Kids, Underwear, GUESS Athleisure, Marciano by Guess, GUESS Originals, and GUESS U.S.A. These lines encompass all full-price apparel categories for adults and kids sold around the world through our full-price retail stores. The GUESS apparel full-price lines exclude GUESS Factory lines.

GUESS ECO

GUESS ECO stands for GUESS full-price products made using more sustainable materials and processes that satisfy minimum requirements as defined by our internal guidelines for the given year of development. GUESS ECO products are marketed as a more sustainable product range by GUESS. In addition to preferred materials, the production method is optional for non-denim and required for denim to be branded as GUESS ECO.

GUESS Factory Apparel lines

Refer to the collections of GUESS branded apparel sold around the world through our factory outlet stores. These lines include Factory Outlet Global (i.e., Factory Mainline), Factory Kids, Underwear Factory Outlet, and GUESS for Departments. GUESS Factory lines exclude full-price collections.

GUESS Human Rights Policy (HR Policy)

The HR Policy helps our stakeholders better understand the Company's commitment to human rights and associated requirements, in addition to accountability measures.

GUESS Supplier Code of Conduct (CoC)

The CoC details our requirements for full compliance with legal requirements, child labor, freedom of association, human rights, health and safety, labor rights, ethics, environmental protection, decent work, payment, and administration.

Higg FEM

The Higg Index's Facility Environmental Module is a standardized sustainability assessment tool to measure and evaluate apparel facilities' environmental performance.

HRC

Human Rights Council.

LCA

Life cycle assessment to measure the impacts on the environment associated with the life cycle of a product, process, or service.

LRSM

GUESS' List of Restricted Substances and Materials which outlines the chemicals that are limited or prohibited in our products or in the production process.

Materials Portfolio

Collection of diverse raw materials used in the production of goods.

MRSL

ZDHC's Manufacturing Restricted Substances List is a list of chemical substances banned from intentional use in the apparel industry.

PFAS

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, so called "Forever chemicals".
